FORGET OF CHARLEVOIX WILL SUPPORT LAURIER.

Liberal Sweep in the West.

Montreal, Nov. 8.—Rodolph Forget, the Montreal financier who was elected as a Conservative for Charlevoix, confirms the report that he will give an independent support to the Laurier government.

PREMIER AT WORK.

But Will Likely go South for a Rest.

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier was in his office yesterday morning and at half-past twelve he left for Rideau Hall to make a friendly call on his excellency. The premier was besieged with visitors, many on business and all to congratulate the prime minister on his victory.

Sir Wilfrid granted a brief interview to the press representatives. He said he has not yet reached a decision as to whether he will sit for Wright county or Quebec East, which he has represented for twenty-six years. Both constituencies want him and are bringing much pressure to bear, which makes a decision all the more difficult.

Sir Wilfrid joins in the general sympathy felt for Borden in his defeat in Halifax. He would be pleased to see the opposition leader elected somewhere by acclamation.

The Premier says Mr. Aylesworth has a choice of two constituencies in Quebec. It is probable he will take Gaspe, which is now held by Lemieux.

Several ministers have returned to the city. The first cabinet meeting since the elections will take place Wednesday, when the contract for a national museum will probably be awarded.

It is definitely announced that Sir Wilfrid will go south for a holiday before the meeting of parliament.

THE RECORD MAJORITY.

Mr. Oliver Has It In Edmonton—Great Liberal Sweep in the West.

Winnipeg, Nov. 8.—Hon. Thomas Greenway's majority in Lisgar is 336. Hon. Clifford Sifton's majority in Brandon is 883. In Portage la Prairie, Crawford, Liberal, has 334 majority, with five polls unreported.

Oliver, Liberal, has the banner majority in Western Canada. The final reports from Edmonton give him 2,500 majority. Second, Conservative, loses his deposit.

Talbot, Liberal, carried carried Strathcona by over 700.

Lamont, Liberal, had over 700 majority in Saskatchewan.

In West Assiniboia Scott, Liberal, leads by 600 majority, with several favorable polls unreported.

Returns from Humboldt are very scattered, but nearly all favored the Liberal candidate.

In Alberta, Heron, Conservative, has 86 majority, with about half the polls heard from.

In Qu'Appelle, Lake, Conservative, is 22 ahead, with six polls to come.

In Calgary, McCarthy, Conservative, is elected by a large majority.

In Comox-Atlin, B. C., Sloan, Liberal, is returned by acclamation.

In Dauphin, Man., Burrows, Liberal, is also elected by acclamation, the Conservative having withdrawn.

MR. BORDEN WILL REST.

Defeated Tory Leader is Going South for a Few Weeks.

Halifax, Nov. 8.—Mr. R. L. Borden went to Kin's county yesterday to visit his mother. Later this week he and Mrs. Borden will go to the Southern States for a rest. He is still hoarse, but there is no doubt that a few weeks rest will restore him to perfect health and remove his throat trouble.

It was impossible to see Mr. Borden yesterday afternoon after the news came of the offer of Col. Sam Hughes to resign his seat in Victoria in his favor, but Mr. Blunt, his private secretary said that he would give a positive assurance that if Mr. Borden were asked the question his reply would certainly be that he would give no answer to any question of that kind at present.

SEAT OFFERED TO BORDEN.

Col. Hughes Said to be Willing to Retire.

Montreal, Nov. 8.—It is learned here on good authority that Col. Sam Hughes, member elect for Victoria-Haliburton, has offered, providing his electors consent to retire in favor of R. L. Borden.

In an interview published in the Herald with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the latter expresses his willingness, should the Conservatives allow Aylesworth to be elected by acclamation in Gaspe, to even up by consenting to the return of Borden for some Conservative constituency also by acclamation. It is quite likely that this will be the result.

If a new leader was selected it would require a few years for the people of the country to get as well acquainted with him as they are with Borden today.

WINTER IN EARNEST.

Maritime Express Delayed by Snow—Sleighting at Campbellton.

ST. ANDREW'S MAN.

Murdered at Vancouver and His Body Found in Fraser River.

WAS LAST SEEN ALIVE ELECTION NIGHT.

Vancouver, Nov. 8.—The body of George Gilley, a pioneer citizen of New Westminster, was found in the Fraser river yesterday.

On Friday morning his hat was found on a wharf near a pool of blood, and a trail of blood led to the edge of the wharf.

Mr. Gilley was last seen alive on Thursday night, hearing the results of the elections.

The theory is that Gilley was murdered and his body thrown into the river.

George Gilley was a son of the late Geo. Gilley, sr., of St. Andrews, N.B. His parents have been dead some years and some of the family are living in St. Andrews now. A few years ago he went to Vancouver. He was over forty years of age.
