

TIGHTENING COIL.

Japs Moving Slowly but Steadily on Mukden.

PROBABILITY OF FURTHER RUSSIAN RETREAT.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Mukden, Sept. 24.—The Japanese continue their advance northward with extreme slowness.

General Kuroki's headquarters is close to Pensi, about forty-five miles east of Liao Yang.

Junks are coming up the Liao river regularly with supplies for the Japanese.

The return of Lieut. General Rennekampf to the command of the cavalry division has been signalized by renewed activity on the part of the Russians.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES.

London, Sept. 24.—Secrecy veils the movements of the Japanese armies in Manchuria and little that is indicative of developments in the situation is permitted to reach the correspondents. Apparently four Japanese armies are converging upon Mukden, but although the distance to be covered is not great, several days are expected to elapse before there ensues a battle with the forces under General Kuropatkin. Improvement in the weather conditions is regarded as advantageous to the Japanese.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 24, 2.45 a.m.—The absence of detailed reports from the seat of war, despite the important character of events that are believed to be developing around Mukden, leads to the supposition that General Kuropatkin may, after all, not seriously contest the Japanese advance, and that the long-expected battle at Mukden may turn out to be merely a rearguard action upon a large scale.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 23, 6.26 p.m.—A brief telegram was received today from Lieut. General Sakharoff announcing the advancing of the Japanese from Bentsiaputze on the village near Fu Pass, east of Mukden, and the site of the imperial tombs, which is likely to revive the fears expressed at Peking that an engagement may be fought at the burial place of the Manchu dynasty. No mention is made of resistance to the advance, but it is not believed this indicates that the Russians do not intend to further oppose the march of the Japanese on Mukden. It probably signifies that the Japanese force is using the small road to Fu Pass, between the highways leading to Mukden and Fushun, with the intention of isolating the Russian columns guarding the latter.

The Japanese are still trying to turn General Kuropatkin's left flank, but there is no indication of their moving west of the Hun River. Simintin is still held by the Cossacks.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 23.—A despatch received here today from Mukden gives details of the Japanese positions as follows:

General Kurokin has concentrated army with Bentsiaputze and Bensihu as its radius, and his advance is pushing forward along the road leading to Fushun and Fu Pass. The advance forces of the other two armies occupy the Yentai mine, the village of Yentai and Sandenu. The front of these three armies is protected by an outpost screen, which Chinese are not allowed to pass. A small Japanese detachment is moving along the left bank of the Liao River in order to protect junks.

The same despatch reports that bandits are openly siding with the Japanese.

The weather at Mukden is rainy and windy and cold has prematurely set in.

Liberal Demonstration.

Montreal, Sept. 24.—It is announced that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will address a mass meeting of Liberals at Sorel next Wednesday afternoon. A great crowd is expected to go down from Montreal, and excursions by rail and steamboat have been arranged. Other excursions will be run from various points. Mayor Paradis of Sorel is interesting himself in the meeting, which, he says, promises to be the greatest ever held in the district.

TORY RETIRES.

Mr. Glendenning Afraid to face the Music in South Oxford.

Woodstock, Ont., Sept. 24.—South Oxford Conservatives are without a

candidate. Mr. Glendenning, who was nominated by them some time ago, having decided not to remain in the field. (South Oxford is represented in the House of Commons by Sir Richard Cartwright, whose majority in the last election was away up in the hundreds.)

COL. LAKE COMING.

New Chief of Staff Sails for Canada Oct. 13.

London, Sept. 24.—General Lake, who is to take the post of chief staff of the Canadian militia, has arranged to sail for Canada on the Ionian on October 13th.

He will be accompanied by a staff and servants, who will sail on the same vessel.

(Col. Lake will be warmly welcomed in Canada. He served very acceptably in this country some years ago as quartermaster general, and his mother is a native of Quebec.)

SUCCEEDED AT LAST.

Widow of Grand Trunk Agent Awarded Heavy Damages for Death of Her Husband.

Toronto, Sept. 24.—The case of Haickley, agent of the Grand Trunk Railway, which had been in court for two years, was concluded in the assize yesterday, when the jury awarded the plaintiff, Mrs. Mary. Ann Haickley, \$5,000 damages.

On November 19, 1901, William Haickley, of Stouffville, was killed by a G. T. R. train. His widow brought action for damages, but was non-suited at the first trial. The case was carried to practically all the courts in Canada.

POACHER CAPTURED.

Yankee Fishing Steamer Taken Redhanded in British Columbia.

Vancouver, Sept. 24.—The American steamer Albert of Bellingham, with two scows and fishing gear, was confiscated at Oyster river, Vancouver Island, by the Dominion government fishing cruiser Ruth. This is the first fishery poacher ever caught in British Columbia.

According to Captain Brown, of the Ruth, the Albert was taken redhanded.

Steamship Libelled.

Montreal, Sept. 24.—Hon. Clifford Sifton has made a seizure on the Canadian liner Lake Simcoe for \$126,000, the amount incurred by the company through the escape of the Syrians who were committed to the charge of the officers.

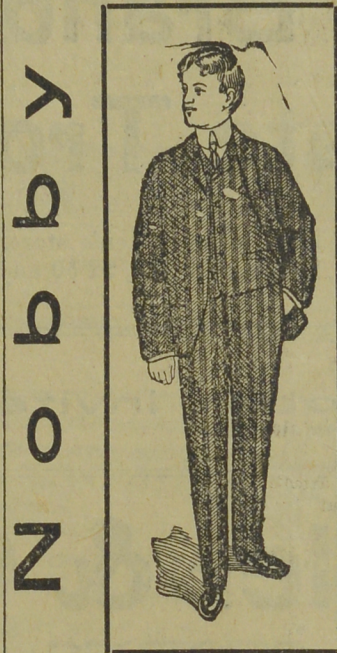
