Class of '04 a Studious Lot of Young Men and Women.

AND A CREDIT TO THEIR ALMA MATER.

Fredericton High School's Creditable Contribution.

Once more the graduation bells are heard from college hill, and the chimes are echoed by the footsteps of the class of '04, as they pass out from their Alma Mater forever.

The faces which have formed a part of Fredericton's personnel for four short years will now be found in other places. The class, which goes out is a large one, in fact the largest in the history of that centre of culture which stands in quiet grandeur upon its lofty hill.

Twenty-seven students have passed out from our midst. Of this number four are civil engineers, two electrical engineers and twenty hold up the honor of the arts course, which is the oldest and brightest star in the crown of old U. N. B. One of our students has taken a special course in arts.

It is no exaggeration to say that the students of this class are good scholars and have been an honor to the college which stands so close to the heart of each one. Seven ladies are numbered in this class, and for this reason if for no other, we think the class should certainly be proud.

Of this number seven are Methodists, seven are Baptists, six Presbyterians, four Church of England, and three Free Baptists. But one student in the class takes the honor classics course. Two students graduate with honors in mathematics and mathematical physics; one took his honors in experimental physics and chemistry; six graduated with economic and philosophy honors, while six more take a distinction philosophy course; two students have taken distinction English while a large majority have taken advantage of the practical psychological work.

One feature of this class must be especially pleasing to the teaching staff of the high school, as well as to the people of Fredericton in general.

Eleven of the twenty-seven graduates are former pupils of the Fredericton High School. This certainly

speaks well for their teachers, particularly since five of this number are graduating with honors.

A large majority of the class are active workers in the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A., and have done much good to the college students. The debating society, as in fact all the college societies, have received a liberal support from the class of '04.

It is with deep regret that we part with them, and as the various members go out they carry with them the best wishes of the people of Fredericton.

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Nickel Indications in New Ontario.

The mineral discoveries in the belt along the new Temiskaming Railway, which have led the Government to remove the land from sale or lease, are nickeliferous. Some of the ores are unlike any that have hitherto been found in quantity in this Province. For instance, the mineral niccolite, otherwise known as kupfer-nickel, which contains about 44 per cent. of nickel, and which up to the present has furnished cabinet specimens only, has been discovered in what, judging from surface indications, seems to be commercial quantities. A cobalt-nickel ore has also been found resembling smaltite and carrying, according to one assay 6 per cent. of nickel and 18 per cent. of cobalt. Both the niccolite and smaltite are rich in arsenic, the former carrying 56 per cent., and the latter up to 72 per cent.

In addition to these, native silver occurs, some exceedingly handsome specimens of which have been found. The value of these discoveries, if they turn out to be extensive, can be realized by a comparison with the famous Sudbury deposits. In Sudbury 3 per cent. of nickel in the ore is the average, and 5 per cent. is exceedingly rich. In the new discoveries the ore carries 44 per cent. of nickel. A much smaller body of nickel, therefore, in Temiskaming will constitute a mine than in the nickeliferous pyrrhotite region of Sudbury.

Where the Jews Are.

Prof. Haman, of Basel, an authority on the subject, has lately printed a paper dealing with the geographical distribution of the Jews. He says the total number of Jews is 10,000,000 of whom two-thirds are in Europe. Russia has 5,500,000; Austria-Hungary, 1,860,000; Germany, 568,000; Roumania, 300,000, and Great Britain, 200,630. The United States has 1,000,000; Asia has 250,000; Africa, 270,000, and Australia, 17,000. He says that not less than 200,000 Jews embraced the Christian religion in the nineteenth century.
