#### THAT CANNING FACTORY.

May Come to Sussex, But Lack of Interest  
on Part of Farmers May Prevent  
it—a Meeting Needed.

(Sussex Record.)

G. W. Hoegg, of Fredericton, has been in Sussex the past week endeavoring to interest the farmers of this locality in a canning factory which he is thinking of starting here.

In his canvass of the field Mr. Hoegg has met with but scant encouragement from the very people who would be most benefitted by him locating here, the farmers. Judging from the reputation which Sussex has as the headcentre for progressive agriculture, he thought that farmers here would be anxious to encourage such an industry.

Although somewhat disappointed with the indifference shown, Messrs. Hoegg have not yet given up hope of eventually operating at Sussex. They have had communications from Hampton and Bellefleur Station asking them to locate there and it is just possible that they

may do so unless the farmers of Sussex give them more encouragement in the way of contracts for the raising of corn, peas and tomatoes.

The D. W. Hoegg Co., of which Mr. G. W. Hoegg is manager, are now operating a canning factory at Woodstock. It was in the hope of getting their business located in a more southern locality where early frosts would be avoided, and where they had reason to believe the farmers would welcome such an industry that they decided to leave Woodstock and come to Sussex.

Since this decision, the farmers of Woodstock have urged them so strongly to remain there that they have decided to do so. Whether or not they come to Sussex rests with the farmers of this place.

The canning of vegetables such as these brings in millions of dollars to the farmers of the State of Maine, where it surpasses in importance the dairy industry. There is no reason why it should not occupy the same position here.

There should be a meeting of farmers and others interested at any early date for the purpose of talking the matter up before it is too late.

The canning industry is of too much importance to the place to be allowed to be lost to us through indifference. It is another of those industries such as we already have started in our cheese and butter factories and pork packing houses. They differ from the average industrial establishment in that the raw material is produced right at home.

These are the industries that do a country the most good.

We want this canning factory in Sussex.

A meeting of the farmers should be called to talk the matter up.
