

TROJANS BLANKED.

The Sackville Boys Too
Fast Company for Them.

EXCITING HOCKEY GAME AT THE
ARCTIC RINK.

Play Rough at Times and Casualties
Were Numerous.

Upwards of one thousand spectators saw the Sackville hockey team shut out the Trojans by a score of 6 to 0 at the Arctic rink last evening. The game was one of the most exciting seen here for some time, though as a scientific exhibition it was not quite up to the standard.

There was the usual delay and humbug prior to the commencement of the game, and it lacked fifteen minutes of ten o'clock when play commenced. The Sackville boys did not arrive until the evening train and it nine o'clock when they came into the rink. Then there was trouble in finding a referee. George Blizzard, of St. John, failed to show up, the Sackville boys, for some reason of their own, would not accept C. H. Allen, of this city, George Ferguson declined to act, and as a last resort, J. Douglas Black was appealed to and consented to step into the gap. The job did not turn out to be a very congenial one, but he acquitted himself fairly well.

When the teams lined up it was seen that the Trojans had the advantage in weight, but the handicap did not prove a very serious one to the boys from the Tantramar. They proved themselves fast skaters; they were away up in all the wrinkles of the game, and simply put things all over the Trojans. The latter seemed to be outclassed at every point and were beaten as fairly as it was possible to beat them. The Sackville forwards worked together as one man and the exhibition of long range shooting given by them has never been equalled here, and simply dumbfounded the Trojans. Of course the sympathy of the great majority of the spectators was with the home team, but they had to applaud the many brilliant plays of the visitors; in fact there was very little else to applaud.

IN DETAIL.

At the sound of the referee's whistle the Sackville boys went at the puck whirlwind fashion, and soon had it dangerously close to the Trojan's goal. Gradually it was worked back towards the other end of the rink when Laidlaw got possession of it and to the great surprise of the spectators shot a goal from his place at cover point. It may have been only luck, but it was certainly the most remarkable shot ever made in the Arctic rink. A few minutes after the face off Robinson sent the puck into the Sackville net, but it was from an offside play and did not count. After a series of scrimmages, in Fredericton territory, Stewart got the puck and sent it flying through the air towards the Fredericton goal. To the surprise of everybody it landed squarely into the net, and made the score stand 2 to 0 in the visitors' favor. A little later Sackville's centre got the puck on a pass and shot another goal. Things began to look a trifle blue for the Trojans by this time and there was quite a sharp decline in their stock. They rallied somewhat after the third goal had been made against them and made things lively for a time near the Sackville end of the rink. Their combination work was not good, however, and they could not hold the visitors for any length of time. They aimed several hot shots at their goal, but Hill did not let anything go past him. Phalen finally secured the puck on a pass, and carrying it unopposed to within a few feet of the Trojan's goal, scored a fourth time for his team.

After the face off the puck was sent to Sackville territory, and McManiman made an unsuccessful effort to score. A Sackville man received a clout on the head from a hockey stick at this stage, and was obliged to take a short rest. Shortly afterwards McManiman and Laidlaw got into an altercation and the referee gave them each a two minute vacation. Shortly afterwards Rowan received a blow in the face from the puck, which knocked him down. He had to be carried from the ice, and was unable to continue the game. His place was taken by Frank Hughes. The accident caused a delay of five minutes, and shortly after play was resumed half time was called.

THE SECOND HALF.

The second half of the game was faster and rougher than the first

half, and at times excitement was almost to fever heat. Frank Staples, of the Trojans, was knocked down, and injured so severely that he had to retire from the game, Harold Babbitt taking his place. One of the Sackville men was also injured in the second half, but managed to return his place in the game. The Sackville boys scored twice in the second half, bringing the score up to 6 to 0. The Trojans worked hard to save themselves from being shut out but fate was against them, and they had to be content with a goose egg.

Sackville's victory puts them in first place in the league, and the indications are that they will carry off the trophy. They have already defeated Moncton, and the St. John teams will likely prove very easy game for them.

There will be something doing at the Arctic rink on Tuesday evening next when the Trojans and Marysville Crescents will try conclusions. As there is a good deal of rivalry between the teams an exciting game may be looked for. It will be a benefit night for the Trojans, and it is up to all lovers of the sport to attend and give the boys a helping hand. The Trojans have done much to keep alive the hockey spirit in Fredericton, and their efforts should be appreciated. The Fredericton Brass Band will play a program of ten pieces after the game, and the Marysville suburban will be held.

Hockey Player Hurt.

During last night's hockey game at the Arctic rink Frank Rowan, of the Trojans, was struck in the face by the puck and sustained a painful injury. It is doubtful if he will be able to participate in any more games this season. Rowan has been one of the strong men of the Trojans and his friends will regret to learn of his misfortune.

Death at Lincoln.

The death occurred at Lincoln Tuesday after a lingering illness of consumption of Mr. Ashley Nevers, a well known resident. He was forty-two years of age, and is survived by a widow and three children. The funeral will take place on Sunday at three o'clock. R. B. Adams, undertaker.

TRAIN DITCHED.

While Running at a Speed
of 70 Miles an Hour.

MANY PASSENGERS SERIOUSLY IN-
JURED, BUT NONE KILLED.

Mrs. Howard of Fredericton, Sus-
tained Fractured Arm.

WRECK OCCURRED TO NIGHT TRAIN, ST.
JOHN TO BOSTON.

St. John, January 20.—The "Sun Rise" express from Halifax and St. John to Boston, was wrecked this morning, a short distance from Durham station, New Hampshire.

Four cars were derailed and a number of passengers were injured, though none seriously. No one was killed.

The accident was caused by a broken rail.

Belle Donald, of Hampton, has severe injuries to her head and her shoulder dislocated.

The colored porter of the Pullman car had his head and shoulder lacerated and bruised, being thrown through the car window.

Albert Hall, of Portland, Me., was internally injured.

Charles Dunn, Jr., of Portland, Me. head and his hip injured.

Mrs. Allen Howard, of Fredericton, N. B., had her arm fractured.

(Mrs. Howard, who resides on Westmorland street, in this city, was en route to Boston, to visit her daughter.)

It is thought that all the injured persons will recover.

Seven other persons sustained injuries necessitating medical attention and a dozen sustained cuts and bruises of a minor nature.

The train was an hour late and was running at a speed of seventy miles an hour.

The forward part of the train passed over the broken rail safely, but the four passenger cars behind the pullman sleeper were ditched with no serious damage to them.
