Successes Continue to Japanese Arms.

THEY CAPTURED KAI CHOU AND ROUTED RUSSIANS AT TAKU SHAN.

Latter Blew Up Wrecked Cruiser

TO PREVENT SHIP FALLING INTO JAPS' HANDS.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

London May 21.—A despatch to the St. James Gazette from Kobe, Japan, dated today, after confirming that report of the stranding of the Russian protected cruiser Bogatyr, on the rocks near the entrance to Vladivostok, adds that the Bogatyr subsequently was blown up by the Russians to prevent her falling into the hands of the Japanese.

Another Go at Port Arthur.

London, May 21.—A despatch to the Japanese legation from Tokio, says Vice Admiral Togo has reported today as follows:—"The gun-boat squadron and the torpedo boat destroyers with torpedo boat flotillas, approached Port Arthur yesterday for the purpose of reconnoitering, which was successfully effected with little damage, in spite of a hot cross fire from the forts. There were no casualties on our side."

Japanese Victory.

Tokio, May 21.—The Japanese forces which landed at Taku Shan, Thursday, surrounded and routed a force of Russian cavalry at 7 o'clock Friday evening, in the neighborhood of Wang Chung, seven miles north of Taku Shan.

The Russian force, which consisted of about 1 squadron, lost many men killed or wounded, as well as a captain who was captured.

The Japanese sustained no losses.

Captured Kai Chou.

Tokio, May 21.—Although it has not been officially reported, it is said on good authority that the Japanese forces have captured Kai Chou, driving the Russians back to Tashi Chia, in the direction of New Chwang, and preventing the advance of the Russian troops at New Chwang in the direction of Kai Chou.

The bombardment by the Japanese of the vicinity of Kai Chou recently, was probably in preparation for the landing of the forces in the northwest corner of Liao Tung Peninsula for the purpose of capturing New Chwang and co-operating with the other armies in the march on Liao Yang.

Probably a small Japanese force has been landed at Kin Chou Bay.

Taku, where Japanese forces were landed May 19. It is at the mouth of the Bayan River west of the Yalu.

This Morning's Despatches.

Tokio, May 21.—Vice Admiral Togo's full report is as follows: "It is regrettable to have to report a third misfortune. At five o'clock Sunday morning I received a wireless message from Rear Admiral Dewa saying that on that day at five in the work of blocking Port Arthur, he encountered a dense fog north of the San Tung promontory. The Kasuga collided with the port stern of the Yoshino, which was sunk. Boats from the Kasuga saved ninety of her crew. The dense fog continues. This has been a most unfortunate day for our navy. While the fleet was watching the enemy off Port Arthur the Hatsuse struck one of the enemy's mines and her rudder was damaged. She sent a message for a ship to tow her which was being sent when another message brought the lamentable reports that the Hatsuse had struck another mine and immediately began to sink. The Hatsuse was then ten miles off Liao Te Shan promontory. No enemy but a mine or a submarine boat. The Hatsuse sank in thirty minutes, hundred officers and crew were saved. While sinking sixteen of the enemy's torpedo craft appeared and were driven off."

Japs Retreatd.

St. Petersburg, May 20.—The following despatch from General Kuropatkin to the Emperor, dated at Liao Yang, May 19, has been received here.

"A detachment of Cossacks engaged a detachment of the Japanese advance guard on May 18, north of Feng Wang Cheng, in a mountainous district. The fight began in the morning and lasted until 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon."

"The Japanese were successively dislodged from four positions, extending over 15 miles."

"The pursuit of the Japanese was stopped at Diantang. 13 miles north of Feng Wang Cheng."

"Our casualties were six Cossacks wounded, two horses killed and eight horses wounded."

To be Taken by Storm.

Chicago, May 21.—A special to the Daily News from Tokio says: Port Arthur is to be taken by storm the moment proper preparations have been completed. Siege guns have yet to be placed in position and the land forces appointed for the assault have to be strengthened. The unexpected loss of two fine vessels has emphasized the insecurity seapower and the authorities feel that no chances must be taken that would encourage Russia to send out the Baltic fleet counting on finding a harbor of refuge in Port Arthur. It is realized that the storming of the fortress will inevitably cost many lives, but it is said that the waters where the Japanese ships are forced to manoeuvre are becoming so dangerous because of floating mines that heroic measures are imperative.

TRANSFERS ORDERED.

Compromise Reached Between I. C. R. Authorities and Trainmen.

Moncton, May 21.—The conference of locomotive drivers and firemen with Mr. Joughins, was resumed yesterday and the following compromises arrived at: one driver to be transferred from Cape Breton to Truro; one driver from Cape Breton to Moncton; one driver from Stellarton to Campbellton, and two drivers from Stellarton to Moncton. These compromises to be submitted to the different lodges and receive their approval.

Speeches were delivered by E. M. McDonald M. P. P., of Pictou N.S., and J. T. Hawke of Moncton, who interested themselves at the request of the men.
