

HOW THEY FOUGHT.

Echoes from the Battle of the Sea of Japan.

Admiral Rojestvensky so timed the revolutions of his engines, that only at early daylight did his intention to endeavor to force the Eastern straits become evident to the Japanese. Had Togo been less astute in his plans for counter check the Russians would have been through the neck of the bottle into the eastern sea, where manoeuvring would have been comparatively easy, before the falling of the shades of night could give the swift torpedo boat, the confusing flare signals, search lights and caskets, the nerve racking alarms and excursions, their chance to complete that fatal lack of cohesive discipline which had so mournfully manifested itself in the North Sea months before.

For the present we are only allowed to know that Togo made his first onslaught, with his battleships and armored cruisers with the deliberate intention of girding his foe until nightfall and in the meantime trained his guns upon the fighting tops and upper decks of the Russian ships were those quick firing guns are placed upon which the principal reliance for the annihilation of swiftly approaching torpedo boats is placed.

The surviving officers of the "Oral" testify to the fact that "their fighting tops and upper works were a shambles." Owing to the angles it is from these lofty positions only that the diminutive torpedo boat moving at railroad speed can be annihilated and only by searchlights stationed in the crow's nests can their approach after nightfall be discovered.

Admiral Togo omitted to consider no detail and his subordinates nobly carried out the plans his genius had forecast. Before the night fell the battleship nucleus of the Russian fleet was rendered helpless to resist the swarming torpedo boats which then only were launched from their pre-arranged rendezvous.

Morning showed a scattered squadron, leaderless, with its stern to a recuperated and scathless foe. Beyond occasioning a wholesale panic which was fatal to three Japanese torpedo boats while causing the Russians to fire upon each other with fatal effect the torpedo attack does not appear so far to have been proved as effective as that of the accurate gunfire of the Japanese in the original encounter.

OPERATIONS OF G. T. P.

Their Specifications Have Been Approved.

No Western Terminus Yet—Contract Likely to be Let at Once for Portion to be Constructed by the Company.

Now that the government has approved of the specifications for that portion of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway which is to be constructed by the company tenders will be called at once for the construction of the first section of the Thunder Bay branch commencing at Fort William. This branch is 220 miles in length and will doubtless be divided into several sections unless, as may happen a figure so low that it cannot be overlooked is submitted for the entire branch.

The specifications approved by the government are very general in character and apply to the entire line from Fort William to the Pacific Coast, and track equal to that of the Grand Trunk provide, as called for under the government, for the construction of a line of railway system between Toronto and Montreal. There is a prospect of the grading being made at the outset of sufficient width to admit of the line between Fort William and Winnipeg being double tracked as soon as the demands of the traffic call for such an addition to the capacity of the line. The agreement between the company and the corporation of Fort William has not yet been approved by the latter and no pronouncement has been made by the G. T. P. as to the Western terminus. Some are

of the opinion that the Pine River Pass in British Columbia will not be the one selected but that a pass south, possibly the Salmon river Pass will be taken, the descent, it is claimed is much easier on the British Columbia side than any of the others.

MYSTERIOUS JAP COOK.

Employed by Col. J. C. Wright, and Left Suddenly After Getting Despatch from Japan.

Duxbury, Mass., has had a Japanese naval officer, or emissary of the Japanese government, within its midst and never knew it until he hastily departed in response to a cipher despatch from Japan.

Seiza Hatteai is the name of this Japanese, and for several months he was employed as a cook by Col. J. C. Wright, one of the most influential citizens on the South Shore. He gave the best of satisfaction, and until he gave his notice last Friday Col. Wright had no idea of parting with his man, not does the colonel know anything of his cook's connection with the Japanese government.

Immediately upon receiving the telegram Hatteai said he was going to New York to visit his brother. It is known that several months ago he made several visits to Fore River shipyards at Quincy, where the Holland submarines were built, but all this was unknown to Col. Wright and his family.

Hatteai is about thirty-five years old and exceedingly bright. He conversed freely with several of the townspeople, but was very guarded about anything bearing upon the war. Col. Wright found the cook through Bandmaster Stewart of Boston, and states that the Jap came from the Philippines to this country. He served several years in the United States cavalry while in the Philippines.

Prince Gustavus Adolphus, eldest son of the Crown Prince of Sweden and Norway, who is to be married to Princess Margaret Victoria, of Connaught, on June 17, arrived in London Monday night from Stockholm, accompanied by his brother, Prince William. The princes were received at the station by the Duke of Connaught and other distinguished personages. Today they went to Windsor Castle, where they will be the guests of King Edward.

Fighting Garden Pests.

Dr. Fletcher, entomologist at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, lectured at the Normal School Mission recently on "Spring Work and How to go About It."

Dr. Fletcher explained the difference between the study of nature and of natural history and the appearance and disappearance of pests that destroyed grains and fruit orchards, pointing out that everything had its use. It was folly to attempt to drive out every group of insects as they were usually followed by other pests that drove them out.

He dwelt on the necessity for close observation, enquiring the reasons why certain parasites appeared in some localities and then jumped to other places hundreds of miles away. He also spoke of common weeds, and said some farmers vainly endeavored to exterminate every pest that came along when nature itself would supply the remedy.
