SHOT DOWN AND KILLED.

Prominent Illinois Barrister and Politician Assassinated at His Office Door.

THE MURDERER ESCAPED—MOTIVES FOR THE CRIME.

New York, May 23.—(Special)—A special to the Herald from Savannah Ill., says:—Daniel S. Berry, a prominent attorney and republican, was shot and instantly killed by an unidentified assassin while entering his office this morning.

Two bullets from a revolver entered his body, one passing through the head and a second lodging in his arm.

The murderer escaped. Several theories are advanced, revenge being the motive ascribed in two of them.

The crime was committed during the busiest hour of the morning on one of the business blocks in the heart of the city.

Mr. Berry was unlocking the door of his office when the murderer slipped up behind him and fired.

The sound of the shots was heard in the street, but little attention was paid to them, until two telephone girls ran to the front windows and began screaming for assistance. The telephone operators saw the body lying on the floor.

Mr. Berry was a member of the 39th General Assembly of Illinois, being one of four men in control of the house during the bitterest sessions in the history of that body. He was one of the most active politicians in the state, 54 years old and a native of this state.

AN ATTEMPTED BURGLARY.

In the Suburbs of Moncton—Mounted Policeman to the Rescue of Frightened Household.

Moncton, May 23.—(Special)—Burglars attempted to effect an entrance to the residence of S. B. Leblanc, at Legere's Corner, last night, but their presence in the house was discovered and they were frightened away.

About twelve o'clock Mr. Leblanc was aroused by a noise in the basement and soon became aware that some person had effected an entrance

below. He heard a signal from outside the house and the party in the cellar made his escape before Leblanc could get down stairs.

Leblanc telephoned to town for the police and a mounted officer was given his first gallop to the outskirts of the city. Although quickly on the scene the burglars escaped.

Suspicion rests on local parties seen at Legere's Corner.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Proceedings of the Opening Meeting—Officers Chosen for Ensuing Year.

The annual meeting of the York County Sunday School Association, opened in the Free Baptist church last evening. President Osborne occupied the chair and there was a large attendance, the church being crowded to its utmost capacity.

There was a fair attendance of delegates from the county, most of the parishes being represented. The presence of Rev. Dr. Bachman, Prof. Brower, and the Field Secretary, Rev. J. B. Ganong, lent additional interest to the proceedings.

After devotional exercises, and a short musical program had been carried out, Rev. Mr. Backman was introduced and entertained the gathering for upwards of an hour. His subject was "you save the child, you save the world," and he handled it in a masterly manner, imparting much valuable advice to Sunday school workers. He dwelt upon the importance of teachers having a thorough knowledge of the Bible, without which they could not teach successfully, no matter what their other qualifications might be. He thought it a most important matter to attract the attention of the pupils and hold it. There was a good deal to be said about methods and motives. A preacher who preaches for his salary or because he cannot do anything else, is a very poor preacher. The same would apply to the Sunday school teacher. It would be a good thing if Sunday school workers could have an angel from God analyze their movements. There should be a determination on the part of Sunday school workers to be in their places rain or shine and do their best work for Christ. It is important that teachers should have vision and be able to estimate the worth of their pupils. There may be bright boys in Fredericton who have never had an invitation to attend a Sabbath school. He hoped the convention would be an inspiration to all Sabbath school workers

and would result in greater work being done for the Master.

A vocal solo by Prof. Brower and the benediction by Rev. J. H. MacDonald, brought the meeting to a close.

McGINN ELECTED ALDERMAN.

Beat Out His Opponent in Yesterday's Contest by a Majority of 64.

The bye-election to fill the vacant aldermanic seat for St. Ann's Ward was held yesterday, and resulted in the return of Mr. W. H. McGinn by the substantial majority of sixty-four votes. It was the most keenly contested bye-election ever held in the city, and the great interest taken by the citizens was manifested in the exceptionally large vote polled. At the city hall poll no less than 413 ballots were cast, and the number at the court house was 317, making a total of 730, just 145 less than at the general election two months ago.

Mr. McGinn led his opponent by 107 at the court house poll, while in the up town district, where both candidates reside, he was in a minority of 43. It cannot be said that the result of the contest was a great surprise, as it was generally felt after the Opera House meeting on Saturday evening that Mr. McGinn would be a winner. The canvass was not directed against Mr. Walker, but against the council, and seems to have been quite effective. Mr. Walker put up a clean, manly fight, and has no reason to be ashamed of the showing made by him when all the circumstances are considered. There was no personal animosity aroused between the candidates, and they met and swapped ballots shortly after the polls opened.

The polls closed at four o'clock, and half an hour later the city clerk gave out the returns in the council chamber, and declared Mr. McGinn elected.

ALD. ELECT McGINN, who was greeted with rousing cheers, briefly addressed the assembled electors. He said it was the proudest moment of his life and words failed to express his gratitude. He felt he had fought the mayor and whole board of aldermen and had come out victorious. He was proud of the result for his father's and mother's sake, because his character had been vindicated since he left the electric light station. It was said that a faithful servant was deserving of promotion, and he had been promoted to the position of alderman. He had

challenged the mayor and council to meet him in the Opera House, but they had not the manliness to put in an appearance. If there was a spark of manhood left in them they would tender their resignation. They did not have the manliness to say before his face what they had said behind his back. He could promise to closely scrutinize every department, and do his best to guard the people's interests. He knew something about the electric light department, and promised to give it his closest attention. He had nothing to say against his opponent, who had been obliged to shoulder the blunder of the city council. He (McGinn) had voted for him, and felt that under other circumstances he might have won a victory. (Cheers.)

CANDIDATE WALKER, in response to loud calls, briefly addressed the gathering. He said that it was quite evident that he had been prosecuted for the sins of the present council. If he had received his just dues, he certainly would have been elected. He had served the city in the council for some years and was not ashamed of his record. He promised to be on deck again at the next election. He was not responsible for Mr. McGinn's grievance against the council, and had, therefore, been surprised at the attitude of some of his friends. He had won three elections in the city, and hoped to win another in the future. While glad to have the confidence of those connected with the banking institutions, he wished to give a denial to the canvass that he was the candidate of the People's Bank. The reason that he did not go to the Opera House on Saturday evening was because he felt that he had nothing to do with Mr. McGinn's trouble with the council. He was a candidate because he took an interest in the city, and was anxious to serve it. He would be in the field at the next election, and hoped then to win a victory. In conclusion he returned thanks to those who had supported him, and resumed his seat amidst applause.

In the evening Ald. Elect McGinn was serenaded by the Fredericton Brass Band, and the small boys lighted a huge bon-fire in front of his residence on Charlotte Street. Mr. McGinn, after making a speech, reciprocated the kindness of the band boys by entertaining them to supper at Lindsay's restaurant.

WANT GOVERNMENT AID

In Bringing Out Middlemore Children.

Moncton, N. B., May 23.—Frank A. Gerow, superintendent of the Middlemore Home, came from Halifax yesterday and met a committee of the local government composed of Hon. C. H. LaBille, chief commissioner of public works, and Hon. F. J. Sweeney, surveyor general, and placed before them his scheme of settling immigrant children in New Brunswick.

These juveniles would be brought from the Middlemore Home, England, and the government of New Brunswick would be asked to pay \$3 per head. The superintendent would place the children and look after their welfare till they reach the age of eighteen without further cost to the province.

The Middlemore Home was established in 1827 by John T. Middlemore, M. P., for North Birmingham; 3,444 children have been settled in Canada from it at a cost of \$500,000, all collected in the old country, except \$2 per head paid by the Dominion government.

Between 700 and 800 have been placed in New Brunswick. The children brought to Canada have lost their parents or belong to poor ones. Any juvenile that does not turn out satisfactory is returned to England at the home's expense. One hundred and thirty juvenile immigrants are expected at Halifax during the second week in June.

The committee will report to the next meeting of the executive council.
