SHE WAS A SMUGGLER.

Mrs. Chadwick Said to Have Dealt Largely in Diamonds.

Cleveland, Jan. 18.—The Plain Dealer to-morrow will say: Investigation into the charge that Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick smuggled large quantities of diamonds, gems and other precious stones into the United States has developed the fact that the woman dealt in precious stones to an almost fabulous extent. In order to make a case on the charge of smuggling it was found necessary for the government authorities to trace all the deals for diamonds and jewellery made by Mrs. Chadwick, both in this country and Europe. The statement had been made by Collector of Customs Leach that considerably more than \$250,000 worth of jewellery and precious stones handled by Mrs. Chadwick have been traced and positively located. It is added that this great amount of jewellery has been uncovered, with the investigation still incomplete. Of this amount, the government is directly interested in about one-third. While the government is attempting simply to collect any unpaid duties on diamonds brought from Europe, it is said that all the information secured through the investigation will be placed at the disposal of Receiver Nathan Lleser, and that he will be able to realize thousands of dollars for the creditors of the woman. The investigation has led to the discovery that only a very small portion of precious stones and jewellery was put up as collateral for loans made by Mrs. Chadwick, and that by far the greater portion went as gifts to friends and acquaintances.

Invisible Fire in a Wall.

Chicago, Jan. 18.—Despite the united efforts of the greater portion of the Fire Department of Chicago an invisible fire in the beef storage department of Schwarzhild & Sulzberger's plant at the Stock Yards has produced dense smoke for more than twenty-four hours, causing the temporary asphyxiating of thirty-three firemen and helpers, and a loss by fire on the building and by smoke on the beef of \$400,000.

Although smoke tonight continued to pour out of the burning building in clouds, no sign of a blaze has been seen by the firemen since the fire started Sunday evening. The fire is in an eight-foot sawdust wall, used to retain cold atmosphere. There are no apertures giving access to the burning sawdust, which is packed tightly in the wall. The firemen opened several holes, but in each instance were compelled to run for their lives on account of the rush of smoke and gas which poured from the opening. Fire Chief Campion says the fire may burn for several days.

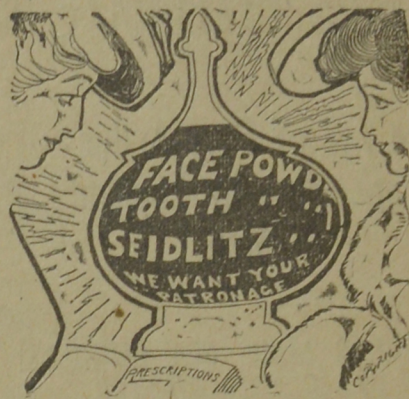

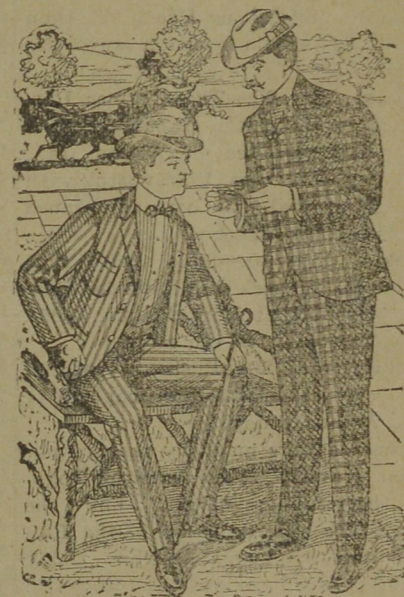
