Ottawa, Nov. 8.—Over a thousand people attended the final state ball given by their excellencies at Government House last night. People were present from all the important centres of Canada. The consular corps were here in full force, including representatives of the United States, Russia, Germany, the Netherlands, France and Denmark.

Additional interest was imparted to the gathering by reason of the knighthood of Sir George A. Drummond by His Excellency under special warrant from His Majesty, also by special command of His Majesty the decoration of Companions of the Imperial Service Order was conferred on David Pottinger, manager of government railways, and A. A. Boucher assistant clerk of the senate.

HOBBIES.

Interesting Data of Their Value in the Wilds of Labrador.

Every man, especially in scantily settled regions like this, should have a hobby of some sort to occupy his mind. We lay all one Sunday in a dense fog in a small harbor on an uninhabited island, in which we had taken refuge in the foggy darkness of Saturday night. The unusual experience of so many hours of enforced rest made time hang almost heavily on our hands, and we whiled away the afternoon walk in collecting various shrubs and pressing them, and learning their names from one of the numerous books of reference which are published at prices within the reach of every one in these days. Most of these books contain excellent keys for classifying and naming any plant one finds, and the puzzle to the mind in some direction totally unconnected with one's daily work affords much more rest than time of mere idleness. Most of these guide books also, give one interesting legends attached to these various humble friends which beset our paths every time we go ashore. These not only interest the mind but furnish fresh sources of interest and conversation, where new topics are remarkable by their absence.

Take, for instance, the common Crowberry—common all over Newfoundland. Every one knows that this plant is a northern shrub which no cold is able to destroy, and yet how many have noticed the main reason why it can resist temperatures which would destroy most other common plants. (Phanerogams). The reason is that the leaves are rolled back on themselves, and the outer edges stuck together so that the breathing mouths of the leaves are covered up. In this way there is never any of that excessive evaporation which reduces the temperature so rapidly, and changes of temperature hardly affect it at all. Take again the common White Flower (Ledum Latifolium), or Labrador Tea. Why can it also resist the cold so well? Here the breathing mouths are protected by thick yellowish wool, so thick that one wonders that one has so often seen it and not noticed this peculiarity about it. The flowers we got here were really beautiful. The Marsh Holy Rose, called Andromeda, because it is said it resembles her as her feet were chained to the rock under water. With it is the Marsh Laurel—the small variety known as the Lambkill, which has been so fatal to goats in this country. Indeed, I found that some of the members of the crew were well aware of its properties, they having had a little experience in stock raising in that line in Conception Bay. A Slump in "Tipping."

A recent complaint has been made by a London railway porter to the effect that people do not now give "tips." In fact, he alleged, one shilling would cover the year's gratuities to be divided among six of his kind. A Daily News representative, for corroboration of the statement, yesterday obtained the views of an employee on a leading line.

"Things are pretty much the same as usual with us," said he, "that is to say, the summer is our golden harvest, and the winter a dull season. But otherwise it is, of course, chiefly a question of station. At Dover, for instance, and other places where people disembark, we are only paid 15s. 9d. per week, and are glad to get it, since it is reckoned to be one of our soft jobs, as we make a substantial addition out of gratuities. Wages in town are, however, higher, as the tipping is comparatively less; but even then I don't know how we should live if we didn't obtain something from the passengers. And I'm glad to say they spend just as much as ever they did in this way."

A waiter at a well-known restaurant also gave his opinion that there is no appreciable decrease in the tipping system—in England, at any rate.

"But in Lucerne and other continental places strict notices are put up that tipping the waiter is not allowed. Naturally we get paid more in such situations by the proprietor, but not so much more as to make it worth our while to dispense with the gratuity. In this country we get paid fairly well, and in addition double the wages by tips. Oh, no, it's not a custom likely to die out, I'm glad to say."

A tea-shop girl was equally emphatic on the subject.

"Although gratuities are forbidden, I may say our tips are none the less frequent on account of the notice—nor are the public less generous than they used to be. It is only the parsimonious old lady with the reticule who sneaks off taking advantage of such a prohibition.—London Daily News.

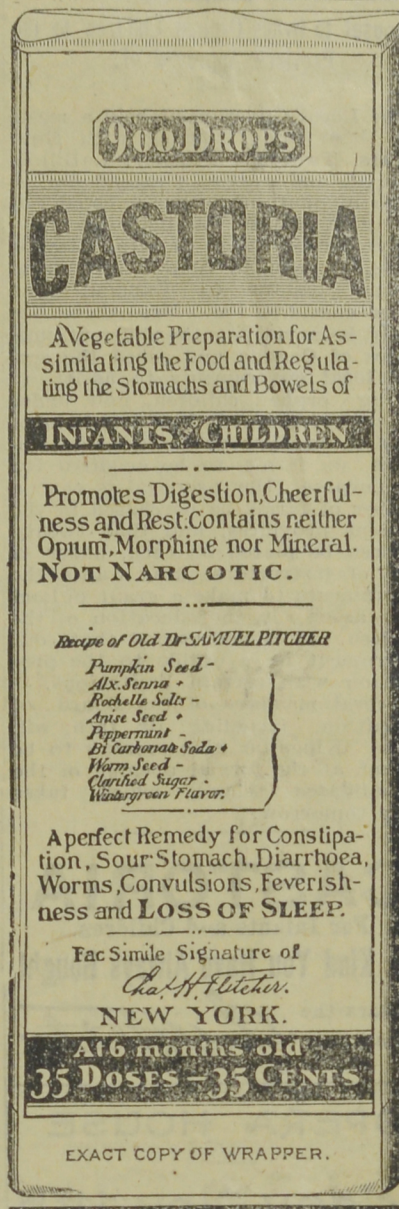

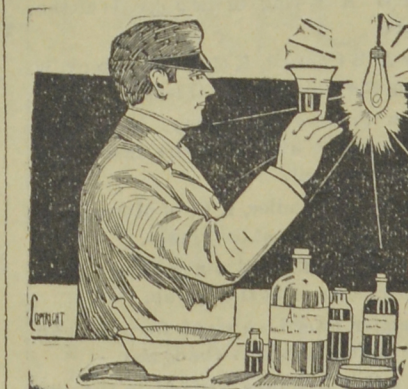

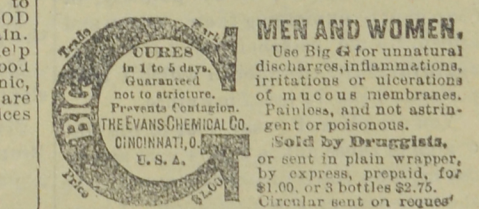
