EXPLAINING THE RESULT.

The Toronto newspapers published the day following the Ontario provincial elections which resulted in such a great victory for the Conservative Opposition and the defeat of the Ross government, are filled with explanations of the great change, and wails or jubilation as the case may be.

The Toronto Globe, which was an ardent supporter of the Ross government, has this to say:

"The most complete victory in the history of Provincial politics was won by Mr. J. P. Whitney and the Conservative party Wednesday.

"There will be many explanations of the overthrow of Ontario Liberalism. The election returns indicate that the dissatisfaction of the electors with the policy of the party was not sectional and was not due to the personal unpopularity of the candidates. Many of the best men in the public life of the province went down to defeat Wednesday as Liberals.

"The temperance vote was thrown directly against the party because the Liberal convention had not gone far enough in the direction of temperance reform. When the liquor dealer, the distiller and the prohibition worker go the polls to vote the same ticket it is rather probable that the party they are voting against will be beaten.

"The cry that it was time for a change had also a very great influence upon that portion of the electorate which does not take its politics seriously, and thinks the affairs of Ontario will be just as well administered by one party as by the other. The feeling is there and must be given its weight in estimating the causes of the overthrow of the Government.

"Lastly, there must have been very many stalwart Liberals out of sympathy with the party, chiefly, no doubt, because of the purity-at-elections issue.

"The weather conditions under which the election took place were most difficult. The temperature was below zero, and the bitter wind and the drifting snow added to the discomforts of going out of doors. This deterred many people from voting, but the result is so decisive that the weather could not be seriously blamed by either party.

"The Conservative victory was obtained with the minimum of loss. Of the Conservative members who went up for re-election only Mr. Dennis Murphy of Ottawa and Mr. W. D. MacLeod of Glengarry was defeated. The most prominent member of the party defeated was Mr. James Clancy, ex-M. P., in West Kent.

The Liberals defeated were among the leaders of the party. Five members of the Cabinet go down—Hon. F. R. Latchford, Attorney-General; Hon. W. A. Charlton, Commissioner of Public Works; Hon. John Dryden, Minister of Agriculture; Hon. J. M. Gibson and Hon. F. A. E. Evan-turel, Ministers without portfolio.

Complaints reach the Herald from citizens residing in the lower end of the city that the snow plowing contractor is neglecting his duty to that locality. Up to this morning the plow had not made its appearance on Church street or on other important thoroughfares in that vicinity. One citizen says that this neglect has been apparent for the past two years, and he thinks the roadmaster should see that the residents down town are treated more fairly in the matter. Will Mr. McKay give it his immediate attention?

The Sun presents in the statement that the Conservatives now control all the local governments in Canada west of Quebec, which is not correct. As the Sun knows, the northwest government is a coalition.

Fifteen thousand men were employed cleaning up New York's streets after the recent snow storm.

BITS OF NEWS.

The Dawson city hockey team were defeated in North Sydney Thursday night by the Victorias, 5 to 0.

About fifty Conservative members of the Halifax club gave R. L. Borden a banquet at the club Thursday night. Mr. Borden will leave on Wednesday next for Ottawa to be present at the nomination proceedings in Carleton.

Senator Wood, treasurer of Mt. Allison University, has received a cheque for \$25,000 from Massey Harris Co., Toronto, being the second payment on bequest of \$100,000 left to Mt. Allison by the late Hart A. Massey. So far Mt. Allison has received \$75,000 of this amount.

The body of Ellen Danphy was found in the snow in a field, two miles from Cardigan Bridge, P. E. Island, Thursday. She left the village on Monday evening and lost her way. The deceased was 75 years of age. For some time she had been wandering from house to house depending on charity.

The death occurred Tuesday at the family residence at Sussex of Mrs. McCully, widow of the late Robert McCully. She was eighty years of age and much esteemed by all who knew her. She leaves one daughter, Mrs. Gilbert Wilbur, of Shediac, and five sons, among whom are Dr. O. J. McCully, of St. John; Rev. A. D. McCully, of Sussex; and F. A. McCully, barrister of Moncton.

A writ has been issued in the high court at Brockville, Ont., by Rev. F. Chisholm of Phillipsville, prohibition candidate in Leeds, in the Ontario election, against Alonzo Bradley, a Westport cheese maker, asking for unstated damages for slanderous statements alleged to have been circulated by Bradley, concerning the plaintiff's intemperate habits. This is an aftermath of the campaign in Leeds.

Alfred R. Crosby, a prominent Yarmouth grocer was found dead Wednesday night about 100 yards from his residence. He left his store shortly after nine o'clock and not reaching home by 11 his family became alarmed and started to investigate. Deceased had complained for some time of a weakness about the heart, which it is believed caused his death. He is about sixty-eight years of age and left a family.

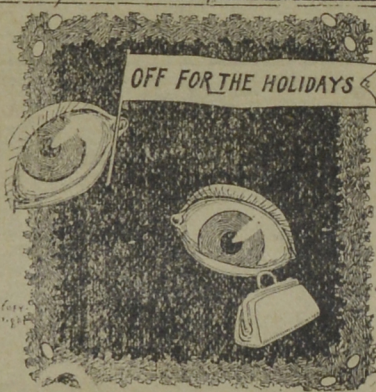
A London despatch says:—The second British cruiser squadron, under command of Prince Louis of Battenburg, will sail in February on an eight months' cruise, visiting American ports among others. All the vessels are of the most recent construction. It will be the fastest squadron that has ever left Great Britain on an extended cruise. The Drake, the flagship, has a speed of 24 knots, while the Berwick, Cumberland and Cornwall, Essex, and other, can each make 23 knots.

Mother on Snowed up Train Could Not Reach Dying Baby.

Probably to no one did the terrific storm of Wednesday and Thursday cause more inconvenience and actual hardship than to the passengers on trains that were held up along the C. P. R. and Intercolonial, says the St. John Times.

On the C. P. R. train stalled near Grand Bay, in the cutting at Shanty town, there were a number of passengers bound to St. John. Several of them had important business engagements and to them the delay was a source of much inconvenience. To one of them at least, this being held up almost in sight of St.

John, was of far deeper moment. It caused heart-rending anxiety.

This was a woman, a resident of St. John, who had been away from her home. During her absence her baby was taken seriously ill. When its condition became critical the mother was sent for. She made all haste to reach the child's bedside, when the delay came, and from early Thursday morning until late Friday she was practically a prisoner in the snowbound train. Meanwhile her baby is dying.

The frantic mother made every effort to reach the city, but in vain. Teams were not to be procured, and if they were the condition of the roads were such that they could make but little headway. Walking seven miles through mountainous drifts was, for a delicate woman, out of the question. Consequently she was forced to endure what could not be remedied and remain on the train.

The train that is stalled is known as the Boston express and was due to reach St. John at 11.45 on Wednesday night. Since early Thursday morning it has been stalled at Shantytown and there it remains.

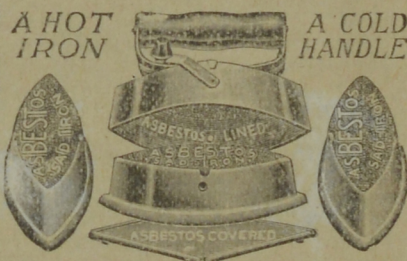
