EARLS AND DIDN'T KNOW IT.

How the House of Courtenay Lost Title for 300 Years.

The death is announced at Powderham Castle, near Exeter, of the thirteenth Earl of Devon, in his ninety-third year. The late Earl, who was prebendary of Exeter Cathedral and rector of Powderham, succeeded his nephew in the Earldom in 1891.

The house of Courtenay, to which the Earl belonged, dates back to a very early period, and members of the family have for centuries been associated with the history of the country. The existing branch was founded by Sir Philip Courtenay of Powderham Castle, who received the honor of knighthood from Edward the Black Prince the day before the battle of Navaret in Spain.

One branch of the Courtenays were Counts of Odesa, and another became allied to the royal family of France. In England the Courtenays have been allied to the Bonvilles, Bohuns, Spencers, St. Johns, Talbots, Veres and royal house of Plantagenet.

With the city of Exeter the family has always been closely associated, and in olden times there were stout struggles for privileges between the Earls of Devon and the Mayors of the city.

Few, if any, titles in the peerage have been, for long periods of their history, involved in more mystery and doubt than that of the Earls of Devon.

For several hundreds of years the heads of the house of Courtenay were Earls without being aware of it. Indeed, so far were they from being acquainted with the dignity that should have been theirs that they accepted baronetcies and viscounties, and were proud to hold them.

After three centuries had passed, however, an astute lawyer discovered the patent among some old records, and found that there were two missing words, "de corpore," usually inserted in patents.

The discovery meant that the Earldom could be inherited by collateral heirs, and a Courtenay in 1831, after a hard fight, established his right to sit among his peers. The peerage he recovered was the one created by Queen Mary.

Five times the Earldom has been supposed to be extinct. Four of its holders have been attainted and four beheaded.

Queen Mary revived the Earldom in favor of Edward Courtenay, who, in the previous reign, when only twelve years of age, was committed prisoner to the Tower. He was released when only twenty-eight years old, and he died at Padua of poison.

FAMOUS INVENTOR DEAD.

Straight Pull Rifle James P. Lee's Great Triumph.

James P. Lee, whose death took place at New Haven, Conn., recently was spending the winter there, and it was not generally known in Galt that he was seriously ill. The distinguished inventor only returned to Galt five years ago, after a long residence in the United States and Europe. His name will be inseparably connected with the improvements in small arms, his inventions being the basis of most of the recently-adopted weapons.

He was born in Hawick, Scotland, and came to Galt with his father, George Lee, when a boy of five years. Apprenticed to his father, he became an expert watchmaker, but, being an ardent sportsman, he early became interested in firearms. When at Janesville, Wis., in 1854, he first began his study of guns, bringing out an idea he did not perfect for many years later, when it appeared in the Lee straight pull rifle, which was first used in active service during the Spanish-American war.

The first magazine gun which Mr. Lee invented was purchased for the American navy, where it has been in use ever since. In the seventies Mr. Lee went into the manufacture of sides carbines and sporting rifles in Milwaukee, and later had his inventions handled by the Remington Arms Company.

In the early eighties he went to England and laid his rifle before the British army authorities, who took it up and furnished the whole army with Lee-Metfords. The Government afterwards adopted a new bore for the rifle barrel, changing the name of the weapon to the Lee-Enfield.

Mr. Lee was 73 years of age, and had been a sufferer from an accident which befell him when a youth. By the accidental discharge of a gun he was shot in the heel, and he carried many of the grains for over 50 years, until the discovery of the X-ray machine.

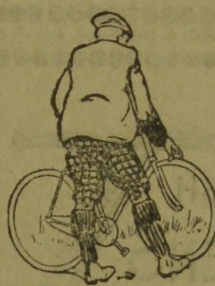
Retains Youth's Enthusiasm.

Field Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood, says The London Chronicle, still retains the enthusiasm of youth. He beats youngsters at tennis; and in the season is among the best mounted riders in the Row. Sir Evelyn has always loved horses, and one of his griefs in leaving England for the Egyptian campaign of 1883 was the death of his brown pony Pussie on the very day of his departure. Pussie, whose years then numbered 34, was a survivor perhaps the last of his race) of the Crimean war. Wood, when a midshipman, had bought him for £8, and never had a better bargain; for once when he was carrying Lord Raglan's despatches to the naval camp he lost his way, and but for the right lead of Pussie would have found himself within the Russian lines. Another accomplishment associated less frequently than good horsemanship with a soldier is Sir Evelyn's. He is the most facile of letter-writers. During one arduous campaign, which lasted 450 days, his total post-bag to family and friends at home numbered 450—a letter a day.

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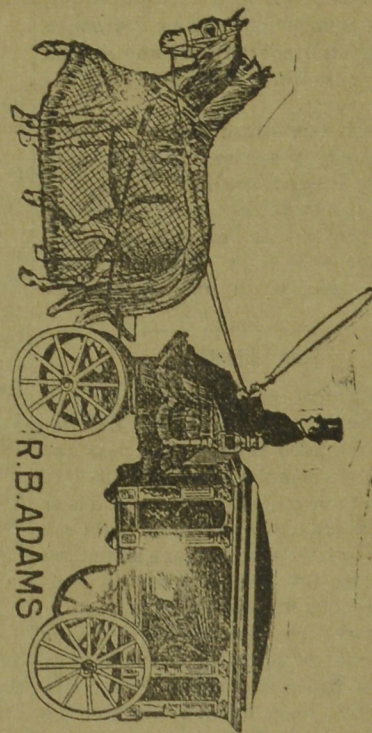
