A RECONSTRUCTED GOVERNMENT.

Hon. Arthur Drysdale Succeeds Judge Longley as Attorney General of Nova Scotia.

AND HON. W. T. PIPES TAKES PORTFOLIO OF MINES AND WORKS.

Halifax, June 28.—(Special.)—Hon. W. T. Pipes, of Amherst, has been appointed to the portfolio of commissioner of works and mines for Nova Scotia.

Hon. Arthur Drysdale, who held the position, has been appointed attorney general of Nova Scotia in place of Hon. J. W. Longley, who has received a supreme court judgeship.

Mr. Pipes, who is at present a member of the legislative council, was premier for a few months in 1882-83, but relinquished the position to Hon. Mr. Fielding. He retired from political life, taking the office of judge of probates in Cumberland, but a few years ago entered

the legislative council and became a member of the legislative council, without portfolio. He is a very able man, and an eloquent and aggressive speaker. It will be necessary for him to find a seat in the assembly.

Hon. Arthur Drysdale, the new attorney general, is a native of Colchester, a Halifax lawyer and represents Hants in the assembly. He has been in political life since 1891, and commissioner of works and mines for some five or six years. He is 48 years old, and a clever lawyer and politician.

An early dissolution of the legislature and a general election is expected.

THREE CRIMINAL INDICTMENTS.

Supreme Court at Yarmouth has Important Business Before it.

TRUE BITLS FOUND IN ALL THE CASES.

Yarmouth, N. S., June 28.—(Special.)—The supreme court opened here today, Justice Meagher presiding.

The first case presented to the grand jury was that of Chas. Langford, a deaf mute, who two months ago, attempted a criminal assault upon a young lady, near Tusket. A true bill was brought in, the man was placed in the box, and through an interpreter pleaded guilty. His Lordship explained to the jury the cases of T.W. Johns, and Win.

Perry, the former charged with sending to the government monthly returns of the position of the bank of Yarmouth which were wilfully misleading and the latter with the theft of several thousand dollars short in cash. True bills were found in both cases.

The teller is seriously ill, and it is not at all likely he will be tried at this or any other term, many believing he will not recover.

RUSSIAN MUTINEERS

Have Possession of Big Battle Ship—Murdered Officers and Threaten to Bombard Odessa.

Odessa, June 28.—(Special.)—The crew of a Russian battleship in the roads mutinied and murdered all the officers and threaten now to bomb-

ard the town. Excitement is intense, as the mutineers have complete possession of one of the largest ships heavily armed.

UNMARKED LOGS SOLD WELL.

Annual Sale of the Fredericton Boom Company Very Successful.

The Fredericton Boom Company's annual sale of unmarked logs took place at the office of A. F. Randolph & Sons this forenoon, and was very successful. Among those present were W. H. Murray, Charles Miller, Henry Hillyard, Fred D. Miles, Fred Sawyer, E. L. Jewett, St. John; Fred Pond, T. D. Dabbitt, Arthur Sawell, Gibson; W. P. Hanbury, St. Marys; P. Glasier, M.P.P., Lincoln; John A. Morrison, T. Lynch, John Kilburn, Edward Moore, A. E. Hanson, John A. Morrison, Jacob Hazelton, A.H.F. Randolph and others, Fredericton.

Mr. A. H. F. Randolph, who had charge of the sale, stated that the logs to be sold would include all the unmarked lumber to come through the booms this season, and would be subject to the freighter's charges. He read a statement showing the amount already rafted to be as follows:

Pine—194 pieces, containing 12,590 feet.
Hemlock—459 pieces, containing 46,390 feet.
Cedar—2246 pieces, containing 74,150 feet.

Spruce, no mark—8,353 pieces, containing 133,420 feet of merchantable, 254,099 of battons and 53,970 of condemned; also 1,336 pieces of mixed mark, containing 16,728 feet of merchantable, 46,992 of battons and 5,096 of condemned, a grand total of 500,305 feet.

The bidding was lively from the start, and the several kinds of lumber brought high prices.

The spruce was purchased by Mr. Charles Miller for \$14.30 per thousand. He also bid in the hemlock for \$4.80. John A. Morrison bought the cedar for \$6.90 and the pine was knocked down to George A. Perry for \$12.15.

Three hundred thousand feet of cedar belonging to the Estey estate, 171,520 feet of which has already been rafted, was sold to Mr. W. H. Murray at \$8.05.

Mr. F. B. Edgcombe offered for sale three million feet of the McConnell logs, but withdrew them after they had been bid up to \$12.10 per thousand.
