

WAR AND STRIKE.

A Bloody Battle in Which Russians Lost Over 1,000 Men.

STRIKE CONDITIONS STILL CAUSE FOR ALARM.

Hundreds of Thousands Idle—Ameri- can Steamer Seized by the Japanese.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Jan. 28.—A telegram from Chasinamutun says that the Russians lost 45 officers and 1,000 men killed and wounded in battle, Jan. 26.

The Russians took 102 prisoners, arms, wagons and ammunition.

Tokio, Jan. 28.—The U. S. steamer, M. S. Dollar, to Vladivostok, with provisions and forage was seized by the Japanese yesterday, near Hakknido Island.

Washington, Jan. 28.—U. S. Consul General Watts, St. Petersburg, cabled the state department this morning re the Russian situation.

He says the strike is spreading and the conditions are serious at Mabu. At Warsaw all workshops are stopped and 100,000 men are out, the Vienna Railway men joining.

The gas works are being operated by soldiers.

New York, Jan. 28.—Notice was received here today that the Japanese military administration will decline messages for Port Arthur and Dalny.

Moscow, Jan. 28.—The newspapers reappeared today.

Factories inspectors report 20,000 persons still out. Work has been resumed in some factories. Thus far there have been no disturbances of importance.

No bread is left in the bakeries. 100,000 persons have struck in a body. Telephone communication with the city is interrupted.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 28.—At the last meeting of the committee of ministers, President Witte, according to the Russ, emphasized the necessity of the committee discussing and formulating views on recent events at the capital. He considered inquiry into the causes imperative.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 28.—General Kuropatkin reports that Russian troops at 7 p. m. on Jan. 26, after a desperate fight, occupied the village of Sandepas, which had been strongly fortified by the Japanese.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 28.—General Kuropatkin, under date of Jan. 25, telegraphs as follows to Emperor Nicholas:

"The advance has commenced of right flank against the enemy. We have occupied Khailatosa and Kheigoutaya."

"We occupied Khailatosa without firing, the Japanese being bayoneted. Kheigoutaya was bravely defended, but we finally occupied it at 10 o'clock at night."

"From later reports it appears that in capturing these positions we made prisoners of 100 Japanese. We also occupied the village of Weheit-aise, on the Hun river, losing fifty men."

"On Jan. 26 our troops continued the offensive against Sandepas. The Japanese attacked our position near the village from the south and south east, but were repulsed. Our cavalry participated, manoeuvring against the left flank and attacked the Japanese in the rear."

"Our force then attacked Sandepas and at 7 p. m., after a desperate fight, with the assistance of sappers, we surmounted the strong entrenchments and occupied the large village."

"The same day our troops occupied the enemy's entrenchments at Shakhe and repulsed Japanese attempts to retake them."

Huanchan, Jan. 28.—On Thursday the Japanese began moving at the Russian right, attacking viciously Russian positions along the Hun river where that stream bends southward. Inside the Russian lines the belief existed that General Nogi's army arrived from Port Arthur, was in reserve, supporting the movement. The Russians not only beat off the attack after severe fighting, but advanced in the evening to the line of

Hugoudi and Hounlitadzy. Throughout the night and today the artillery was at work, cannonading constantly increasing in strength and extending further along the centre, becoming fiercer every minute.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

One Man Killed and Two Others Injured in Cape Breton Mine.

Sydney, N. S., Jan. 28.—James McDonald was killed, and two brothers, Ralph and Richmond Bramwell were injured by falling stone at No. 3, Dominion Colliery, Glace Bay.

McDonald's neck was broken, Bramwell's arm was broken and his teeth knocked out.

The accident was caused by a car striking one of the props in the mine and knocking it out.

The Dominion Coal Company's Steamer Dominion is engaged carrying stores from Halifax to Gibraltar.

MONTREAL FIRE.

Destroyed Big Mercantile House— Loss \$600,000.

Montreal, Jan. 28.—Fire this morning at the corner of Craig and St. Lawrence streets did \$600,000 damage.

The building that was gutted was occupied by the National Rubber Company, Kilgour & Co., furniture store, Omyote, liquors and Desrivieres, contractors. The cause of the fire is not known.

St. John Man's Death.

THE WEST IS OVER.

Fredericton Again Has Railway Commu- cation with the Outside World.

Railway traffic in this section which was seriously interrupted by the late storm, is getting into shape again and it is expected that by the first of next week the trains will be again running as near schedule time as is possible at this season of the year. The "tie up" was one of the worst ever experienced here and caused inconvenience to a great many people. While there was some grumbling, most people accepted the situation philosophically and made the best of it.

The first train to reach the city during a period of 36 hours, arrived at five o'clock yesterday afternoon, bringing passengers and mails from Montreal and the west. The passengers were stalled for two days, and had rather a serious time of it, although the railway officials did everything in their power to make it pleasant for them. Mr. Alex. McNeill of the agricultural department, Ottawa, was among the number and managed to get here in time to fill an engagement with the Fruit Growers' Association. He whiled away the time on the train devouring a bulky volume of Dominion census returns, and consequently his address to the fruit growers was well charged with statistics. As he himself described it the census book was all that intervened between him and utter despair.

The first train bringing passengers and mails from St. John got in shortly after nine o'clock in the evening. There was a large quantity of welcome mail matter, and Postmaster Hilyard and his staff were not long in getting it in shape for distribution. They kept the post office, including the delivery window, open until after eleven o'clock for the accommodation of the public.

The first train today from the Junction did not arrive until two o'clock this afternoon. It brought passengers and mails from St. John, Boston and the west.

All the regular trains are again running on the I. C. R., and the Loggieville express was only forty minutes late this afternoon.

Seeking a Divorce.

A Boston despatch says:—Mrs. Janie Torrance of Chelsea has petitioned the Suffolk county superior court here for a divorce from Thomas A. Torrance of St. Stephen, N. B. She was married at Fredericton, May 20, 1885. Mrs. Torrance alleges that she was deserted at Harvey, N. B., in July, 1887. The case will be heard early in March.

ST. JOHN RIVER NAVIGATION.

New Brunswick Lumberman Made a Com- plaint at Ottawa.

Ottawa, Jan. 27.—J. Fraser Gregory, St. John, had an interview with members of the government yesterday and extracted the promise that a communication would immediately be sent to Washington with reference to the boom at Van Buren on the St. John river, which is the cause of the complaint. The matter will probably be referred to the commission composed of three Americans and three Canadians, which will shortly begin investigation concerning condition and uses of waters adjacent to the boundary line between the United States and Canada.

A bill is now before the Maine legislature authorizing the construction of new piers at a disputed point and the Canadian Government will urge Washington to see that no further progress is made in this legislation until the commission has investigated and reported.

Lots of Pockey

The Trojans will meet the St. John Neptunes in a league hockey game at the Arctic rink on Monday evening. The Trojans have strengthened their team since they played Sackville, and promise to make things lively for the St. John boys. On Wednesday the Trojans play the Neptunes at St. John, and on Friday evening they will go up against the Dawson city team at the Arctic rink.
