

RECEPTION TO BISHOP CASEY.

Enthusiastically Welcomed by the Congregation of St. Dunstan's.

ADDRESS PRESENTED AND HIS LORDSHIP'S GRACEFUL REPLY.

The warm place that His Lordship Bishop Casey occupies in the hearts of the Roman Catholics of Fredericton was amply attested by the cordial, hearty and enthusiastic welcome extended to him by his former parishioners here last evening.

His Lordship arrived from St. John by the 8.30 train, being met at Fredericton Junction by Messrs. A. Belliveau, Patrick Farrell, W. E. Seery, and Michael Ryan, members of the reception committee. Accompanying His Lordship were Very Rev. Father Herbert, V. G. of Buctouche, Rev. Fathers Meehan and Murray of St. John, Rev. Father Cormier of Memramcook and Rev. Father McDermott of Petersville.

The party boarded barouches in waiting at the depot and were driven at once to the Presbytery, where the Bishop and clergy donned their vestments and made ready for the service. At nine o'clock the party, led by Rev. Father Hamigan and the altar boys, bearing the crucifix, entered the church by the centre door and made their way up the aisle to the

history, and the holy records of the Divine promises and revelations, and the inspired prophecies respecting the great mystery of man's redemption, all of which were there fulfilled in every detail, the effect must indeed have been far beyond what we can fully realize. We feel assured, however, that we were not always absent from your mind, but that from those hallowed places your petitions in our behalf went up to the Celestial Throne in earnest and fervent prayer for our spiritual and temporal welfare.

In conclusion, we again beg to offer you the respectful homage and fidelity of our hearts; nor can we refrain from again referring, as on a former occasion, to the happy associations and the sacred ties of spiritual friendship and love which had their origin and were fostered and cemented by your untiring zeal for our eternal and material happiness during your sojourn among us as our beloved parish priest, the memory of which lives in our hearts and makes Your Lordship's visit to this city, if

possible, still dearer to us. We sincerely hope and earnestly pray that Almighty God will abundantly bless you with health and strength to discharge the arduous and responsible duties of the high and holy office to which He has called you, and which you grace by your piety, eloquence and zeal.

And now, Your Lordship, while thanking you heartily for your paternal solicitude in our behalf, both as our former parish priest, and our dearly beloved chief pastor, we respectfully and humbly ask you in rest and the finest religious edifice ever erected by the hand of man. He would that he were once more laboring among his old parishioners that he might tell them of the many wonderful things he had seen during his journey abroad. He had visited the tomb of St. Peter, the first apostle, near the Vatican hill, where now stood the greatest church building the world ever saw. The speaker next described at some length his visit to the Holy Land, and gave in a most entertaining manner, his impressions of Nazareth and Bethlehem. He told of standing near the spot where the Saviour had given up his precious life for the salvation of the world.

In conclusion His Lordship expressed regret that his stay in Fredericton was to be of such short duration. All he could do, therefore, was to thank them again and again for their magnificent welcome.

The very impressive service was brought to a close by the Apostolic benediction pronounced by His Lordship.

DISTINGUISHED SCOUT.

It will be interesting to Canadians generally and to Torontonians in particular to learn that the chief scout in the Mikado's grand army in Manchuria is a Toronto man, no other, in fact, than Lieutenant Tom Casey Callaghan, whose widowed mother lives with another son "over the Don," near the corner of Withrow and Bape avenues. Tom Callaghan has had a career which would hardly be equalled for excitement by the hero of the most amazing "yellow-back." As a lad in Riverdale, he was well known as an expert baseball player. Being of an adventurous turn, he went west as a very young man and started roughing it on a ranch, which, later on, he purchased, so that it is evident there is a touch of shrewdness in Mr. Callaghan's composition. While on the plains he became an expert horseman, rifle shot and trapper of big game, which qualities served him well in his later vocation as scout. When the Boer war broke out Callaghan sought enlistment in the Canadian Mounted Rifles, but was refused because he was below the regular height. Nothing daunted, he asked permission to qualify by giving an exhibition of horsemanship and so excited the admiration and wonder of the recruiting sergeant that he was straightway enrolled and went off to South Africa. After serving some time with the Mounted Rifles he joined "Gat" Howard's Scouts, most of whom were Canadians, and on the death of that adventurous spirit formed a new corps known as Callaghan's Scouts, who became the eyes and ears of Lord Kitchener in his sweeping manoeuvres. Callaghan's favorite device for detecting the enemy was by reclining prone on his back on the ground. Lord Kitchener one occasion, it is said, missed capturing a large body of Boers because he declined to believe in scouting of this nature. Callaghan did not get off scathless by any means in his South African experience. On one occasion he was shot through the body and given up for dead; he was dressed for burial and was already lying beside a newly-dug grave intended for him, when a chum named Drewry thought he detected signs of life and succeeded in reviving him with a cup of green tea.

Callaghan received the distinguished service medal for carrying an important despatch seventy miles from General Hutton's army to that of General Smith-Dorrien. Two horses died under him in the performance of the feat.

The war over, Callaghan returned to Canada, and on the outbreak of hostilities between Japan and Russia asked Col. Evans of Winnipeg to use his influence in enabling him to enlist as a scout in the Intelligence Department of the Japanese army. The application was successful and Callaghan rose rapidly in the difficult and dangerous work until he is now commander-in-chief of a regiment of two hundred scouts, the flower of the Japanese Intelligence Department. Lieut. Callaghan has with him always maps of the theatre of war and an interpreter to convey his orders to the regiment. Callaghan's mother hears from her gallant son occasionally, but, as may well be imagined, under all the circumstances he does not maintain a flying correspondence.

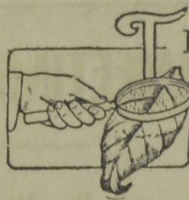
ANNA AND EDNA COOK,

Address to His Lordship.

The service opened with the benediction of the blessed sacrament, pronounced by Rev. Father Carney, after which the following address to the Bishop was read by Hon. P. G. Ryan.

To the Right Reverend Timothy Casey, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese of St. John, N. B.

May it please your Lordship,

We, the members of the congregation of St. Dunstan's Church in the City of Fredericton, gladly embrace the occasion of your first visit to this part of the diocese since returning from your episcopal visit to our Holy Father, the Pope, and your pious pilgrimage to the Holy Land, to offer you a hearty welcome, to give expression to our joy and thankfulness for your safe and happy return, and to the pleasure that we feel in seeing you again among us, as well as to renew the heartfelt expressions and pledges of our fidelity to you as the beloved chief pastor of this diocese.

During your long absence, we have, as was our duty, very frequently remembered you in our humble prayers, and have been with you in spirit at the foot of the throne of Peter, Prince of the Apostles, where you have personally, and on behalf of us, your people, given filial and loving assurances of our living faith and our unswerving loyalty to his eminent successor, Pius the Tenth, now happily reigning.

We have also followed you in spirit to the places made memorable and hallowed by the footsteps, the labours, the miracles, the teachings, the sufferings and the death of our Divine Lord, His triumph over death, and His glorious ascension into Heaven, and can, to some extent at least, imagine the holy emotions with which your soul thrilled, while literally walking over the ground sanctified by those very footsteps of our Lord.

THE BISHOP'S REPLY.

His Lordship delivered a feeling and eloquent reply to the address and was listened to with breathless interest. He said that since his last visit to Fredericton he had travelled in many lands, and met various classes of people, but he never felt more at home than he did in St. Dunstan's church. He could say that since his removal to another part of the province the people of St. Dunstan's had never caused him any pain, and any suggestions he had made in good part and generously carried out, and this made him feel all the more at home in coming among them. His visit to the Holy Father at Rome had indeed been a happy occasion and would always be pleasantly remembered by him. He had travelled with people of other religious faiths and had secured for them audiences with the Holy Father, and they were just as enthusiastic over him as were his own spiritual subjects. The whole world is interested in Pius X., on account of the high and historic office he holds. His Lordship spoke of the magnificent personality of the late lamented Leo XIII., the predecessor of the present pontiff, and told how the news of his death had thrilled the whole civilized world. Yet the Master knew what He was doing and had called as a successor one in every way worthy of the high office.

His Lordship next referred to his conference with the Pope, and the pleasure he experienced in telling him of the faith and piety of the good people of St. Dunstan's. His holiness had requested him to assure them of his love, and bestow upon them his blessing.

Continuing, His Lordship gave a brief description of the great and magnificent buildings in connection with the Vatican at Rome, referring to St. Peter's Cathedral as the large-
