FOUND A FORTUNE.

Bought a Grimy Trunk at an Auction Sale.

IT CONTAINED BONDS WHICH WITH INTEREST ARE WORTH \$25,000.

New York, Dec. 19.—Wrapped in a faded bit of brown paper at the bottom of a grimy old trunk that he bought at a storage warehouse auction for \$4, Max Hart, a clerk in Postoffice Station L. One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Lexington Avenue, has found bonds of a southern electric lighting and water company which have a market value of between \$17,500 and \$20,000.

Accrued interest at 6 per cent., which has not been collected for years, adds nearly \$10,000 to the value of his find, which is estimated by bank officials to be between \$25,000 and \$30,000.

Hart submitted the bonds to the inspection of the officials of the Twelfth Ward Bank, One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Lexington Avenue, of which ex-Mayor Thos. F. Gilroy is president, and they in turn to a broker, who established their value beyond question.

Hart yesterday consulted lawyers, who advised him that, as he had bought the bonds in good faith, they could not be taken from him. It is supposed that the owner of the bonds died, and his relatives know nothing about the securities. Nothing was heard by the warehouse proprietors from the owner of the trunk for years. They had sent frequent notices to an old address, and, obtaining no reply, placed the trunk at auction, as the law allows them to do. As he bought the trunk and contents, Hart has been advised that his title to both is good.

For five years he has been attending book and storage auction sales, making some money, especially out of rare books. At the warehouse sales his fan has been to buy trunks that have lain unclaimed for years. Auctioneers seldom open these trunks but auction them off for what they may have inside. With the buyer it is a gamble. Hart has purchased upward of fifty trunks. Few yielded him anything, but he kept on, in the hope of striking it rich some day.

Mr. Weeks laid particular stress on the effect of a glance from her eyes on the young fellows of that day. She had but to look at one, and he was immediately at her feet.

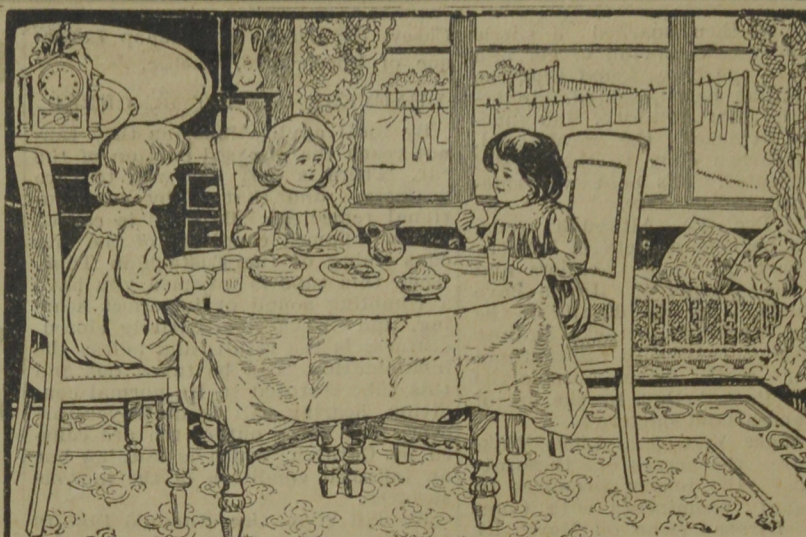

EFFICIENT ICE BREAKER.

Government Boat Ploughed Through St. Lawrence a Foot Thick.

Quebec, Dec. 19.—The steamer Montcalm, the new government ice-breaker, had her first real test Saturday. The steamer left Quebec and sailed up river until she struck fields of ice eight inches thick. Through these she ploughed at a 12 knot speed, passing the Narrows at the Chaudiere which were choked with ice as far as St. Auguste.

When Cape Rouge was reached the ice was packed as a solid mass. The Montcalm also cut through this apparently without difficulty. In some places the ice was almost a foot thick.

The minister of marine, who was on board, is well pleased with the ice-breaker, with which he expects to lengthen the St. Lawrence season of navigation two months each year.

A WINDSOR SCANDAL.

Charges of Corruption Against Mayor and Others.

Windsor, Ont. Dec. 19.—A committee of citizens known as the Windsor Municipal Reform League have preferred charges of corruption against Mayor Drake, Chairman Shepherd of the City Council and other aldermen in connection with the purchase of some thousands of dollars' worth of asphalt block for Windsor pavements. It is claimed that some of the clauses of the city's contract with the Ontario Asphalt Block Company had been tampered with after they had been passed by the city council. Mayor Drake denies the charges in toto, and says he will explain everything on nomination day. The Reform League claim to have further revelations of a startling character to make.
