THE WAR SITUATION.

Such fighting as may now or may for some days have been going on in Manchuria, outside the Kwantung Peninsula, must be merely of the kind of which Napoleon declared that our Revolutionary War entirely consisted, that is to say, "affairs of outposts." Port Arthur is the storm centre, and the attack and defence of it, which must be looked for shortly, even if they have not already begun, are not only the main but the only considerable operations now in progress. The Japanese on their part, are concerned to see that of "hands off" in dealing with the Gen. Oke's army has an assurance garrison. Only in the very unlikely event of the Russian commander's undertaking a march of relief to the southward would they have any other duty than that of observation. But the observation is very close and minute on both sides, and may well give rise every day to encounters which can be called only "affairs," and which can have no decisive influence on the campaign.

The fate of Port Arthur is expected, at Tokio, and everywhere else outside of Russia, to have such an influence. When the fortress falls the most important of the immediate military results will be the liberation of Gen. Oku's second army to assist the first in the beleaguering of Gen. Kiropatkin. The united Japanese forces will so far outnumber him that his retreat northward seems to be a foregone conclusion. That retreat the Japanese will of course make as difficult and disastrous as possible. But it is unlikely that they can prevent it by surrounding him or that they will follow it beyond a point at which their own lines of retreat and supply will cease to be entirely secure. That retreat would probably mark the ending of the campaign, and, according to the hopes of Tokio, the ending of the war. There is a chance that the Russian General feels himself strong enough to risk a battle with the first Japanese army before it is reinforced and while the second army is still busily engaged at the end of the peninsula. But it seems that if Gen. Kuropatkin were willing to run this risk he would have run it already. In any event, after his very Fabian policy thus far, the adoption of it now would appear to be a counsel of desperation. Meanwhile, all military operations in Manchuria seems to be suspended for news from Port Arthur.

If a corrupt strengthening of itself in power had been the aim of the government, would it not have chosen the very principles of public construction and public operation which are being urged upon it by the opposition? Would not this have been the way to surround itself by forces and interests whose fidelity would be guaranteed by the hope of vast pickings which might be expected in an expenditure in the neighborhood of a hundred millions or more?—Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Here almost in a single telling phrase, we get one of the most obnoxious features of the government ownership principle—the practically unlimited field it would open for corruption and spoliation of the resources of the nation.

His Worship the Mayor hooked the largest sea trout but had the misfortune to lose it after it had run out seventy-five yards of line. He is confident that it would weigh at least ten pounds.

A YORK CO. LADY

Appointed Superintendent of a Leading Hospital in the South.

It is a notable fact that of late years a considerable number of natives of York County, by reason of energy and ability have pushed their way into leading positions in different parts of the United States. Among those who have recently achieved distinction is Miss Marjorie Taylor of Harvey Station, who last month was appointed superintendent of the John Seely Hospital and training school for nurses at Galveston, Texas. This hospital is in connection with the University of Texas and is one of the largest and best hospitals in the south. Miss Taylor has been chemical instructor and assistant superintendent in the hospital for some time and on the chief position becoming vacant received the appointment and entered upon her new duties on June 1. The appointment coming by way of promotion, manifests the confidence reposed in her by the University board. Previous to going to Galveston, Miss Taylor was superintendent of nurses in an hospital at Denver, Colorado. She studied for the nursing profession in the training school of the University of Pennsylvania and graduating from that institution three and a half years ago. She formerly taught school in this province and was one of the graduates of the Normal School at Fredericton in 1892. A sister, Miss Annie Taylor, is also in the nursing profession and occupies a lucrative position in Boston.
