CLEVERLY 'LAID OUT BY MR. ROCHE OF HALIFAX.

Amusing Incident in House of Commons.

The tedium of the Wednesday afternoon session of the House of Commons at Ottawa, was relieved by several passages at arms.

When Sir Wilfrid moved that the House adjourn over Empire Day, Col. Sam Hughes suggested that the races might be better seen if the House adjourned on Thursday night, but Sir Wilfrid disclaimed, amid laughter, that he was thinking of such things.

The opposition made a good deal of government statements that the G. T. P. contract must be adopted or rejected in its entirety, and they wanted to know what was the use of wasting time in considering the bill clause by clause. Why not vote on it en bloc? Mr. Bennett said this doctrine would turn parliament into an electoral college. In the course of his remarks he had occasion to refer to Mr. R. L. Borden, and he called him the "member for Halifax," omitting the prefix "senior."

Mr. Roche, the junior member for Halifax, asked to whom he referred. Mr. Bennett came back with the assertion that he meant the leader of the opposition, not the member who was not known outside his own bailiwick.

Mr. Wade's remarks as to the extension of the Grand Trunk Pacific to the Maritime Provinces were taken by the opposition to mean that the said provinces were bound to get a part of whatever expenditure was going.

When Mr. Roche got a chance, he replied with interest. If he was not known outside his bailiwick, he was at least, respected in the old city where he was born, and if his reputation ever became malodorous, he would resign, and he hoped the member for Simcoe was altogether likewise. It was rather a habit of some members to represent the Maritime Provinces as being up for bargain

NEW DEPARTURE IN POLITICS.

Members of Parliament will Discuss the G. T. Pacific in Glengarry.

Cornwall, May 20.—The Glengarry men who are behind the formation of an independent kilted corps in Glengarry, have brought about a new departure in Canadian political annals and have secured four prominent members of parliament to participate in a debate upon the Grand Trunk Pacific, under the auspices of and for the benefit of the proposed Glengarry Highland Companies. This debate will take place on the Agricultural grounds, Alexandria, on Saturday, June 11. The speakers on the government side will be Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick, minister of justice, and F. C. Wade M. P., for Annapolis, N. S., while Messrs. F. D. Monk, M. P. for Jacques Cartier, and E. F. Clarke, M. P. Toronto, will appear for the opposition. It is expected that these gentlemen will be accompanied by other members of the Commons and Senate. The following Highland Senators will also be specially invited to be present: W. J. Macdonald (B. C.); R. W. Scott (Ont.), Wm. Macdonald (N. S.), A. A. Macdonald (P. E. I.); Donald Ferguson (P. E. I.); David MacKeen (N. S.); Robert MacKay (Que.); James E. Robertson (P. E. I.); and James D. MacGregor (N. S.).

After an address of welcome read by J. T. Schell, M. P. for Glengarry, the visitors will be entertained at a luncheon in Alexander Hall.

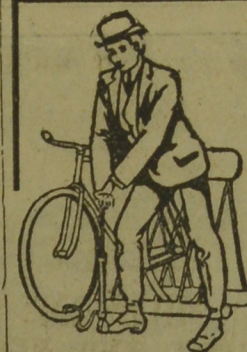

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FETED AT WORLD'S FAIR.

Canadian Press Men Entertained and Received by President of World's Press Parliament.

St. Louis, Mo., May 19.—A brilliant reception was given in the Canadian pavilion at the World's Fair yesterday by the Canadian Commissioner to the Canadian and Quebec Press Associations and Canadian Ticket Agents Association. In spite of rain over 300 invited guests were present. They were received by Sir Hugh Gilzean Reid, president of the World's Press Parliament; William Hutchinson, commissioner from Canada; Mr. W. A. Burns, assistant Canadian commissioner, and W. White, inspector of immigration for the Dominion of Canada. The programme included addresses by Sir Hugh Gilzean Reid, E. J. B. Pense, Joseph P. Downey and Major Hugh

Clark, members of Ontario Legislature; and John A. Cooper, president of the Canadian Press Association. Mr. C. Price Green of Toronto sang "Soldiers of the King." Mrs. Fenetta Sargent Haskell recited, and a Canadian orchestra played airs typical of Canada. After the programme luncheon was served in the dining hall. Many distinguished Canadians were present, including John F. MacKay, business manager of the Toronto Globe; J. S. Brierley Montreal Herald; H. R. Charlton, J. D. McDonald, and H. G. Elliott, officials of the Grand Trunk line, and W. K. McNaught, president of the Canadian Industrial Exposition, of Toronto.
