

STEAMSHIP LOST.

And Fifteen Souls Believed
to Have Perished.

FURNESS LINER DAMARA STRUCK
ON NOVA SCOTIA COAST.

Survivors Landed in a Boat After
Awful Experience.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Halifax, Feb. 8.—News reached the city late yesterday afternoon that the Furness liner, Damara, from Liverpool via St. John's, Nfld., has been lost off Musquodoboit Harbor, seventy-five miles east of this port.

A boat containing Chief Officer Nuttall, two engineers and fifteen others of the crew landed at Pleasant Point about five miles from Musquodoboit yesterday forenoon. They reported that the ship struck something supposed to be ledges off Musquodoboit at 2 a. m. She did not remain but passed over and soon after it was found she was leaking badly.

At daylight there were fourteen feet of water in the hold and she was settling fast. Lifeboats were launched, the mate and part of the crew taking to one and the captain and fourteen others, including three passengers, one lady, name unknown here, got into the second boat.

It was blowing hard at the time and extremely cold. The mate's boat immediately headed for land but the captain's boat remained in the vicinity of the ship and soon after the mate's boat started for the shore a snow squall came on and the ship and captain's boat were lost to view.

It is thought by those who got ashore that the steamer foundered soon after they left her.

Up to midnight no word had been received here in regard to the missing boat.

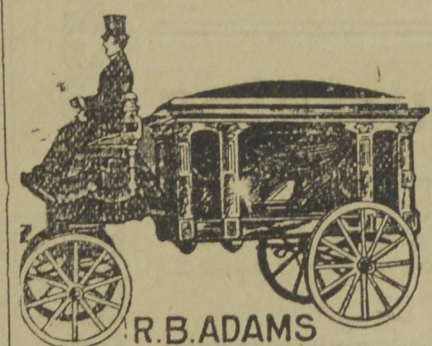

RUSSIAN EDUCATION

Suffering from the Result
of Strikes.

AUTOCRATIC ORDER OF ST. PETERSBURG GOVERNOR GENERAL.

Employers of Labor Asked to Dismiss
Artizans Who Walked Out.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Feb. 8.—Governor General Trepoff has ordered the curators of education to instruct all professors in universities, and teachers in schools in St. Petersburg to inform students that academic anarchy must cease.

The students must resume their studies by Feb. 18, and on refusing will be expelled.

If the majority refuse or the professors associate themselves with the movement the universities and schools, General Trepoff announced, would be closed and education in St. Petersburg would cease.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 8.—The students military academy of medicine today struck on the ground that owing to police intervention it is impossible to carry on education.

They demand that the academy be closed until freedom is granted them.

The police have forwarded to the employers of labor a list of prominent strikers, asking their immediate dismissal.

Director Nevsky of the naval construction yard has refused to comply and other employers are similarly disposed, because many of the black listed men are skilled artisans and cannot easily be replaced.

The police at Odessa have seized consignments of revolvers and cartridges destined for strikers in the Caucasus.
