A VIOLIN LOY.

Mr. Foster appears to have completely lost his head in parliament in discussing the Nixon matter, already referred to in these columns. Towards the close of his speech the ex-finance minister so far forgot himself as to declare that "Sir Wilfrid posed as an apostle of purity, but there had never been a piece of political villainy brought before the house which the Premier had not been willing to defend. What has he been?" Mr. Foster asked, "but the analogist for all kinds of political trickery?"

Mr. Johnston, of Cape Breton, got after Mr. Foster for his false and undignified charge against the prime minister and made the ex-minister wince. Mr. Johnston declared that Mr. Foster was angry because the money of the people was now honestly spent and value given for every dollar. Previous to 1896 the public exchequer was continuously raided. Mr. Foster was not very much disturbed then. Now he was chagrined because there was not a nest of traitors on the other side of the house. Mr. Johnston, in a humorous way, commented upon Mr. Foster's political wanderings and the evident distaste which was felt for him by his own colleagues.

Sir Wilfrid treated Mr. Foster's outbreak with contemptuous silence, and the wandering political pilgrim must have felt that he had dropped still another niche in the good opinion of parliament and the country.

Dark and threatening clouds overhang Russia's horizon, and even revolution is possible. The mutiny on board the Russian warship, the murder of the officers, and the turning of the ship's guns against Odessa, are a more serious menace to the country than the defeats on sea and land at the hands of Japan. Anarchy and revolution are breaking out at many points in the Czar's kingdom, and unless the authorities act promptly, a general revolution would appear imminent.

GOT FOUR YEARS.

Riggs Found Guilty and Sentenced to the Penitentiary.

The trial of George Riggs, charged with writing threatening letters to Miss Jessie Clark, was concluded at the circuit court this morning, and the jury, after half an hour, returned a verdict of guilty.

The prisoner was the only witness examined for the defence, and his evidence was badly shaken under the cross examination. He produced a druggist's prescription, which he claimed to have written, but was unable to read it to the court. He was afterwards put through a writing exercise by Judge Landry.

Mr. Barry summed up briefly for the crown, and urged the jury to record a conviction. The prisoner having no counsel, was allowed to follow Mr. Barry. He emphatically denied that he was guilty of the charge.

The judge began his charge to the jury at 5.30 o'clock and completed it this morning. He reviewed the evidence impartially, and explained the law relating to such cases.

After the jury had returned their verdict, His Honor remanded the prisoner until 2.30 this afternoon for sentence.

Prisoner Riggs was brought into court this afternoon and sentenced by Judge Landry to four years imprisonment in the Dorchester penitentiary. In passing sentence His Honor told the prisoner that had he admitted writing the letters in a moment of excitement, not meaning any harm thereby, and thrown himself on the mercy of the court, he might have been disposed to deal leniently with him. On the contrary, however, he strongly denied the charge and entering the witness box, made statements with the object of deceiving the public. He had also admitted that he had previously been sent to the penitentiary for making threats against his brother, and this and other circumstances conveyed the impression that he was a dangerous man to be at large.

THE RUSSIAN MUTINY.

Said to Have Spread to Crews of Other Warships.

FEARS THAT THE ARMY MAY BE AFFECTED.

City of Odessa Placed Under Martial Law.

St. Petersburg, June 29.—(Special.) It is reported that a general strike on the Russian railways will be declared July 2, as a protest against further mobilization of troops. The government is in a state of approaching panic over the events at Odessa, and the gravest fears are entertained lest the mutiny among the blue jackets may ruin the army. Should some of the troops at Odessa be won over to the cause of their comrades of the navy other troops sent against them might throw down their arms and join the mutineers.

With the support of over 100,000 workmen at Odessa civil war would be waged against the government. General Kakhanoft, commander of the military district of Odessa, has been empowered to declare martial law, and Vice Admiral Ohpukinn in command of the Black Sea fleet left St. Petersburg hastily during the night, either for Sevastopol or Odessa.

Beyond this no steps are known to have been taken to meet emergency.

Admiral Avellan was summoned to Peterhof at eight o'clock this morning to discuss the situation with the Emperor. Such advices as the Emperor and the government have received are carefully withheld, and the wires are in control of the authorities.

Rumors are rife in the city, however, that the officers on board the ships belonging to the squadron of Vice Admiral Kruger, who left Sevastopol for Odessa, Tuesday, have shared the same fate as the officers of the Knaiz Potekine, who were murdered by the mutineers.

It is added that the mutineers are in possession of other warships of the squadron.

If this so the mutineers' control more than half the heavy ships of the Black Sea fleet.

Other vessels said to be in the hands of the mutineers are the battleships Tchesne, Sinope, and the Itra Zviatitsella.

The admiralty, however, do not confirm the report of mutiny on board Admiral Kruger's other ships.

He was followed by Miss McCully, of Truro, returned missionary from Korea, who delivered a most acceptable address on foreign missionary work. She gave an account of her experiences in the far east, and was listened to with rapt attention.

The full choir was present and rendered several choice selections including the anthem, "Hark, hark, my Soul," with contralto solo by Mrs. Colwell, and soprano obligato by Miss McKee.
