

A WAR SCARE.

Sensational Telegrams From Gibraltar.

ALLEGED THAT BRITISH GARRISON AND FLEET

Are Cleared for Action.

BRITISH WARSHIPS PATROLLING STRAITS--NO OFFICIAL CONFIR- MATION AT LONDON.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Gibraltar, Nov. 1.—The garrison has been mobilized and the artillerymen have been ordered to take up their positions at the different galleries of the rock.

The channel squadron has been ordered to be in readiness at a moment's notice.

Vigo, Spain, Nov. 1.—The Russian squadron left Vigo at 8 o'clock this morning.

They were followed by a Spanish battleship.

Gibraltar, Nov. 1.—Vice Admiral Beresford's flagship, the battleship Caesar, has just fired a gun recalling all the officers of the channel squadron on board their respective ships.

All the ships are cleared for action. British warships strictly patrolled the straits all night long. They intercepted a collier, the London, British bound from Barry for Port Said, and brought her in here at noon.

Vigo, Spain, Nov. 1.—Heavy firing was heard in the offing this morning. It was attributed to artillery practice.

London, Nov. 1.—Up to 2 o'clock this afternoon no explanation was obtainable of the sensational despatches from Gibraltar, announcing the mobilization of the garrison there, etc., but they had the effect of starting rumors of a hitch in the negotiations between Great Britain and Russia for a final settlement of the North Sea incident.

London, Nov. 1.—There is no explanation yet of the apparently alarming telegram from Gibraltar, but at the admiralty the moves of the warships there are stated to be in completion of plans for mobilization, although Gibraltar says the mobilization terminated Sunday.

There appears to have been some conflict in the orders issued to the fleets owing to the sudden changes in the diplomatic situation, which may possibly account for the fleet's movements.

Both at the foreign office and at the Russian embassy it is positively stated that there is no hitch in the negotiations except Russian failure to notify the British government of the names of the officers detached from the Russian squadron.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

Man Killed on the I. C. R. Track in Cumberland.

LIBERAL CANDIDATE IN CHARLOTTE.

Montreal Tells a Story of Dan Gilmor.

Montreal, Oct. 31.—There is considerable interest in Montreal in the election contest in Charlotte, N. B., where Daniel Gilmor, one of the most highly esteemed business men of

this city, is contesting his native constituency. Mr. Gilmor has a reputation for high ideals and is honored for his integrity in the business world. While his shrewdness, integrity and hard work have won him success in life, he is one of the most unpretentious, agreeable, friendly men one would care to meet. An incident came to light quite accidentally a few months ago which added greatly to his popularity. The church of which he is an active member was considerably embarrassed by the fact that the holders of an overdue mortgage of \$16,000 on the property were threatening foreclosure. It was a well known fact that the holders were very anxious to secure the site, which was one of the best in the city. The church has very few moneyed men, and the trustees were considerably exercised over the matter. Finally Mr. Gilmor came forward with the proposition to advance the necessary money to pay the mortgage on conditions which were most advantageous to the church, but made the proviso that his name should not be made public in connection with the matter. The agreement was carried out and the church, which has a New Brunswick pastor, is today one of the most progressive churches in the city, and through the generosity of Mr. Gilmor able to do aggressive work untrammelled by financial difficulties.

THE OLD STORY

Seven Year Old Boy Victim of a Shoot- ing Accident.

A shooting accident, which might be attended with serious results, occurred this afternoon at the home of Mr. Matthew Jarvis, Phoenix square. It appears that he and two other boys were playing with a 22 calibre revolver, and accidentally discharged the weapon, the bullet entering Kenneth's cheek half an inch below the eye.

The unfortunate boy was at once removed to the Victoria hospital, and Dr. Vanwart is now endeavoring to extract the bullet. The wound is a serious one, but not believed to be dangerous, though as yet it is difficult to tell what the outcome will be.

The weapon when discharged was in the hands of Robin Jarvis, a grandson of Matthew Jarvis, who was about a yard distant from Kenneth. He claims that he did not know it was loaded.

OFF THE TRACK.

C. P. R. Express West Ran Into Open Switch

AT OXFORD JUNCTION.

Both Engines Badly Injured But Nobody Hurt.

AN UNLUCKY ENGINE.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Moncton, Nov. 1.—The C. P. R. express west, No. 25, was wrecked this morning at Oxford Junction.

Conductor Milligan was in charge, with Driver McCully at the throttle.

The express had orders to cross Fowle's special freight at Oxford Junction. The freight took the siding and when the express came along at good speed it ran into an open switch and rushed head on into the engine on the freight.

Driver McLeod was on the engine on Fowle's special, and the remarkable part of the accident is that no one was injured.

The engines on both trains were badly broken up and the baggage car on the C. P. R. badly damaged.

Another peculiar feature of the accident is that engine 239, on the wrecked C. P. R. is in reality an unlucky engine. On this engine Driver Trider of Moncton went to his death at Belmont, and Driver Wall was killed on her at the Windsor Junction wreck.

No. 239 also ran off at Humphrey's a few months ago and delayed traffic during one Sunday. Today's was her first trip after repairs in the shops.

Traffic was not delayed much by today's accident. The Ocean Limited from Halifax was delayed forty minutes.
