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SEPARATE SCHOOLS---THE TWO BILLS.

Following are extracts from the Act of 1875 and the bill of 1905 dealing with the question of education in the Northwest Territories.

AUTONOMY BILL 1905.

17. The provisions of section 93 of the British North America Act, 1867 shall apply to the said province as if, at the date, upon which this Act comes into force the territory comprised therein were already a province, the expression, "the Union" in the said section being taken to mean the said date.

Subject to the provisions of said section 93 and in continuance of the principle heretofore sanctioned under the Northwest Territories Act, it is enacted that the Legislature of the said province shall pass all necessary laws in respect of education; and that it shall therein always be provided (a) that a majority of the ratepayers of any district or portion of said province, or of any less portion or subdivision thereof by whatever name the said is known, may establish such schools therein as they think fit and make the necessary assessment and collection of rates therefor.

And (b) that the minority of the ratepayers therein, whether Protestant or Roman Catholic, may establish separate schools therein and make the necessary assessments and collection of rates therefor.

And (c) that in such case the ratepayers establishing such Protestant or Roman Catholic separate schools, shall be liable only to assessment of such rates as they impose upon themselves in respect thereof.

In the appropriation of public moneys by the Legislature in aid of education and in the distribution of any moneys paid to the Government of the Province, arising from the school fund established by the Dominion Lands Act there shall be no discrimination between the public schools and the separate schools and such moneys shall be applied to the support of public and separate schools in equitable shares of proportions.

Placed side by side an opportunity is given to see in what way 1905 bill differs from the act which guaranteed separate schools to the Territories.

N. W. T. ACT OF 1875.

The Lieutenant-Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Territories, shall pass all necessary ordinances in respect to education, but it shall therein always be provided that a majority of the ratepayers of any district or portion of the Territories, or of a less portion or subdivision thereof, by whatever name the same is known, may establish such schools therein as they think fit, and make the necessary assessment and collection of rates therefor, and also that the minority of the ratepayers therein, whether Protestant or Roman Catholic, may establish separate schools therein--and in such case the ratepayers establishing such Protestant or Roman Catholic separate schools shall be liable only to assessment of such rates as they impose upon themselves in respect thereto.

IN MEMORIAM.

Rev. Dean Partridge at the Cathedral Sunday Night

Referred to the Deaths of Mrs. Medley, Mr. Moffatt and Mr. Block.

In his sermon Sunday night at the Cathedral, Rev. Dean Partridge spoke as follows of the recent deaths of members of the church:

"We have had a sad week, and yet our sadness has been tempered with joy. First we lost from earthly sight, but not from loving memory, our dear Mrs. Medley, who for more than forty years has gone in and out amongst us, a mother in Israel; helpmeet for thirty years to her distinguished husband; partner in all his plans, and true fellow laborer in carrying them out. Of affable and kindly disposition she dispensed a hospitality as generous as it was sincere. Visitor in note, passing strangers, the children of the diocese and their wives, children, social acquaintances, natives of her own; all received the measure of attention, sympathy, and kindness. Of keen business shrewdness and a decision of character that could not be easily imposed upon, she brought to the affairs of life a penetration and a firmness which compelled respect; while her strong sense of duty led her to the performance of many tasks which were not always pleasant. There is not a parish, and scarcely a clergyman in the diocese, not indebted to her generous impulses.

What she did, she strove to do thoroughly. New churches always appealed to her. Vestments of skilled workmanship for altar or pulpit; linen for the altar or the altar itself; these are only examples of what she was ever doing. And better still, letters of encouragement and cheer made many a downcast heart look up, and her circle of correspondence was large. It is hard to realize that in all these activities, as also in her worship among us in this cathedral which she loved so well, we shall see her face no more. It is not for me to speak of those sacred confidences which are so dear to the faithful pastor, suffice it to say that she died at peace with God and in the hope of a joyful resurrection. "She being dead yet speaketh."

Charles Moffatt has been a resident of Fredericton for very many years. Quiet and unassuming in manner, honest and upright in all business, most skilful worker of his trade, a great lover of nature, especially of flowers, he passed a peaceful and exemplary life, such as one loves to think is fostered by the Church of England. Affectionate in his family relations, firm in his friendship, and kindly to all, he lived in the fear, and died in the faith of God. Having suffered for many years from a severe and painful disease, it seems he was drawn closer to Christ through the mystery of suffering. "As many as I love I rebuke and chasten."

Alexander N. Block was another of the veterans of the congregation of the Cathedral, of which he saw the opening. Of robust constitution and decided views, he took part sixty years ago, and ever since in heart, in the growth and development of the city. Esteemed and respected by his fellow men, strict in the performance of every obligation, loving and greatly beloved in his home, a steadfast member of the church, and a most regular attendant at her services, he went down to the evening tide of life in faith and patience, looking and longing for the reunion with the loved ones that had gone before him. After his mind could no longer control itself, it was touching to hear him, repeating his creed and prayers, which lingered there when earthly things were dim. "His tabernacle was in peace; he came to his grave in a full age, like as a stock of corn cometh in its season."

It is hard to lose them, but we may be thankful that we had them to lose.

FOUND \$1,500 JEWEL IN SNOW.

Philadelphia, March 3.—A ruby-eyed bird made up of 105 diamonds and valued at \$1500 has been restored to its owner, Mrs. S. Parkham Huhn of Overbrook, after having lay buried for nearly a month under the snow on the pavement in that suburb.

THE SCHOOL TROUBLE.

Expected that Today's Government Meeting

Will Remove the Cause of Liberal Friction at Ottawa.

Ottawa, March 5.—It is expected that the cabinet will dispose of the school trouble in the Northwest at a meeting tomorrow forenoon called for that purpose. That is the prevailing opinion here tonight.

The settlement will be in accordance with the views of the west.

Ottawa, March 5.—The cabinet yesterday had under consideration the clause submitted by the Northwest members with a view of its being incorporated in the Northwest autonomy bill instead of the present one.

As already said, this new clause embodies the present school system in the Northwest which it is desired to perpetuate. That was what the Northwest asked for in the first instance and what they still maintain they should get.

The framers of the clause which stands in the bill at present maintain that this is what is in the bill. However, the government is willing to change the clause in the direction indicated by the western men.

At present the government clause in regard to education is made subject to section 93 of the British North America Act. It is also subject to the Northwest Territories Act and in addition has got a section which has caused all the trouble. This section deals with moneys for the support of schools by the legislature. It is held that this section endows separate schools as it does divert the public school fund of the legislature. The clause has all the appearance as well of opening the door to all kinds of disputes apart from the objectionable section.

The government has decided to prepare a new clause which may differ somewhat in words from the one offered by the Northwest men but which is intended to perpetuate what now exists in the way of schools in the west. The justice department is now engaged in framing it. It will be submitted to tomorrow's cabinet meeting. Meantime the western men will be seen and conferred with as to any changes which are desired so that all parties may be satisfied.

The feeling here today is that this will be accomplished but until it has been done the crisis cannot be said

to have disappeared. Everyone is waiting patiently to learn what will come out of tomorrow's cabinet meeting. For the present there is no change in this situation beyond what has been indicated.
