OLDEST COUPLE IN CANADA.

Reside in Charlotte County—Mr. and Mrs. Cross Married 67 Years.

St. Andrew's Beacon:—The newspapers have recorded the names of many venerable couples, who reside within the bounds of the Dominion of Canada, but none have yet been recorded who equal the ages of an esteemed old couple who live in Charlotte County.

Mr. and Mrs. Andrew B. Cross, who for four years past have made their home with their daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Dinmore, DeWolfe Corner, are probably the longest married of any couple living in Canada, having been 67 years together. They are both as smart as smart can be, and take a keen interest in the affairs of every-day life.

Andrew B. Cross was born at Grand Lake, on the river St. John, in 1814. When a little boy he removed with his father and other members of his family to Beaver Harbor, where he passed through his boyhood and early manhood stages. Several representatives of the Cross family are still among the honored residents of that beautiful little village.

On a bright June (15th) day in 1837, Andrew Cross plighted his troth to Miss Margaret Moran, the wedding ceremony being carried out in simple fashion by Judge Burgess of Eastport, Me. Since then the twain have climbed life's hill together, sharing each other's joys and sorrows; now, hand in hand, they are going down into the valley of the years.

Mrs. Cross is a native of White Head Island, Grand Manan parish, where she was born March 29th, 1822.

The early part of the life of this happily-wedded couple was spent at Beaver Harbor. Fifty-five years ago they removed to Saint Stephen, where they made their home until advancing years compelled them to enter the welcome shelter of their daughter's home at DeWolfe corner.

Four daughters and three sons were born to them, of whom four are still in the land of the living.

They have 19 grand children, and 13 great grand children. The oldest great grand child is Walter Leeman, of Manchester, N. H., aged 23 years.

BATTLED WITH AN EAGLE.

He Threw Rocks and it Swooped Down.

Ukiah, Cal. Dec. 29.—News has reached here of a terrible fight C. D. Estill had a few days ago with a monster eagle near Palo. Estill was ploughing and noticed a large bird in a tree. He stopped his work and when he saw it was an eagle he began throwing stones at it.

The bird was hit several times and commenced circling around overhead, too high for Estill to throw. Estill was standing by a picket fence watching the manoeuvres of the bird, when it suddenly swooped down and struck him a terrific blow with its wings.

Estill grabbed a picket from the fence and then began a battle for life that eventually ended in the killing of the eagle. Time after time it came at the boy and struck him with its wings and beak, sometimes receiving blows from the picket in return. Estill succeeded in breaking one of the eagle's wings, but did not drive it away.

Both were becoming weak, and the eagle managed to stick his talons in the boy's arm, nearly tearing it from his shoulder, and causing him to faint.

When he recovered the eagle was lying dead but a few feet from him.

The eagle measured ten feet from tip to tip and had talons eight inches long. Estill is still under the doctor's care.

HOSPITAL FOR WILD ANIMALS.

Elaborately Equipped Infirmary at Philadelphia, Zoo.

Philadelphia, Dec. 29.—A place where tumors may be removed from elephants, broken leg joints of lions reset, the camel's hump straightened, and the hippopotamus treated for skin disease—such is the new infirmary and pathological laboratory just completed at the Philadelphia Zoological gardens. It is the first of its kind in the country, and is as thoroughly equipped for fighting the ill and mending the bodily ailments of the animal kingdom as is any operating room in the big hospitals equipped for human-kind.

From a main hall four spacious rooms open, each 30 by 18 feet, and separated by glass partitions. One is used as an operating room, with tables and apparatus, and has connected with it a cold storage plant and crematory. The remaining three rooms are known as the contagious ward, quarantine ward, and receiving ward.

A cage containing the suffering animal can be wheeled into the operating room, where its occupant will be quickly bound by means of special apparatus and transferred to a huge sling. Then after having been put to sleep with ether the patient can be swung to any desired attitude for surgical treatment.

FOILED MASKED ROBBERS.

Bravery of the Assistant Postmistress Near Chicago.

Chicago, Dec. 28.—Bravery displayed by Miss Bertha Reed, twenty years old, and assistant postmistress in Franklin Park, foiled the efforts of two masked robbers who had intended to loot the safe containing considerable money and stamps.

After her hands were bound the plucky girl released herself and tore the mask from the face of one of the robbers, who was in the act of attempting to open the safe's inner door.

"Don't you touch any of that money!" shouted the girl, grappling with the man. Undaunted by the robber's revolver, Miss Reed fought until her antagonist was obliged to depart.

While the girl was struggling with the robber near the safe the other man fled from the postoffice.

Postmaster A. E. Wasson had his pocketbook on a table near by, and before the robbers ran out one of them seized it. The book contained \$75.

After the two men left the postoffice Miss Reid ran upstairs, where the postmaster makes his home, and notified J. C. Dawson.

Seizing a revolver, the man started in pursuit of the two robbers. For nearly a half-mile Dawson chased the robbers, and there were a number of shots exchanged. The robbers finally escaped.
