THE WAR IN THE EAST.

The public will be very careful hereafter to accept news of the war as authentic if it comes through Russian channels, even though it be declared official. The Russians have evidently started in to deceive, and their campaign falsehoods are all the more reprehensible if given the cloak of official sanction.

That yarn about four Japanese battle ships sunk at Port Arthur, was manufactured to order, and the evidence of its falsity is furnished even in the subsequent despatches from Russian sources. Up to the present time it is not believed that any Japanese warships has suffered serious damage from the Czar's ships or batteries, while the Russian navy has been badly crippled in the Port Arthur and Chemulpo engagements.

The Japanese are attempting at Port Arthur that which Hobson and his men sought to do at Santiago, and it is altogether likely that they will be successful in bottling up what is left of the Russian navy at that point. The Spaniards were bold enough to seek escape from Santiago when they discovered the American effort to seal the harbor, but the Russians at Port Arthur evidently have not sufficient energy to engage in so active a measure as that.

The Japanese naval successes have flushed the nation with pride and pluck, and when the land forces meet we may anticipate at least in the opening battles similar glory for the Japanese arms.

The gentlemen, who it is said, will establish a Liberal daily newspaper in St. John, to take the place of the one that rattled a few months ago, are receiving much advice against engaging in such an enterprise, but the suggestions do not come from disinterested sources. Some of the newspapers already in existence in St. John are foremost against the project, but that should not deter the Liberal gentlemen from proceeding with their enterprise. The Liberals were very severely handicapped in the recent election by the absence of a morning newspaper, and a part of their evening newspaper support was of a very passive character.

The Tory Chatham World rather leans to Mr. Tarte's side in the Quebec Tory quarrel between that gentleman and Mr. Monk. The World observes that Monk is a very fine man but is not as able a general as Tarte. This probably means that Tarte conducts election campaigns by other means than prayers, while Monk depends more on arguments and principle for success. There is no doubt Tarte's methods appeal more forcibly to the Tories, but they are disappointed with the results of his campaign in St. James and Hochelaga. They should not blame Tarte so severely however; perhaps his protectionist friends did not put up enough stuff.

Some months ago Rev. Clarence McKinnon, Presbyterian clergyman at Sydney, N. S., on a \$1,600 salary, declined a call to a Chicago church which offered a stipend of \$6,000. Mr. McKinnon was warmly commended in sections of the press for his self-effacement. It was a very tempting offer, but not sufficient to lure him to life under a foreign flag. The Chicago situation however, has been accepted by Rev. Dr. Morrison of St. John, where he received a \$2,500 salary. Dr. Morrison is a very clever preacher, in middle life. He is a native of Quebec, and his departure from St. John is very much lamented by his congregation.

It is said that an order in council has been passed at Ottawa appointing Mr. John L. Carleton, of St. John, judge of the county court, in Charlotte, Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska. The salary is \$2,400 with \$200 allowance for travel. Mr. Carleton, who is well and favorably known all over the province, is 45 years old, a native of St. John and a prominent figure in social, political and circles in that city. He has plenty of ability for his new position, and his numerous friends will unite with the Herald in extending hearty congratulations to him on his preferment.

A prominent physician of the city has congratulated the Herald on last night's article with respect to the great need of improvement in the sanitary condition of Fredericton. He declared that in all his practice he had never at any one period encountered so many cases of typhoid as exist at the present moment. There is something radically wrong, and it is the duty of the citizens to seek a remedy. We cannot afford to ignore the fact that a disease directly traceable to insanitary conditions is laying its devastating hand on the people.

Hon. D. C. Fraser has taken his seat on the supreme court bench at Halifax, the court being in session hearing appeals. The "Guysboro giant," after his exciting political experience extending over a quarter of a century, will find the business of the appeal court rather dull, and his duties on circuit will be more to his taste. Judge Fraser likes to mingle with the people, hear good stories and tell them, and we fancy that in the various shire towns of the sister province his periodical visits to hold court will be very welcome.

It is said that Mr. Belcourt, M. P., for Ottawa will be the new speaker of the House of Commons vacated by the resignation of Hon. L. P. Brodeur to become a cabinet minister, and that Mr. Chambers, a Montreal newspaper man has a good chance for appointment as Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod.

King Edward has lost his biggest subject, not his biggest brained one, but the man of the greatest physical bulk in his kingdom. The deceased was Thomas Lingley, of Dover, who was six feet one inch in height, and weighed over 600 pounds.

Flour which sold in this city a few weeks ago for \$4.75 has gone up to \$6.25 with the possibility of a further jump to \$7 per barrel. The funny man of the Montreal Herald says the rise is due to the war in the (y)east.
