

STRIKE STILL ON.

Chicago Butchers Decide Against Resuming Work.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Chicago, July 22.—The packing houses strike was today ordered renewed in Chicago and all other cities. A violation of their agreement by the packers is assigned as the cause.

This morning three thousand butchers reported at the stock yards to resume their regular duties, but were told that only half of them could be taken back. The agreement reached yesterday was to the effect that the greater number of strikers were to be re-employed today and the balance within forty-five days. The men held a meeting and decided to continue the strike.

President Donnelly of the Butcher's Union, it is stated has ordered a sympathetic strike of all allied trades.

A RUSSIAN REPULSE.

London, July 22.—A despatch to the Central News from Tokio says there is reason to believe that a severe fight lasting all day on July 19th at Kai Tou, north of Motien Pass. Another despatch to the Central news from Tokio says that a telegram from the front announces that the engagement north of Motien Pass was precipitated by the Russians, who attacked the Japanese positions at Sichiayen westward of Kai Tou. After severe fighting the Russians were repulsed. The Japanese casualties were over 200. The Russian losses were heavy.

A WISE POLICY.

London, July 22.—In accordance with instructions from St. Petersburg, Count Benckendorff, the Russian ambassador to Great Britain, has informed Foreign Secretary Lansdowne that immediately on the establishment of the broad arrow marks, the British government mark upon the munition on board the Malacca, and the fact that no other contraband character is on board the vessel will at once be released.

ACTOR BARRETT DEAD.

CAMMACK RECOVERING.

Taken to Woodstock Thursday and Lodged in the County Jail.

Woodstock, July 21.—Thomas Cammack, who was brought here this evening from the scene of the Doherty murder, was placed in the jail. He appears to be improving.

Bath, N. B., July 21.—Deputy Sheriff Foster, Dr. Commins, Constable Wolverton and Perley Giberson arrived here this morning at 11:30 from the Cammack homestead. They slept in the Cammack barn all night and took turns at watching the prisoner. Cammack seemed to rest somewhat easier. He was brought to the Exchange Hotel here on arrival, being assisted from the carriage to the house by Frank E. Greany and P. J. Hanlon. Shortly after arrival at the hotel the prisoner made the following deposition before a justice of the peace:—

"I, Thomas Cammack, was alone on Sunday night. My son Walter was not with me.

(Signed "Thomas Cammack,
Witnesses: "James Wolverton,
Constable.

"P. J. Hanlon.

"Sworn to at Bath before me, P. Corbett, J. P., July 21, 1904."

Dr. Commins examined Cammack at his home the night prior to removal and found that Cammack's pulse was very little lower than on the previous day. With very little assistance Cammack got into the wagon for the fifteen mile trip to Bath, which he stood well.

He had slept well last night, talked rationally and had not been unconscious since arrival here. The doctor claims it is very rare for a man with a bullet in the brain to suffer from less complications than there are in this case.

The prisoner was taken to Woodstock on the 4.12 train this afternoon. His son James, between 25 and 30 years old, and Joe, about 13 years old, saw their father after he was brought to Bath. The interview was a sad one, the boys weeping as they listened to their father's sad story.
