

THE NEWS OF MONCTON.

Men Badly Assaulted and Robbed — Base Ball League — Accident.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Moncton, April 11.—Mr. Geo. Leamen, driver of one of the city teams was seriously injured by falling off a team. He was caught between the wheel and box and his head badly scratched and back injured.

At a meeting of the baseball teams last night a league was organized consisting of four teams. The teams are Trojans, Y. M. C. A., Franklins and Thistles. Max Casey, employed in the I. C. R. blacksmith shop, was assaulted and robbed near Hall's Creek bridge, Thursday night, and a sum of money was taken from him. He was terribly beaten about the face and head. This is the second outrage within a few days at this place. There is no clue to the perpetrators of the deed.

TWO MEN KILLED.

Rock Slide Struck C. P. R. Train With Fatal Effect.

Winnipeg, April 9.—A C. P. R. freight train on the main line west of Griffith Lake, and about 20 miles west of Revelstoke, was struck by a rock slide early today, the engine and first four cars were overturned and two men, the forward brakeman and fireman were killed. When the rock slide came the engineer saw it, and sliding out of the cab windows escaped unhurt. The train was going up a stiff grade at the time.

MARYSVILLE NEWS.

Hard to Keep Sport Alive in the Cotton Town—Too Much Bickering—The Hockey Difficulty.

April 9.—It seems too bad that our little town is unable to conduct sport in an upright manly way as do other towns throughout New Brunswick. Marysville contains some excellent sporting material that can hold their own against all comers, but it seems that they can not conduct good clean sport without getting into a big fight.

At one time the young men of Marysville had a splendid base ball nine on the field, which was a credit to any town; they also had a first class curling club, which could hold their own against any club in the lower province, and last spring they organized a rifle club which was rapidly coming to the front, when a grievance arose, as has been the case in reference to all sporting organizations gotten up in Marysville for the benefit and pleasure of the sporting community.

Last but not least, there is the Crescent hockey team, which is certainly one of the strongest in the maritime provinces, and they too are having a war in their own (hitherto peaceful) camp, which if it keeps up will be the means of putting out of existence forever the most popular indoor sport, as far as Marysville and Fredericton are concerned that has ever been played in this part of the country. The sporting public would like to know why is all this unnecessary uproar. Is it jealousy, conceit or ugliness, or what under the sun is the trouble?

How is it that other towns and cities can conduct clean, manly sport year after year without ever having a grievance, while in Marysville there is nearly always a kick when any sport is started. In any community outside of Marysville, there is never a dissenting voice against such sport, while in the case of our town you will always find a kicker who is ready and willing to expose all private matters in connection with the sporting element. The latest story about relates to the grievance between the first and second hockey teams. It appears that a young man belonging to the second team is somewhat riled because he did not receive the same amount of pay for playing a few games of

hockey as the boys did who had played all winter. The young man in question must be looking for newspaper notoriety, as he threatens to charge all the first team boys with professionalism because a little surplus has been divided among them. The young man has not taken into consideration the fact that the hockey boys have lost considerable time and spent large amounts of money to maintain their club the past winter to keep in line with the other teams in the Provincial League. It is too bad that one man should forget himself as to divulge all private dealings between the members of his team for the sake of a few dollars, especially when it is the means of killing forever such a popular and paying sport as hockey has been.

Death of William Winn.

Mr. William Winn, one of Fredericton's old residents, died at his home on Charlotte street yesterday afternoon. The deceased, who was 69 years of age, resided in this city all his life and was well and favorably known. He leaves two sons, Messrs. Wonderful Carving.

In a museum attached to two almshouses at Kirkleatham, near Redcar, erected in 1876 by Sir William Turner Knight, Lord Mayor of London, is a wonderful carving of St. George and the Dragon out of a single block of boxwood, the work of a poor prisoner, and it is valued at £2,000. It is said that this piece of carving was the cause of a wager being once laid in a dispute as to its entirety. To prove that the work was one single piece of carving it was plunged into a pot of boiling oil and allowed to remain for hours. All doubts were set at rest when it was withdrawn and found to be still complete. The prisoner who accomplished this marvelous piece of work used an ordinary penknife only.
