Miss Cain's Death.

The death occurred at her home on Charlotte street last evening, after a lingering illness from consumption, of Miss Robert Cain, daughter of the late Mr. Thomas Cain. She was for several years employed in M. Fickler & Co's establishment, and had a large circle of friends and acquaintances by whom her untimely death will be sincerely deplored. She was twenty-three years of age, and is survived by her mother, two brothers John and Thomas, both of this city, and one sister, Miss Sarah Cain.

Mr. Brown's Appointment.

Mr. Gilmore Brown C. E., who has been in Kent County, for some time in connection with railway works, arrived in the city last evening. Mr. Brown, has accepted a position on the Grand Trunk Pacific Survey, which Rev. Dr. McLeod, recently characterized as a fake, and will leave tomorrow for Woodstock, to commence work. Mr. Brown will take charge of the party now working between Woodstock and Grand Falls. He expects the work to continue during the winter. Mr. Brown has had a lengthy experience in railway work and will be a valuable addition to the G. T. P. staff.

Dr. Gunter's Death.

Mr. Herbert V. Gunter of this city received a telegram ad Saturday notifying him of the sudden death at Camden, N. J., of his brother Dr. Guilford Gunter. No particulars were given, but the supposition is that heart failure was the cause. The deceased was a son of Mr. Samuel Gunter of Nashwaak, and was 46 years of age. He studied medicine in Philadelphia, and has been practising at Camden, for over twenty years. His surviving brothers are W. D. Gunter and Mr. Herbert Gunter of this city and Mr. Frank Gunter of Boiestown. Mr. Herbert Gunter left for Camden by last evening's train to attend the obsequies.

HOSPITAL TRUSTEES' MEETING.

Electric Power--Fire Alarm Whistle and Monthly Report.

At a meeting of the hospital trustees yesterday a delegation from the City Council, composed of Alds. Farrell, Stockford and Barbour, had an interview respecting the enlargement of electric power and dynamo placed in the water works station by the trustees. It is proposed to light all the city buildings by electricity, and it is understood the hospital authorities are quite willing to transfer their plant to the city upon equitable terms.

The discussion recently respecting the location of the fire alarm whistle prompted the trustees to represent to the fire committee, through a delegation, the annoyance and danger to patients at times, by the harsh whistle at the water works in such close proximity to the hospital. It seemed to be the opinion that for the present, at least, the city might try one whistle located on Carleton street for the whole city.

The secretary-treasurer's report respecting the receipts and expenditures for the month was very satisfactory, and the management of the hospital seems to afford encouragement to the trustees. For several months the wards and private rooms have been pretty full, and a number of private patients have been obliged to occupy beds in the public wards at different times. Three or four cases of diphtheria have lately occupied the Dowling, and general regret is felt that the nurse in attendance, Miss Sinclair, has contracted the disease. Through the assistance of Mrs. Whitehead and other friends and the help of the trustees all the corridors and some of the rooms have been painted and the appearance of the interior has been greatly improved.

THE LAW EXAMS.

Attorneys and Students Now Facing the Ordeal.

TODAY'S ELECTION.

Disorderly Demonstrations Witnessed at New York.

A HEAVY VOTE BEING POLLED.

Democrats Concede Massachusetts to Roosevelt but Expect to Carry Governor.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

New York, Nov. 8.—Almost perfect weather conditions prevailed in Greater New York, and early indications pointed to a heavy vote in today's election.

The polls opened at six o'clock, booths in many districts, were filled, and lines of men stood awaiting their turn to deposit a ballot.

While perfect order prevailed in most sections of the city, trouble began in some quarters almost at the start, and arrests for illegal voting began almost simultaneously with the opening of the polls.

In some cases arrests were accompanied by disorderly demonstrations, and at least two persons were injured in a few minutes.

Reports from all parts of the United States indicate that a large vote is being polled.

The Democrats concede Massachusetts to Roosevelt, by perhaps 60,000, but claim the election of William L. Douglas for governor. They estimate that Douglas will carry the city of Boston by over 20,000, and Judge Parker by about 13,000.

In Pennsylvania it is expected that the customary Republican majorities will be voted.

The Republican managers express the opinion that Roosevelt and Fairbanks will have a majority exceeding 300,000.
