CUSTOM'S RETURNS.

The value of goods entered for consumption at the port of Fredericton

during the month just ended was \$35,535, of which \$22,202 represented free goods. The amount collected in duties was \$3,050.27. For the corresponding month last year the imports amounted to \$33,148, and duty to \$4,909.79.

AMONG THE CURLERS.

Fowler Beat all Maritime Province Records at Points—Local Matches Continued.

Mr. Thos. L. Fowler, the crack curler of the Fredericton club, and one of the best in the maritime provinces, made a record breaking score at points yesterday afternoon. The possible score is 72, and Mr. Fowler piled up 58, which is the highest ever made in the maritime provinces, and is only 3 behind the best Canadian record. A Winnipeg curler is said to have made 61 points last season.
