

LAI D TO REST.

All Classes Pay Tribute to the Late Mrs. Medley.

FUNERAL VERY LARGELY ATTENDED

Many Clergymen Took Part in the Service.

REMAINS INTERRED IN THE BISHOP'S LOT NEAR THE CATHEDRAL.

In the presence of a large and sorrowing concourse of people, representing all walks of life, the mortal remains of the late Mrs. Margaret Medley, were tenderly laid to rest alongside of her deceased husband, the late Bishop Medley, Metropolitan of Canada, in the lot at the east end of the Cathedral this afternoon.

The funeral took place from the late residence of the deceased, Bishopscote, at 2:30 o'clock, and a very large number of prominent citizens took advantage of the opportunity to pay their last tribute of respect to the deceased. The remains, which were enclosed in a beautiful cloth casket, were borne from the house to the Cathedral by the sidesmen, those performing the sacred duty being Messrs. George Y. Dibble, J. A. Winslow, C. H. Allen, A. O. Sharp, W. E. Smith and George N. Babbitt. The pall bearers were Messrs. T. C. Allen, Alex. Burchill, T. B. Winslow, G. T. Whelpley, Geo. Hazen and A. F. Street. The list of chief mourners included Judge Wilkinson, Chatham, Dr. W. C. Crockett, Rev. Dean Partridge, J. DeL. Robinson, Dr. L. W. Bailey, Dr. Harrison, John Cameron, John Lister, George C. Hunt, A. A. Sterling, Thomas Wandless, John Wilson, Major Cropley, F. P. Robinson, J. J. F. Winslow, Rev. J. H. MacDonald, Rev. Dr. Rogers, Dr. Inch and Rev. G. B. Payson. His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Judge Gregory were among those in attendance. The general public, to the number of several hundred, brought up the rear of the procession.

The casket was taken into the Cathedral by the western door and deposited in the chancel. The spacious edifice was filled to overflowing and there were not a few tear stained eyes to be seen during the solemn and impressive service. His Lordship Bishop Kingston conducted the service, and was assisted by Revs. Dean Partridge, Sub-dean Street and Canon Roberts, of Fredericton, Archdeacon Neales of Woodstock, Archdeacon Forsythe, of Chatham, Scovil Neales, rector of Sussex, W. B. Belliss, rector of Westfield, and H. Montgomery, rector of Springhill, H. E. Dibble, rector of Oromocto, W. B. Forster, curate of St. Ann's, A. B. Murray, rector of Stanley, Dunham, of Doaktown, McKel of Fairville and McDonald, of St. John.

The musical part of the service was most impressive, the full choir being in attendance, with Prof. F. B. Powell presiding at the organ. The hymns rendered were "Now the Laborer's Task is O'er" and "Ye Saints of the Lord," both favorites of the deceased in her lifetime. The choir also sang the anthem "They shall Hunger no More," composed by the late Metropolitan on the occasion of the death of the late Bishop Fields.

At the conclusion of the beautiful service, the body was taken charge of by a relay of sidesmen composed of John Cameron, Lewis Bliss, C. M. Manning, C. W. Whelpley, A. E. Brock and G. N. Babbitt, and conveyed to the bishop's lot at the east end of the Cathedral and committed to the grave to await a glorious resurrection.

Mr. John G. Adams ably discharged the duties of funeral director.

The great esteem in which the deceased lady was held in the community was attested by the large number of people who have called at Bishopscote since Monday to have a farewell look at the remains.

All were struck by the remarkably peaceful and lifelike expression worn by the deceased lady. The floral tributes were very beautiful, the list including the following:

Judge Wilkinson, who is an old personal friend of the deceased, informs the Herald that the published statement regarding her age was incorrect. He says she was born in

April, 1819, one month before Queen Victoria, and was therefore in her eighty-sixth year. He also says that the late Mrs. Medley was born at Cumberland, England, and not at Exeter, as stated by the newspapers.

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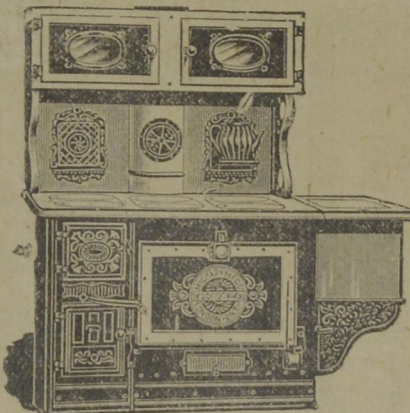
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
