WOLF HUNTING IN ENGLAND.

Animal Escaped From Menagerie Causes Terror in North.

In the wild fell country to the west of Northumberland hundreds of the inhabitants continue to follow the track of the wolf which during the past few days has laid the flocks of the farmers under heavy tribute by slaying their sheep.

Two months ago a wolf escaped from a private collection at Shotley Bridge, twelve miles from Newcastle, and all trace of it was lost until about three weeks ago, when sheep-worrying commenced in the Allendale district.

Raids have been organized, and the wolf chased over miles of the snow-covered fells by men armed with guns and various weapons, but without result. Some of the pursuers are said to have got within range of the animal with their guns, yet the disturber of rural peace has managed to escape. In many a lonely homestead it is a source of dread to the inmates whose imaginations run riot over the wolf as they listen to or retail the latest news concerning its whereabouts.

On Saturday a supreme effort was made to bring him down, but he never allowed himself to get within range of his pursuers' rifles. He was finally chased by horsemen over the snow-covered moors via West Burnhope, and when night fell he had reached Dukesfield, a dense, wild wood covering an area of not less than 700 acres, within the solitude of which he doubtless spent the night. Intense excitement prevails in the district, and farmers are keenly anxious to see the end of their unwelcome guest.—London Daily Mail.

The Artist and His Ideals.

George Frederic Watts is described by his biographers as the simplest and most humble of men. His personal humility and self-effacement, says a writer in The Monthly Review, formed a striking contrast to the loftiness of his aims and the passionate strength of his convictions.

His daily actions were a living illustration of his belief in the old German motto which the Queen of Roumania, "Carmen Sylva," suggested to him as the text of one of his most touching pictures: "What I spent, I had; what I saved, I lost; what I gave, I have."

"Our little life," he wrote once, "is poor indeed if bounded by our own personal wants and fancied requirements."

Among countless instances of his generosity is one which he often recalled because of its connection with his picture, "Love and Life," now hanging in the White House in Washington, a work which he considered his most important message to the world.

A poor artist's wife, whom he had never seen before, came to his studio in sore distress one day, and begged for a loan of a few pounds to enable her to join her husband who lay dangerously ill in New York. Watts gave her all, and more than all she asked, and she left him with tears

or gratitude in her eyes, promising to come and see him on her return. Two years afterward she appeared, accompanied by her husband, who was restored to health and had found work in America, and repaid the money which Watts had lent her.

When the painter asked what had led her to apply to a total stranger like himself, she replied, "The sight of your picture, 'Love and Life.'" She felt that the man who had painted that picture must have a heart overflowing with love and pity for sorrowing humanity, and the issue proved that she was right.

In his candor and guilelessness Watts never shrank from giving his sitters good advice. A thorough-going idealist himself, Watts expected his friends to live up to the level of their art, and was pained to see any inconsistencies in their conduct. "Come, King Arthur would not have talked in that way!" he said to Tennyson one day, when the poet was in a more bearish mode than usual. But when the laureate showed him his knotted and swollen fingers, he understood, and felt satisfied that it was "all the gout."

Church Furniture.

At a recent meeting of the Swanley branch of the English Church Union, Canon Bristow rejoiced that things were better in the furnishing line throughout the churches. In the old days, Dr. Tait, then Bishop of London, had refused to proceed with the consecration of All Saints, W. Margaret street, unless a linen cloth covered the altar down to the ground. Great was the consternation accordingly, and a table had to be hastily brought across from the clergy house in order to satisfy his scruples. Even choral services, surpliced choirs, crosses and mural decorations of the east wall of a church had a bishop who could not see the use of them, and troubled incumbents were continually worried in endeavors to keep their diocesan in the right humor. But now all was changed. All classes were getting to understand this department better, and the strides which had been made of late years were a matter of great encouragement.
