A PEACEFUL OCCUPATION.

The Orangemen occupied Fredericton today, without striking a blow, and the brethren had a good time and made a creditable appearance.

The principles of the Orange order are all right, and it is only when control gets into the hands of designing politician that trouble follows.

The Orange color should be no more objectionable to those who do not subscribe to the order's tenets than the green to the brethren who walked in procession today, and it is Fredericton's record that generally religious toleration is recognized and practised although there may have been exceptions to the rule. However, the people of this vicinity, whether Protestant or Catholic are ready to accord to every man the right to worship at his own shrine, and it is the great heritage of Canadians that a large measure of civil and religious liberty prevails. Those who seek to disturb these amicable relations are not good citizens of Canada, be they Protestant or Catholic.

Fredericton heartily welcomed the Orangemen today, gave them beautiful weather, level, shady streets for their procession, a cheerful hearing to the speeches and abundance of food, and we have confidence in the belief that a similar turnout of people of another religious stripe in this city would meet with an equally hospitable reception. We are all brothers, no matter where we may hang up our hats on Sunday—brothers in seeking to make this great Canada of ours a nation that will command the respect and admiration of the civilized world.

GLAD HE IS BETTER.

The many friends of Mr. Hance J. Logan the popular Liberal M. P., for Cumberland, who has had a serious illness for the past three months at Ottawa, having sustained two operations in hospital, are rejoiced to know that he is rapidly recovering his strength, and has been able to resume his seat in parliament. Evidently Mr. Logan has not been idle during his long confinement for a friendly newspaper in his constituency boasts that he secured appropriations for Cumberland amounting to \$90,000 and that if he had been in good health he would probably have scooped the entire revenue for useful public works in his constituency.

Mr. Logan has made himself solid in Cumberland by his untiring efforts to serve his constituents, and should have a long lease of the county's representation in parliament.

ALWAYS CHANGING.

When the Tories were in power they neglected and starved the Canadian militia as they neglected and starved the Intercolonial railway, but now Mr. Foster wants the militia force raised from 40,000 to 100,000 men, and he wants Canada to make a contribution for naval defence. Mr. Foster is opposed to a standing army in Canada, but he backed up Lord Dunsford whose aim has to organize such an institution in this country.

After Mr. Foster had laid his views in the militia before parliament on Tuesday he added "them's my sentiments", but he might have followed the declaration with "but if they don't suit I can change them." Mr. Foster is always open to conviction if he can make a point against the government by reversing his views.

AN INTERESTING EXPERIMENT.

Public interest is attracted to the experiment being made to show that hours may be saved by landing inward trans-Atlantic mails at North Sydney and despatching them via the I. C. R. to points of distribution in the maritime and upper provinces. The cruiser Canada is to meet the Virginian in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and will take the mails from here and rush to North Sydney with them for despatch by fast train over the government road.

If the experiment proves successful the enterprising Cape Breton town may become the terminus of the mail service in summer, as Halifax is in winter.

The Equitable scandal is pulling in a large number of prominent people, the latest to fall within the suspicious circle being the eminent New York Senator, Chauncey M. Depew. Mr. Depew, who was on the old directorate, admits having been able to borrow for a concern in which he was interested, \$250,000 from the company on security valued at \$150,000, and that the borrowers were not legally bound to return the money.

A Toronto gentleman in this city today on an automobile trip, declared that the prettiest country he had seen between the Queen city and Fredericton was along the St. John river valley which he traversed from Edmondston. And yet there are said to be some people in Canada who are anxious to put the transcontinental railway through the backwoods of this province to preference to constructing it down the St. John Valley.

Chief Engineer Dunn of the transcontinental railway confirms the report that the route of the line through New Brunswick will be settled in a few days, and now is the time in the Fredericton and York committees who are to urge the desirability of the St. John Valley route to commence an active campaign.

The sewerage committee of the city council evidently mean business, and the city is to be congratulated on the present forward condition of public opinion on the subject. There will be objections, but there always are when any great public reform is up for consideration. There were even people who objected to the construction of the new Transcontinental Railway.

The veteran Senator Wark, will receive his seasonal indemnity although he did not occupy his seat at all during the present session, the infirmities of old age preventing his attendance. The country, however, will not begrudge the vote to the venerable legislator who has nearly completed five months of his 102nd year.

BITS OF NEWS.

Items of Interest Culled from Our Exchanges and Other Sources.

John Wortman, a resident of Mechanic Settlement, King's County, was killed in the woods Tuesday by a falling tree.

The affections of Annie H. Thompson have apparently been trifled with as she entered an action in the supreme court of the province for \$2,000 damages for breach of promise against Ellis Murray.

When Mrs. Charles M. Oelrichs returned to her cottage at Newport, R. I., Tuesday evening, after an absence of two hours, she discovered that \$10,000 worth of jewelry had been taken from her dressing case.

Clarence Spooner, editor of The Railway News, Moncton, has been ill at Campbellton as the result of eating canned fruit that contained some poisonous matter. The quick use of an antidote saved Mr. Spooner from more serious results.

At Moncton Tuesday a wedding that's been looked forward to with interest for some time took place. Miss Agnes Isabelle Thompson, was united in marriage with George W. Maddison, city editor of The Times.

The steamer Aranmore went on the rocks two miles west of Thunder River, Quebec, on Sunday. The Aranmore is in the coasting service, running between Quebec and Gaspe ports, and is a new vessel, having been built in Glasgow last year. It is expected she will be floated tomorrow.

Thomas Jackson, arrested at St. John on a charge of stealing \$60 from Frank Evers, was tried before Judge Forbes under the Speedy Trials Act Tuesday. He pleaded guilty and was allowed to go on suspended sentence on the condition that he take the first steamer for England.

Thirty-three touring cars bearing more than a hundred automobile enthusiasts started from New York Tuesday to compete in a one thousand mile reliability tour for a trophy offered by Charles G. Glendon. It is expected that four days will be required for the run which will end in the White Mountains.

J. N. Jones, who has been at Woodstock for about three years acting as accountant in the Royal Bank, left on Friday afternoon for a short visit to his home in Weymouth, N. S. About the middle of this month he will sail for Havana, Cuba, to which place he has been transferred.

Locked up in a freight car and starved to death was evidently the fate of an unknown man whose body was found in a car on a siding in the G. T. R. yards at Montreal Tuesday. The odor of decomposition led to the discovery of the body. There was nothing about the man to lead to identification and it is supposed he got into the car to steal a ride.

ENGINEERS DROWNED.

Transcontinental Party of Four Lost Their Lives in Lake Manitoba.

Toronto, July 12.—(Special)—News reached here this morning of the drowning at Lake Manitoba, of Major Villiers Sanky, of Toronto, who was the head of the surveying party for the new transcontinental railway.

He knocked one of the officers down, and eluded the clutches of the other, took to the tall timbers and is still at large. A sad fatality occurred at McLellan's Brook, Pictou, on Saturday. John Johnston, a young farmer, left his home to go to a lumber camp. He did not return and search was made. His body was found on the path leading to the camp with a bullet wound near the heart. A revolver was near by. Whether in going through the bushes the revolver was accidentally discharged or not cannot be determined.

G. F. McNally, leader of two of this year's maritime Y.M.C.A. boys' parties left Moncton Tuesday with boys from that section for Big Cove, Sutherland River, Pictou County, where a camp is to be held. Mr. McNally has been working energetically to secure a large attendance at camp, and had the satisfaction of leaving Moncton with forty boys. Inspector O'Blanes accompanied the party.

Joe Muise, the Indian guide, who was with the St. John Tourist Association, got under the influence of liquor and disappeared on the evening of the 10th of June last, after visiting the Opera House. Search was made for him in every direction but no trace was found until Tuesday morning when the body was discovered in one of the slips. He evidently became confused and walked over the wharf into the harbor. He leaves a wife at Musquash.
