

300,000 MEN.

In General Kuropatkin's
Army at Mukden.JAPANESE TROOPS WITHIN 500
YARDS OF RUSSIANS.But No Immediate Prospect of a Big
Battle.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Tokio, Jan. 24.—In well informed quarters it is said the Russian army at Mukden has recently been reinforced by four divisions. Its present strength is estimated at nine army corps, or 300,000 men of all arms.

Gen. Kuropatkin's headquarters is in close touch with Mukden and Fushin. The Russians have heavily strengthened the right wing, and at present two half divisions are facing General Oku.

The opposing armies have a net work of trenches, and Kuropatkin's outposts are within 500 yards of the Russians, who are entrenched along a line of ridges near Kwantailen Mountain.

Cannonading and rifle firing are constantly taking place, but owing to the intense cold there seems no immediate likelihood of a great battle.

Tokio, Jan. 24.—Vice Admiral Kamimura, left here yesterday to rejoin the fleet.

It was recently announced that the Russian Vladivostok squadron is believed to be repaired, and it is thought might come out at any moment.

The navy department is strenuously preparing for the second stage of the war.

SPREADS TO MOSCOW.

Two Thousand Men on Strike but
City Quiet—Outrage at London.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

London, Jan. 24.—The big brass plate on the entrance to the Russian embassy here was wrenched off at two o'clock this morning.

The special constable on duty at the embassy witnessed the act, but was unable to get to the spot in time to arrest the man who eluded pursuit. The incident is regarded simply as the act of a common thief.

Moscow, Jan. 24.—Employees of the tanneries who are striking, remain quiet, and the police have ordered arms removed from the windows of the gunsmiths, the majority of whom have closed their shops.

The strikers here at noon today totalled two thousand.

Vienna, Jan. 24.—The occurrences of Sunday at St. Petersburg, have made the deepest impression here upon all classes and is practically the sole topic of discussion at the principal cafes, clubs, and in the diplomatic and official circles.

The feelings prevail in anti-Russian quarters that open revolution has begun and that there is no telling the end.

Diplomatic circles here are deeply concerned over St. Petersburg. It is believed that the present disorder will soon be put down by the troops now at St. Petersburg, but in some quarters it is thought it will only increase the bitterness of the rage of the people.

GREYS AT MONTREAL.

How? asked the Magistrate.
