HEARTY SEND-OFF.

Mr. W. P. Taylor Honored on Eve of His Departure for the West.

PLEASANT GATHERING IN THE CITY COUNCIL CHAMBER.

Presented With Gold Watch, Chain and Locket.

A ROUND OF ELOQUENT SPEECHES FOLLOWED THE PRESENTATION.

Mr. William P. Taylor, the popular young barrister, who is to remove to Calgary, N. W. T., to accept a lucrative position with the legal firm of Loughheed, Bennett & Allison, was yesterday afternoon waited upon by a number of friends and presented with a farewell address, accompanied by a solid gold watch with chain and locket attached. It was a most fitting tribute of respect and esteem to a deserving young man, whose departure from this city is keenly regretted on all sides.

The presentation was made in the city council chamber by His Worship Mayor Palmer, in the presence of a number of representative citizens. Before reading the address His Worship took occasion to express his personal regret at the loss of so worthy a citizen as Mr. Taylor, but was pleased to know that he was to remain a citizen of Canada. He assured Mr. Taylor that he would carry with him to the west the best wishes of the entire community, and all would watch his career with interest and expectation. He then read the following address:

To William Pentlowe Taylor, barrister at law,

Dear Sir,—Before removing from this city to take up your profession in western Canada, a few of your friends desire to affirm their good will towards you and to recognize, in a fitting way, the place you occupy in their esteem.

Likewise they desire to place on record their appreciation of the fact that, of your own industry and ability, you have, after securing a liberal education, attained, at a comparatively early age, an enviable reputation as a sound lawyer, and this coupled with your record of integrity and fair dealing during your six years at the provincial bar, fully equips you for an honorable and successful career.

In wishing you continued prosperity and good health, it is with sincere regret at your departure, both because of the pleasant relations existing between you and us at all times and the realization of the loss to the community at large of an upright and progressive citizen. While in this your native place is the loser, we rejoice that another part of our great Dominion, upon which the eyes of the world is turned, is to gain. This, more especially, as the town of Calgary, to which you go, is already the home of brilliant New Brunswickers, with two of whom you are to be associated in the practice of your chosen profession.

Furthermore, they ask your acceptance of the accompanying token as a slight evidence of their past and continued regard for you.

The watch which accompanied the address is a Waltham imported especially for the occasion by Mr. F. E. Blackmer, jeweler. It is a 14 carat gold with open face. Mr. Taylor's monogram is neatly engraved on the outside of the case. The chain and locket are also of 14 carat gold and of very handsome design.

MR. TAYLOR'S REPLY.

Altogether visibly affected by the cordial manifestation of good will towards him, Mr. Taylor made a feeling and appreciative reply.

He said that he was not surprised at the action taken, as it had been intimated to him that something of the kind was about to take place.

He had no idea that his number of friends in the city where he had lived all his life, was so large. He had always endeavored to do what was right and fair to all parties. He had received kind consideration from many people and he did not think there was a gentleman present who had not befriended him in some way. He was about to remove to another part of Canada, and while he would, no doubt, make new friends they could never be the same to him as the old friends he was to leave behind in the good old city of Fredericton. He was afraid that the words of the address and the Mayor's remarks were altogether too flattering and that the citizens of Calgary would be disappointed in him. (Applause.)

Police Magistrate Marsh, the senior member of the Fredericton bar, was called upon by the Mayor and responded in a happy speech. He said he was pleased to hear of his young friend's advancement, but was sorry to find that he was about to leave the city. He had always found Mr. Taylor a young man of strictly temperate and moral habits, and an upright, straight-forward and honest lawyer. He had known him from his infancy, and he was in a position to say that few young men were possessed of a higher character and was more up to the standard in every respect. (Applause.)

Thomas H. Colter, registrar of deeds, testified to the friendship that had existed between himself and Mr. Taylor for several years, and wished to add his regrets to those of the gentleman who had just sat down. He felt that Fredericton was losing a fine young man, who, if he remained, would some day be called upon by the people to fill a higher position. The change he was about to make is for his own benefit, and, as much as his friends regretted it, they will always be glad to hear of his advancement in the west.

City Clerk McCready was very glad to be present to have the privilege of saying good-bye to Mr. Taylor. The number present did not represent the number of his friends by any means, but the committee having the matter in charge had to stop somewhere. It was most gratifying to him to know that Mr. Taylor was not leaving the Dominion of Canada and perhaps that is one reason why the action of his friends in doing him honor is so hearty and spontaneous. He was taking with him to the west the best capital a young man can take—character, ability and good health. (Applause.)

Mr. H. F. McLeod was glad to have an opportunity to express his appreciation of Mr. Taylor's worth as a legal practitioner and a man. He had not only known him in a professional way, but had met him on the fishing and hunting fields, and it was in such places that one came to know a man. Those who know Mr. Taylor will never have reason to be ashamed of him. No matter what success or wealth he may acquire in his new home, he will also be the same Mr. Taylor we have always known. Like other young men who have gone out from Fredericton to the very ends of the earth, he would always carry with him love for the good old elm shadowed city and beautiful river that flows past it to the sea. He was glad to be present to assist in honoring Mr. Taylor, but felt a sadness of heart to think that so worthy and lovable a young man was about to leave the city. (Applause.)

Mr. A. R. Slipp has been closely associated with Mr. Taylor in business for seven years, and has known him almost as a brother. He has found him ever honest and upright, and could, without hesitation, endorse all the good that had been said about him by previous speakers. No young man ever left the city with greater promise and a more unanimous wish for success on the part of those remaining behind. It would be a source of great encouragement to him to have a body of such representative citizens meet to do him honor. They could all heartily endorse what Col. Marsh had said in his kindly way. He had no doubt of Mr. Taylor's success in his new home. (Applause.)

Dr. Mullin regretted that Fredericton was to lose such a fine young man as Mr. Taylor, but it should be remembered that the city's loss was his gain. There was a great chance in the west for young men, and he was confident that Mr. Taylor would soon be shoulder to shoulder with other young men from this province who had won distinction in the west.

He was satisfied that the sentiments expressed by the several speakers were general throughout the city. He felt that Mr. Taylor would have greater opportunities in the western country, and he could bespeak for his rapid advancement and prosperity. (Applause.)

Ex-Ald. Joseph Walker said he was sorry the city was to lose Mr. Taylor, as a citizen. He had often embraced him and taken his measure in a business way, and knew him to be every inch a man. He felt certain that if he employed the same ability in the west that had characterized his labors in this country, the results would be greater. He was sure that prosperity awaited Mr. Taylor in the harvest fields of the golden west.

Dr. W. H. Irvine in a brief speech heartily endorsed what had been said concerning Mr. Taylor and wished him happiness and prosperity in the west.

The Mayor thought that after all the good things that had been said, Mr. Taylor could go away feeling that he was leaving a great many warm friends in the city of Fredericton.

The pleasant gathering was brought to a close with the singing of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow," and three hearty cheers and a tiger.

Mr. Taylor takes his departure for Calgary by the 5.50 train this evening, stopping a few days at Winnipeg while en route.

INVADER COULD NOT LAND.

Should Britain Temporarily Lose Command of Sea.

London, March 6.—In the House of Lords today Lord Ellenborough (Conservative) drew attention to the dangers to which the country might be exposed during the few hours preceding a declaration of war or the first few days of a contest if the government was unable to check the dissemination of news, and asked if the government would take steps to consider an alteration of the laws in connection therewith.

Lord Selborne, First Lord of the Admiralty, replying, said he knew of no law which could prevent the "baleful" dissemination of news. The most patriotic journalist might innocently jeopardize an issue. Parliament and the press might be urged to consider a remedy. Japan, Lord Selborne added, would not have succeeded as she had but for her power in suppressing news.

He said Lord Ellenborough had greatly exaggerated the danger of a surprise invasion and had underrated the difficulties which would confront an invader. A temporary loss of command of the sea from negligence or accident by Great Britain, would never enable an invader to land in this country. The whole experience of the existing war lent force to that conclusion.

Last Hours of the Eminent Conservative M. P.

HIS DEATH A GREAT SHOCK TO TORONTO PEOPLE.

(Toronto Globe.)

The city of Toronto lost one of the best known and beloved of its residents and Canada one of its foremost politicians by the sudden death Friday night of Mr. Edward F. Clarke, M. P. for Centre Toronto, 383 Markham street. His death, which was due to heart failure, was a cruel blow to the members of his family and a rude shock to an almost numberless circle of friends and acquaintances.

Mr. Clarke returned to Toronto from Ottawa on February 9, after having been confined to bed for ten days suffering from congestion of the lungs. He stood the journey very well and continued to improve until the 20th, when he developed pneumonia. It was a fairly sharp attack and for about five days the patient was very ill, but afterwards his improvement was rapid. His temperature became normal on Tuesday last, and he made such excellent progress that Dr. F. N. G. Starr, his physician for many years, was of opinion that he would be able with safety to go out next week. Friday afternoon he was lying in bed chatting cheerfully with his wife who sat near him. At about 5.30 he complained of feeling very warm, and Mrs. Clarke noticed that he seemed to have some difficulty in breathing. Dr. Starr was telephoned for, but was absent from his residence attending other patients in the extreme west end, and did not receive the message until after Mr. Clarke's death. Dr. F. A. Clarkson was hurriedly summoned and did all that was possible, but the patient gradually sank, dying at about 6.15. He was conscious to within a few minutes of his death and knew that the end was near, his last words being those of affectionate farewell to and an invocation of the Divine blessing upon his wife and family.

Besides his widow, to whom he was married in 1884, six children survive, all of them residing at home the eldest, Phyllis, being eighteen years of age, and the youngest, Evelyn Grace, four.—The others are Edward George, Warring Kennedy, named after a former Mayor of Toronto, and Elizabeth H. Several of the children, as well as Mrs. Clarke, were with Mr. Clarke when he died.

GOOSE RESURRECTED.

Had Been Buried Under Snow for a Month.

Morristown, N. J., March 6.—After having been imprisoned under snow for a month a goose belonging to John Zellers of Schooley's Mountain was found to be alive yesterday. The bird was one of a flock of twelve which Mr. Zellers owned and was lost on February 1st in the blizzard. The owner thought nothing further of it until yesterday, when he again went down to the brook to drive in his geese. One gander did not want to go to the poultry yard and made a loud protest. The gander kept its gaze fixed on one spot across the brook, and Mr. Zellers thought it was hypnotized. Later in the afternoon he found the gander again in the same place. He peered across the stream and was surprised to see something white moving under the snow and ice. He kicked up the snow, bringing to view the lost goose, alive and apparently happy, although somewhat bedraggled from its enforced fast.

A GIGANTIC COMBINE.

Controlling the Drug Trade of the United States.

Chicago, March 6.—Existence of a gigantic combination controlling the

drug trade of the United States, and costing the consumers \$40,000,000 annually is held to have been proved by the hearing just concluded before Special United States Commissioner Marshall E. Sampsell. The amount of business controlled by the combination is placed at \$400,000,000 yearly. The evidence taken before the Commissioner is said to be so conclusive that it probably will be placed in the hands of United States Attorney-General Moody for prosecution by the present Government. The fight against the combination is being made by a large retail druggist in Philadelphia, who is suing for \$100,000 damages under the Sherman anti-trust law. The action was begun in the federal courts of Philadelphia, and the most important evidence obtained is that given at the preliminary hearing in this city.
