DOWN IN THEIR LUCK.

A report comes from Ottawa that Mr. Borden is thinking seriously of resigning the leadership of the Tory party.

That gentleman is no doubt discouraged with the present outlook of Toryism, and there is reason to believe that he is displeased with the sectarian agitation promulgated by his followers.

Mr. Borden's appointment was not pleasing to some of the Ontario Tory leaders and he has difficulty in restraining them. Mr. McLean, for instance, thinks he is well fitted for leadership and Dr. Sprule would not be averse to occupying Mr. Borden's shoes. Then it is understood that Mr. Monk and Mr. Bergeron are in revolt, and it would not be surprising if they joined the Liberal party.

The presence of Mr. Foster at Mr. Borden's side is distasteful to a great many Tories, and altogether the gentlemen to the left of Mr. Speaker form a very unhappy family.

The Tory party is suffering for the lack of a master spirit—a man with the ability and energy to frame some kind of a policy to catch the country, but such a man is not in sight. Meantime the party is rapidly drifting on the shoals of disintegration and destruction, a feeling of hopelessness pervades the rank and file, while the Liberals, under the astute and popular leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, are strong, united, aggressive and enjoy the respect and admiration of the great masses of the Canadian electorate.

FIREBRANDS.

The great majority of the people of Canada pay no attention to the extreme and bigoted utterances of men like Archbishop Langevin on the one hand, and ultra-Protestant fanatics on the other, but go their own way, helping to build up and consolidate this country without respect to race or religious differences.

Every few months His Grace of St. Boniface seems to break out in a new spot, but his recent utterances, advising his people to boycott everything English, shows that he is rapidly encroaching on the extreme limit of forbearance.

Whether His Grace is really in earnest, from a race and religious standpoint or it is only screaming to assist the Tory party, is not the question. In any case he is trying to do dangerous work and should be frowned down by every man, French, or English, Protestant or Catholic, who desires to see avoided race and religious strife in Canada.

Nor are the bigoted Protestants who continually stir up strife less reprehensible than the mischievous Archbishop with his constantly wagging tongue.

Let us have peace in this country, free as possible from religious bigotry and hate. Every man has the right to worship at his own shrine without interference and a man can speak English, French or Mi'kmaq so long as he minds his own business, and does not interfere with his neighbors.

AN EXHIBITION OF NERVE.

Some of the Tory organs invite us to weep over the impending political disaster to Premier Haultain of the Northwest Territories, but Liberals are not seriously concerning themselves as to that gentleman's future.

The Sun goes so far as to demand that Mr. Haultain be called to the leadership of the government in one of the new provinces, when his present premiership of the territories will no longer be available. Such nerve is appalling.

What do the Liberals owe Mr. Haultain that they should seek to provide for his future? What has he ever done for the Liberal party that he should be entrusted with the leadership of one of the governments in the west? Let him look out for himself. As The Montreal Herald observes, he starts with a long advantage over any other man, for he has had the eyes of the west on him for years. Conservatives and Liberals have made it easy for him in the past, and he has repaid that treatment by taking sides with the Conservatives against the Liberals whenever a suitable occasion offered. He has just been doing his best to get the Liberals in trouble at Lon-

don and North Oxford. He has not held back his hand when delivering his blows. He is still threatening to make inoperative the measure the Liberals at Ottawa are putting through. Must the Liberals kiss the hand that smites them? If they do they are fools for their pains. Mr. Haultain may get the control in one of the new legislatures if he can. His friends evidently fear that he cannot. But let him try, at least. As a result of his own and other Conservative obstruction, he will have three months more of power than he is entitled to. Let him be satisfied with that, and fight for the rest like a man if he wants it.

They are expecting a local general election in Nova Scotia this autumn, and already parties in some of the constituencies are astir. Colchester Conservatives are to meet July 4th to nominate candidates. A reconstruction of the government will follow immediately consequent on Hon. Mr. Longley's appointment to the bench, and the names of Hon. Arthur Drysdale, present commissioner of public works, and Hon. W. T. Pipes, M. L. C. of Amherst, are mentioned for the attorney generalship vacated by Mr. Longley.

A young man of Toronto and his girl went out yachting the other day, and not returning at night, were reported lost, to the great distress of their friends. There was no tragedy, however. The wind had suddenly dropped, the yacht was becalmed, and the couple were compelled to remain out all night, which leads The Montreal Herald joker to enquire: "What so rare as a night in June with no wind blowing?"

The man Elmer Young, unpleasantly connected with some of the leading figures in the Digby tragedy, should join the Mormon community, where a man can have any number of wives or mistresses. The awful tale of his love entanglements, now confessed by himself, has a black side for others—several young girls from Nova Scotia having been drawn into the shameless libertine's net.

Lord Kitchener has stirred up the English government to the danger threatening the frontier of India by Russian aggression, and the Indian army is to be increased from 80,000 to 140,000 men, involving a further burden on the Indian taxpayers of \$12,000,000 per annum.

BITS OF NEWS.

Items of Interest Culled from Our Exchanges and Other Sources.

A special train of police and soldiers left Quebec Sunday afternoon for Grand Mere, to arrest the employees of Lemon Bros. circus for robbery and depredations at Chicoutimi and Roberval.

A large audience was in Centenary church, St. John, Sunday evening, when Rev. G. M. Campbell preached his farewell sermon, after a successful pastorate of four years.

The 50th session of Golden Jubilee of the Grand Lodge of Independent Order of Oddfellows of the Maritime Provinces convenes in Halifax on August 8. Five hundred delegates are expected to be present.

Helen, the four year old daughter of John Dyer, of Franklin, Maine, who was burned Saturday night, died Sunday. The child, while playing with matches in bed set fire to the clothing, and was terribly burned before her mother could save her. Mrs. Dyer, was seriously injured, but it is expected, will recover.

The Dominion Day banquet, at London, G. B., promises to be the biggest ever held in that city. There are already 600 tickets sold and Lord Strathcona has invited the members of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association to be his guests at the banquet to be held at the Hotel Cecil.

The death of Lizzie Hayes, a second victim of the fatal fire on Sheffield street, St. John, on Wednesday evening last, took place at six o'clock Sunday morning at the General Hospital. The woman was terribly burned in the fire in which Samuel Dugan lost his life.

It is said Lieut-General Sir Neville Gerald Lytton, chief of the general staff and first military member of the Army Council, has resigned as the result of the South African army stores scandal. General Lytton took over the command of the forces in South Africa at the close of the war, and it is alleged that under his regime Lord Kitchener's system of checking contracts was allowed to drop.

Hissed and jered at by the crowds that thronged the station platform and lined the streets, Elmer E. Young arrived at Digby from Yarmouth on Saturday afternoon under the official wing of Deputy Sheriff Buroham and was locked up. Hattie Hatfield, the woman that came to Digby with Young to bring the child Elma back to Boston, also arrived by the same train, having the pretty little child, so cruelly treated in the Plympton woods, in her arms. The latter is now in the care of the almshouse keeper and his wife at Marshalltown, near Digby.

George B. Batson, a retired fish merchant of Campbell, Charlotte Co., committed suicide Saturday night by hanging. It is thought that he was despondent over business reverses. Mr. Batson was 56 years of age and was for many years actively engaged in the fish business at Campbell and at Gloucester, Mass. He leaves a widow, three sons and a daughter.

There is a young lady at Passadumkeag, Maine, who is about to start on a journey of six or seven thousand miles, for the purpose of being married when she reaches her destination. The lady is Miss Catherine Lang, and she bought her ticket from the C. P. R. on Saturday. Miss Lang's fiancé is in Manila, and as he was unable to come back to Maine she is going across Canada and the Pacific Ocean to meet him.

Information was laid with Chief of Police Kelly at Woodstock Saturday morning that a lady had been deprived of \$400 by one of the Sells & Doens followers. The young lady's father went to Woodstock and that afternoon, during the performance, while with Kelly, identified the thief. He tried to get away, and after a sharp run the marshal caught him. The usual bluff was attempted at first but finally the circus agent paid over the \$400.

Sackville Tribune.—A sad tragedy occurred in the poultry yard of a man in the parish of Sackville. His fine collie dog and the old gander had a decided falling out, in which the dog came off second best. The canine cherished resentment, and took advantage of the first occasion when Mrs. Ganger was out with her little flock unaccompanied by her protector, to bite her head off. This ungentlemanly conduct is the source of much grief to Mr. Gander who now broods over the goslings and the loss of his mate simultaneously.

Keith Masonic Lodge of Moncton is celebrating its semi-centennial. Divine service was held in St. John's Presbyterian Church on Sunday afternoon the 25th, at which a sermon appropriate to the occasion was preached by Rev. R. S. Crisp of Marysville, and this evening there will be an At Home in the Masonic Hall, at which P. M. D., D. G. M., George Ackman will read a historical sketch of Keith Lodge, and addresses will be delivered by His Honor Judge Forbes, P. G. M., of St. John, His Honor Judge Woderburn, P. G. M., and M. W. Bro. Charles R. Smith, G. M., of Nova Scotia.

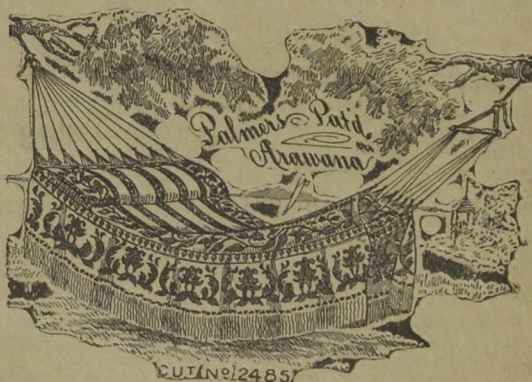
