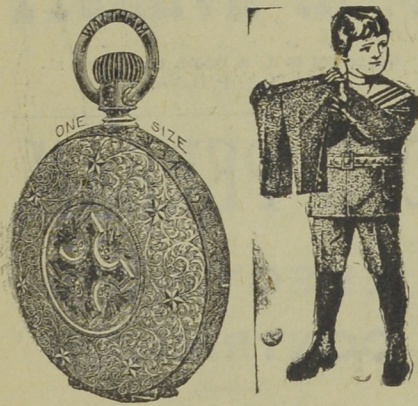

## NEW BRUNSWICK LEGISLATURE.

### Governor Snowball Assented to a Number of Bills on Saturday.

AND MANY OTHERS PASSED COMMITTEE STAGE OF THE HOUSE.

In the legislature Saturday the bill in amendment of the Health Act was agreed to. It does away with the necessity of having at least one physician on local boards of health.

At 4 o'clock the lieutenant-governor came to the House and assented to the following bills:

To authorize the sale of certain leasehold property in the city of St. John held in trust as a Home for Fallen Women.

To constitute the parishes of Gordon and Lorne, in the county of Victoria, as a police district, and to appoint a stipendiary or police magistrate for said district.

In relation to the registration and identification of motor vehicles and the use of the public highways by such vehicles.

To authorize the board of school trustees of the town of Saint Andrews to issue debentures.

In amendment of the act 57th Victoria, Chapter 61, entitled an act to incorporate Gibson village for water and fire purposes.

An act relating to the incorporation of First Church of Christ Scientist, St. John, N. B.

Relating to the appointment of assessors of taxes in the city of St. John.

To amend the Act 1, Edward VII., Chapter 71, entitled an act to empower certain of the inhabitants of the parish of Richibucto to assess themselves for lighting purposes.

To empower the ratepayers of the village of Rexton to assess themselves for lighting purposes.

In amendment of Chapter 49 of the Consolidated Statutes, 1903, respecting the University of New Brunswick.

To authorize exemption from taxation the Canada Woodenware Co., Ltd.

Respecting the Caraqueet Railway Co.

To amend Chapter 170 of the Consolidated Statutes, 1903, respecting rates and taxes, so far as it relates to the several parishes in the city and county of St. John.

In amendment of the towns incorporation act.

To amend act 62 Victoria, Chap-

ter 57, an act respecting water supply and fire protection for the village of St. Marys, county of York.

Relating to the city of Moncton.

In addition to and in amendment of the schools act.

Respecting life and accident insurance.

In further amendment of the act incorporating the president and directors of the home for aged females in the city of St. John.

Relating to the construction and inspection of buildings within certain limits in the city of Fredericton.

To amend the act incorporating the Maine and New Brunswick Electrical Power Co., Limited.

Relating to the town of Chatham.

To authorize the town council of the town of Milltown to provide a system of water works for said town.

To incorporate the East Florenceville Water Co.

For the protection of persons employed in factories.

To amend Chapter 53 of the Consolidated Statutes, 1903, respecting public health.

Hon. Mr. Hill moved a resolution against the adoption by the federal authorities of certain recommendations of the fishery commission, which he declared would destroy the sardine herring fishery of Passamaquoddy Bay, and after speeches by Mr. Clarke and Mr. Hartt it was carried unanimously.

The following bills were agreed to: Relating to the election of trustees of the First Moncton Baptist church.

To authorize the minister of the Union church in Calais to solemnize marriage.

Relating to rates and taxes in the city of Fredericton.

To provide for a stipendiary magistrate in the parish of Johnston, in the parish of Queens county.

To enable the Rev. Richard Sloggett to solemnize marriages.

Further amending the law relating to the town of Campbellton.

Bill to amend the probate court act.

## APPLE GROWING IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

### The Subject Threshed Out Before a Committee of the Legislature.

The agricultural committee met this morning and discussed apple growing pretty thoroughly. The matter was introduced by Hon. Mr. Farris, who spoke of the illustration orchards. These orchards comprise two acres in some instances, in others two orchards of one acre are planted in a county. Last year orchards were started at Buctouche, Sussex, Jubilee, St. John, Waweg, Florenceville, New Jerusalem and Upper Sheffield. This spring it is the intention to set out orchards at Clair Station, St. Leonard's, Andover, New Denmark, Queensbury, North Tetagouche, Chatham, Doaktown, Golden Grove, and Chipman.

Varieties of apples that have proven successful in this province are grown and in the early years of the orchard, and while the apple trees are maturing, plum trees are grown on the same ground. It is also intended to plant half an acre as an orchard in connection with the Consolidated School at Kingston.

Secretary Peters gave information in detail as to the methods pursued in setting out the orchards and caring for them afterwards. The owner of the ground enters into an agreement with the department for ten years and at the end of that time the orchard becomes his property and he has whatever fruit is raised in the meantime.

Hon. Mr. Farris also read a letter from John Doherty, proprietor of the Campbellton grist mill, in which Mr. Doherty stated that the statements made about his not catering to the public and not serving his customers right were not true.

Hon. Mr. LaBelle said that the question of wheat growing was an important one on the north shore, where little is done in the dairy line. He moved a resolution that during recess the Department of Agriculture take into consideration some system of furnishing seed wheat to the farmers through the Agricultural Societies, which resolution was unanimously adopted. The chief commissioner also thought it would be wise if the department would start an illustration orchard on Heron Island, in Gloucester county.

## MARYSVILLE NEWS.

A meeting of the Marysville Rifle Club has been called for at seven o'clock, next Thursday evening at the I.C.R. station, and all the members are requested to be present as business of great importance will be brought before the club, such as electing officers and to draw up the rules and enlist members for the coming season. Rifle shooting has become very popular among the young men and the prospects for a good time at the butts this summer are the brightest.

The saw mill and the lath mill both started this morning, and if men are plentiful enough they intend running at nights, while the water is in good shape for so doing.

The members of the Mission Band intend holding a parlor concert about Easter, and they are working hard to make it a success. It will likely be held at the residence of Mayor Gibson.

E. H. Cochrane, of Fredericton. There will be a late train in order to bring the Marysville people home who will attend the show at the opera house.
