THE TALK ABOUT PEACE.

Czar Said to be Preparing Russian Public
for Announcement that War is Over.

AND OYAMA BELIEVED TO HAVE INSTRUCTIONS NOT
TO FORCE A BATTLE.

Until Result of Negotiations is Known.

St. Petersburg, June 9.—(Special)—The government is plainly preparing the public for the announcement that the emperor has decided to conclude peace, and that the negotiations have begun by permitting the publication of all the foreign despatches bearing on the subject.

The newspapers say the Russian public however, until now have only had a suspicion that important measures were going on behind the scenes.

In well informed circles it is believed that Japan has already instructed Field Marshall Oyama to stay his hand, pending the result of the present tentative negotiations, and that General Linewitch has also been confidentially advised of the situation.

Nevertheless the irreconcilable remains of the war party are believed to be urging the Russian commander in chief to assume the offensive in the hope of achieving a victory, and thus change the Emperor's disposition in favor of the conclusion of hostilities.

If such an intrigue is in progress, it has a chance of success. It can be assumed that there will be no further bloodshed in Manchuria until the belligerents decide whether it is now possible to agree on peace terms.

"The government in the present emergency is acting with great wisdom. It is preparing to time the proclamation of a national assembly with the announcement that peace negotiations have been begun."

FLIES HER OWN FLAG.

Norway Marks Her Secession from the Union by Running up the Tri Color—Great Rejoicing.

Christiania, Norway, June 9.—(Special)—The Norwegian tri-color was hoisted this morning over Akershus Fort, and throughout the country, in place of the union flag.

The substitution was attended by a great ceremony at the Fort, where the members of the Storting were assembled, and the public witnessed the event from points of advantage. The garrison was paraded in front

of the quarters of the commandant of the fort, and the commandant read the resolution of the Storting, dissolving the union with Sweden.

The flag of the union, which has hung since 1814, on Christiania Fort, was then pulled down and the tri-color substituted.

There was great cheering and excitement.

EQUITABLE AFFAIRS.

Negotiations in Progress for Purchase
of Hyde's Stock.

New York, June 9.—(Special)—"A conference was held," says the World, "lasting until an early hour this morning, at which negotiations for the purchase of stock control of the Equitable Life Insurance Society owned by James H. Hyde, were made by George J. Gould on behalf of a syndicate of financiers and business men."

"When the conference ended," the World asserts, "satisfactory progress had been made, and it is expected the sale of Mr. Hyde's stock will be ratified before the meeting of the Equitable directors."

"Later Hyde said he would not sell on any terms."

WILL INVADE PARIS.

John Alexander Dowie to Make Descent on the French Capital.

Chicago, June 9.—(Special)—John Alexander Dowie is planning a crusade against sin in Paris, and is organizing a restoration post at Zion City.

He will invade Paris the same as his invasion of New York, but no women will be taken.

The invading host will have 300 men and \$200,000.

The shipment amounted to \$22,000.

INSTANTLY KILLED.

Log Driver Met Death from a Falling Tree.

Winnipeg, June 9.—(Special)—Harvey Simpson of Burk's Falls, was killed by a falling tree at MacDonald's Landing near Rat Portage.

The young man was at work on a log drive on Otter Lake, when his mates started to fell a dead tree dangerously overhanging the camp grounds.

The tree swerved in falling and struck Simpson on the back of the head, killing him instantly.

VICTIM OF LEPROSY.

Chinaman Removed from Vancouver to the B. C. Lazaretto.

Vancouver, B. C., June 9.—(Special)—Sing, a Chinaman, was taken to Darcy Island Lazaretto, suffering from leprosy.

He is the third victim to be taken from this city to the dread lazaretto where no steamers, save supply boats, call, and where no one lives but a few affected Chinamen.

Sing is but 21 years old, and has the disease in a mild form, so he may linger for years.

THE NORMAL SCHOOL.

The Public Examination Took Place This Morning.

GOVERNOR GENERAL'S MEDALS WON BY MISS BESSIE PARKER AND MISS MARY CRISP.

The public examination of the Provincial Normal School took place this forenoon, and attracted quite a number of visitors. The exercises were along practical lines, they were not quite so entertaining as in former years, but no great harm is likely to result to the students from the change.

Beautiful weather graced the occasion, and in the bright faces of the two hundred or so students there was no indication that their nine months sojourn in Fredericton had not been congenial to them, both mentally and physically.

The proceedings opened at 10.30 o'clock with a scriptural lesson by the principal, followed by a chorus selection by the pupils, Prof. Cadwallader playing the accompaniment. The students were then examined in the various subjects taught them during the term, and acquitted themselves in a manner highly creditable.

They were examined first by the principal, and then by each of the instructors in turn, and the prompt and satisfactory manner in which the questions were answered and exercises worked out furnished proof of the thorough system of training in vogue at the Normal School.

The church was exquisitely decorated in apple blossoms forming arches, also roses, ferns and many potted plants, and the marriage took place beneath a canopy of apple blossoms and foliage.

The approach of the wedding party was announced by the organist, who rendered effectively, "Here Comes the Bride," and instantly the attention of every one was concentrated on the door.

The groom was the first to appear, attended by Mr. Henry R. Emmerson, Jr., and took his place at the altar; shortly after the bride entered, preceded by her little sister, Miss Marion Emmerson, and was led beneath the floral canopy by her father, Miss Florence Deacon, sister of the groom, made a charming bridesmaid, and the party at the altar presented a striking spectacle.

The choir of the church sang the wedding hymn, "The Voice That Breathed O'er Eden," and the solemn service of the church was preceded with. Immediately after the benediction the party was driven to the home of the bride's father, where a reception was held, and the wedding couple were offered the good wishes of their many relatives and friends, which was perhaps the most interesting feature of the occasion.
