tions throughout the province upon line somewhat similar to those which have been very useful under the experimental union of the Ontario Agricultural College.

(3.)—Supervision of research work, regular students intending to follow occupations connected with agriculture, horticulture or industries, and leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture.

ORGANIZATION.

The work might be carried on in six departments:

- 1.—Agriculture and live stock.
- 2.—Nature study.
- 3.—Horticulture.
- 4.—Agricultural chemistry and physics.
- 5.—English and mathematics.
- 6.—Illustration stations on the farm.

In connection with the foregoing memorandum your committee desire to especially commend:—

1.—The encouragement of the consolidation of the rural schools and the extension of the school garden work for the practical teaching of nature study and that special provision be given for training suitable teachers.

2.—The carrying on of short courses in stock judging, poultry raising, seed grain judging, &c., at various central points.

3.—That every possible means should be taken to encourage our own farmers to fit themselves as competent live stock judges and farmers' institutes speakers by means such as have proved successful in Ontario.

As Hon. L. J. Tweedie and Prof. J. W. Robertson have both intimated their willingness to meet this committee to further discuss this

question we beg to report progress and ask leave to sit again.

Meredith's Opinion.

London, Jan. 27.—George Meredith, the eminent author, in the course of an interview expressed the strong conviction that "the long reign of despotism which blocks western Europe is slowly but surely coming to an end."

"The Emperor, a weak, nervous, creature," Mr. Meredith says: "We must pity him fall. He has no will of his own and as for the Grand Dukes, they are the enemies of human kind, and nobody in the world would regret their disappearance. They are the real authors of the terrible events at St. Petersburg, and Moscow. It is known now that a bureaucracy with the Grand Dukes at its head rules Russia."

A meeting of the petitioners with the emperor might have avoided bloodshed, and delayed the revolution a few years, but nothing could prevent the early downfall of the government. The revolutionaries are scattered and have few leaders, and the poor creatures cannot hope to resist the troops.

I think that events following the course of the strike will stop the war, in Manchuria and dragging of the people into submission may prevent reinforcing the army there.

Kuropatkin's reinforcements and supplies cut off, he will have no choice but to attempt a stroke which I am convinced will end in failure, and will send a wave back to St. Petersburg, which will overwhelm the emperor and grand dukes, and in that way the revolution will be effected."

In conclusion Mr. Meredith contended that it is impossible that Russia can long escape the spirit of liberalism that has overswept Europe and the voice of the Emperor himself means nothing after the appointment of such a man as Trepoff.

Sympathizing Englishmen should give a practical support in the shape of money to the Russian reformers.

White Hair Without Honor.

No Serbian matron who respects herself would appear in public with white hair, nor does she hide the fact that she dyes it periodically. This custom has come down to her from her mother and grandmother.

Fined a Dead Man.

After a juror in a Sydney (Australia) court had been fined \$10 for two days in succession for absence it was discovered that he was dead.
