Installed a Lighting Plant.

The Scott Lumber Company have installed an incandescent lighting plant at the Victoria Mill and tested it for the first time last night, when it was found to work very satisfactorily. Commencing on Monday the mill will be kept running day and night for the balance of the season. At present a crew of seventy-five men are employed and it will be necessary to double this number in the near future. At present the mill is cutting about thirty joints of lumber a day.

DEATH OF JOSEPH MURRAY.

Well Known West End Citizen Called Away.

Mr. Joseph Murray, a well known citizen, died at his home on Queen street last night from heart trouble, aged 73. He had been in failing health for some time and his death was not a surprise to his family and friends. The deceased was a son of the late Joseph Murray of Springhill, but has resided here for many years. He is survived by a widow and family of three sons and two daughters. He also leaves four brothers, Conn. John C. and Thomas Murray of Kingsclear, Christopher Murray of the Isle of Wight, George Murray of St. John, and two sisters, Mrs. Stratton of Kingsclear and Miss Murray of this city. William H. Murray, the well known St. John lumberman, is a cousin of the deceased.

The funeral will take place from the homestead on Monday afternoon at two o'clock. The remains will be taken to Springhill for interment, and Rev. H. Montgomery will conduct services in St. Peter's church at that place. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

LED A WILD LIFE.

But Died Surrounded by Comforts of Domesticity.

A few days ago a fine bull moose entered the barn yard of Mr. Jas. McGivney of Nashwaak Bridge, and there laid down and died. Mr. McGivney had seen the animal previously about his pasture and late in the evening he noticed it jumping the fence into the barnyard. In the morning the animal was still there lying down and apparently having no use of its hind legs. It was unable to rise and died before noon. The moose was in fine condition and the cause of its death would be difficult to tell. It is hardly probable that it hurt itself jumping the fence; more likely it had been pursued by dogs and was worn out, or perhaps it felt death approaching through age and chose the barn rather than the surroundings of its wild life.

AN UNFORTUNATE YOUTH.

Fraser Smith of Marysville, Meets with Another Bad Accident.

Fraser Smith, about ten years of age and son of Albert Smith of Marysville, had a bad accident and narrow escape from death last night. He was carrying water to the night gang at the lath mill, his road being along the trestle work over which the lumber cars pass. He met a car and stepped aside to let it pass, but at this point it fell over taking the boy with it to the ground twelve feet below. The lad's head was quite badly cut and his leg broken below the knee. Dr. H. H. McNally is attending him and does not think he has internal injuries. The boy the same leg broken a few months ago.
