

UNDERTAKERS IN A WRANGLE.

Over Body of a Suicide—Each Had a Permit to Take Remains, Signed by a Coroner.

SCENES LIKE THIS ARE COMMON.

Elmhurst, L. I., May 26.—Frank Lundberg, aged 32, married, and who has been a resident of this place for the last two years, was found dead in his apartment, in the Bank Block, yesterday afternoon, by his brother-in-law.

Lundberg, who has been married about three years, had been drinking heavily for the last week, and his wife remonstrated with him on Monday evening, and, after telling him that she would not remain with him as long as he continued drinking, she took her baby and went to her stepbrother's home in Brooklyn, where she remained all night. Yesterday afternoon she sent her brother to her home to see if her husband had stopped drinking. Arriving at their apartment he knocked several times but received no answer. Noticing the odor of gas escaping in the hall, the brother forced his way into the apartment.

When the door was opened Mr. Lundberg was almost overcome with gas, and was horrified to find his brother dead on the floor alongside of a couch on which he had evidently thrown himself after opening every gas jet in the room.

Mr. Lundberg notified the police, and they, in turn, informed the coroner of the suicide. A short time after the coroner had been notified, and after the suicide had become known about the streets, an undertaker's wagon from Winfield was driven to the house and the undertaker endeavored to take away the body, showing the officer in charge a permit signed by the coroner permitting him to do so. While the coroner in charge and the Winfield undertaker were arguing the question of the latter's right to take the body from the dead man's home, an Elmhurst undertaker came upon the scene

with another permit, which he claimed gave him the permission to take charge of the body, claiming that the death was in his territory and that for this reason the body belonged to him. For a time it seemed as if there would be blows struck by the two undertakers, and it was only through the diplomacy of a policeman that there was not a fight in the apartment of the dead man.

The officer allowed the Elmhurst undertaker to take charge of the body, which he did after the Winfield man left for his village, vowing vengeance upon the policeman and undertaker from this place.

These unseemly controversies over dead bodies are of common occurrence in this locality. The fault, it is claimed, lays with the coroners of the county, all of whom give each undertaker a book of signed permits which authorize the undertaker to take possession of a body when it is found.

Several times there has actually been races by the undertakers of the villages in this locality for a body, and in one instance there were blows struck because an undertaker would not allow another, who was authorized by the dead man's family to take charge of the body.

In another instance an undertaker had to be taken from a house on account of his language, and his actions, because he was not allowed the possession of a body that had been found on the road of an adjoining village, and which was given into the care of another undertaker, who was preparing it for burial.

These occurrences are becoming the talk of the place, but apparently they will not cease until the coroners stop issuing blank signed permits to the undertakers.

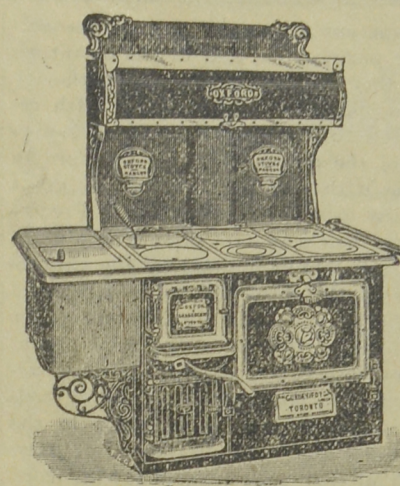
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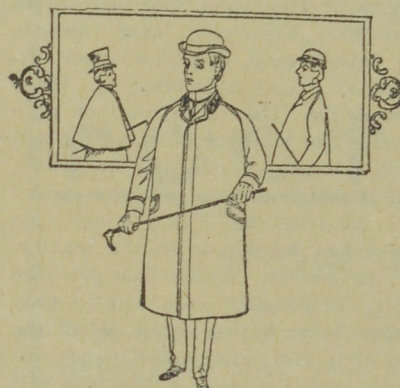
