

AGREED TO ASSIGNMENT.

Creditors of T. H. Lloyd Accepted His Offer.

Newmarket Lawyer's Financial Position Probed—Statement of His Affairs.

Liabilities	\$57,776
Secured Claims	17,576
Unsecured claims	40,200

Newmarket, Ont., May 19.—After the above statement of his financial position was endorsed by a meeting of his creditors this afternoon, Thomas Hiram Lloyd, the barrister, who was placed under arrest on the charge of refusing to account for trust funds, announced that he would make an assignment tomorrow morning. Mr. Lloyd intends to give up possession of everything he has. His assets have been placed at \$7,900, and Lloyd's friends are confident that his estate will pay at least 50 cents on the dollar to the unsecured creditors, whose claims amount to \$40,200. It is expected that the amount of the liabilities will reach \$60,000 before the effect of the action to be taken tomorrow will have on the criminal charge, which comes up in the police court on Monday, is not known, but the defendant's friends with the consent of the Crown, hope for a withdrawal. Benjamin Fairbairn, one of the executors of the estate of David Weddell, would not say what his future course might be.

HARMONY AMONG CREDITORS.

With the exception of a few pointed questions put by Maurice Foster regarding a reported settlement with Silas Toole, and a criticism by Barrister T. J. Robertson of Messrs. W. C. Widdifield and H. S. Cane's joint valuation of the Lloyd assets, everything passed off quietly. Mr. Robertson was the third member of the special committee appointed last Monday to ascertain Mr. Lloyd's financial position. Messrs. Cane and Widdifield thought \$37,900 would correctly estimate his assets.

Mr. Robertson made the amount \$6,000 less.

The two gentlemen pleaded that they had arrived at a fair valuation whereupon Barrister Ed Meek from Toronto suggested that some of Lloyd's friends go a step further and make a definite offer of, say 20 cents on the dollar and reimburse themselves from the sale of the assets.

Mr. Cane, who presided, pointed out that nobody could be found to make an offer when the estate was in such a muddle. By proper handling a satisfactory settlement could be made in time. Barrister T. H. Lennox of Aurora, offered to take the new library and pay \$1,000 in cash.

After the matter had been fully discussed Mr. C. C. Webb suggested

that Mr. Lloyd make an assignment to a trustee, who could be assisted in handling the estate by a committee of three. There was no objection, and the chairman, Mr. Cane, chosen assignee and the following the committee: Messrs. C. C. Webb, Benjamin Fairbairn and Jos. Cody. Mr. Fairbairn is one of the executors who caused Mr. Lloyd's arrest, and it needed a lot of persuasion to get him to act. At the statutory meeting of creditors which will follow Lloyd's assignment tomorrow these three gentlemen will probably be named as inspectors. An effort was made to get more signatories that in return for an assignment, the signing away of his wife's dower, the creditors shall not take any further criminal proceedings. Silas Toole, who had a claim of \$3,500, and protested against the assignment last Monday, was not present. Lloyd executed a transfer of the mortgage on the Wilfrid Pegg property, which seemed satisfactory. Benjamin Fairbairn, who was also in favor of an investigation into Lloyd's finances, only watched the proceedings today.

LLOYD'S FINANCIAL POSITION.

The report of the committee was as follows:—Assets—\$37,900, as follows: I. O. F. claim, \$10,000; Sovereign Bank building, \$12,500; liveable stable, \$2,500; vacant lot north of bank, \$1,000; three houses, Main street, \$2,500; cottage, Pine street, \$500; mill property, \$900; forty acre farm, \$4,000; seventy acre farm, Mrs. Lloyd's, \$3,000; law library, \$1,000; total, \$37,900.

Lloyd also tendered a \$5,000 twenty-pay life policy on which \$1,320 had been paid and \$400 borrowed. There were two other policies of no present value.

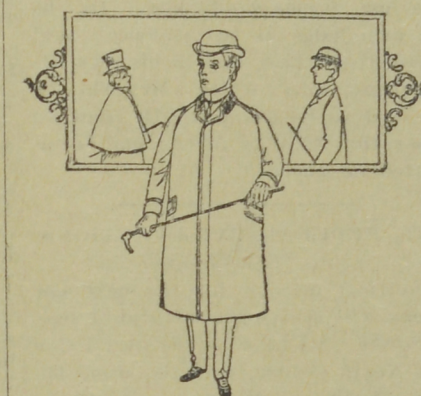

ASSIST THE EMPIRE.

Colonies Should Contribute to Imperial Defence.

London, May 22.—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach was the guest of the Imperial Industries Club last night. Hon. Hayes Fisher, M. P., who was in the chair, thought it was time the colonies gave serious assistance to the defence of the empire. This view was also held by Sir John Colomb and Sir Frank Swettenham, who invited the self-governing colonies to consider the liberality of the Crown colonies in this matter. Imperial defence, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach said had been responsible for the increasingly involved condition of the finances of the United Kingdom. He was deeply convinced that the growing expenditure was due chiefly to the army and navy, and would soon become intolerable. The colonies having become nations, it was right that they should bear the burden of self-defence. He thought it a mistaken view that the colonies should supply their own navies rather than to contribute to the mother country.

but the admission of representatives of self-governing colonies to the councils of the empire was essential. There were enormous difficulties, however, in the way of political union. He thought the question of contributions should form the one chief topic of the next conference.

BIG IRRIGATION CANAL.

Steam Shovels Digging at the Rate of Ten Tons a Minute.

Calgary, May 22.—Four miles down the river, southeast of this city, the C. P. R. irrigation department is hewing a huge gash through the country by means of tremendous mechanical appliances. At one place two big steam shovels are tearing away the bluff at the rate of ten tons a minute. A railroad has been constructed up to that point and a long line of cars are constantly being loaded to be moved further east where the earth is used for the fills. These great digging machines are the acme of perfection in their lines and with two men touching levers the vast steel shovel rips into the bank every minute cutting out a hole large enough to swallow a small house.

The dirt is scooped up and by another pressure of the hand the whole mass is dumped into the waiting cars. The work is carried on faster than a man could dig a single spadeful into the ground. In an incredibly short time a long line of cars are loaded and the train sent puffing across the prairie.

Close by the steam shovels a new loading machine is scooping out the bed of the canal, and wagons in a long line are driven along by its side and loaded in two or three minutes. Further on an army of men with scrapers and teams are constructing the big ditch, and the tents and shacks that shelter the workers resemble a small village.

The work is going on over a vast space and teams and machinery have been unloaded at Gleichen to take up the work there. It is difficult to conceive the magnitude of this work. The United States government has recently published a considerable report on the undertaking and experts from Washington have visited the scene.

The soil through which the colossal ditch passes is a rich black loam, and is more fertile than the average fertilized garden. It is an ideal section for small or large farms.

A SIX YEAR OLD HERO.

How Little Eric Williams Saved His Sister.

Fort Frances, May 22.—A remarkable case of heroism and presence of mind occurred here last night, when Eric Williams, son of Mr. H. Williams, merchant, saved his little sister Agnes from drowning.
