GOLF.

BRITISH TEAM MAY COME.

An officer of the Chicago Golf Club has received a letter from a prominent English golfer inquiring about the conditions for the Olympic cup competition, which will be held on Aug. 7, the day previous to the starting of the amateur championship of the United States. The writer says it may be possible to arrange a British team to compete in the Olympic cup event, and as the best players available to make the trip will be selected, they will compete in the national amateur championship if permitted.

There are no rules in the United States Golf Association code at present which would make the foreigners eligible for the championship, but a special ruling undoubtedly would be made to let them in, as in the case of Miss Lottie Dod. It is a matter of courtesy to the United States Golf Association over to the British as Walter J. Travis, who at present holds the British title, was allowed to compete in the championship of the United Kingdom.

With the prospects of a British team visiting the United States this year, the championship will be given added interest. While definite plans have not yet been made as to the trip, it is probable that the visitors will make a tour of the courses in this country before returning home. The Amateur Golf Championship of Great Britain commenced this morning at Prestwick, Scotland, with one of the largest entries on record. While George Lyon the Canadian entry is attracting lots of attention, he is not a favorite. Robert Maxwell of Edinburgh, John Graham, Jr., of Royal Liverpool and Harold Reade of Belfast, Ireland, are the favorites for the event.

THE RIFLE.

The Moncton Rifle Association has originated a new idea for the benefit of the new shots or the inexperienced marksmen, as they are in reality, by dividing the riflemen into several classes, viz. A, B, C and D. The average score to be made has been adjusted so as to estimate the worth of every marksmen. As an incentive for accurate shooting, the association is putting up handsome sterling silver dessert spoons for each class. In this way a new man goes to the range with an idea of winning something, and not as was formerly the case to see some of the crack shots sweep the prize list.

The first spoon match of the York County Rifle Association is taking place at the St. Marys range this afternoon.

THE TURF.

At the request of some New Brunswick and Nova Scotia horsemen, the Springhill and Moncton Association have changed the 2.24 trot and pace to a 2.28 trot and pace, and programmes for these respective meetings. Springhill, June 20th and July 1st; Moncton, July 7th and 8th, will be free for all, 2.19 trot and pace, 2.28 trot, 2.19 trot and pace, 2.30 trot and pace. WRESTLING.

HOW JENKINS WON.

A wrestling expert describes the great struggle in Madison Square Garden, New York, last Friday night, in which Tom Jenkins overcame Frank Gotch. He says: "Jenkins wrestled a waiting match that made the large crowd present uneasy. He well knew that Gotch had it on him when it came to strength and roughing, and from the time they first tried for a hold until at the end of an hour and twenty-seven minutes he had finally pinned Gotch to the mat. It was evident to all that Jenkins simply was endeavoring to play his man out and then quickly throw him.

Jenkins succeeded not alone in this plan, but Gotch himself helped him out to a great extent. It was the opinion of a majority of the sharps that he did entirely too much work and that he weakened himself. In addition Jenkins resorted to tactics that were not considered fair in an even match, and while he was using these same tactics it seemed as if Referee Tim Hurst stood for too much of the work.

During the hour and twenty-seven minutes in which Jenkins took to throw Gotch the former repeatedly got strangle holds on the latter. This was plain when Gotch would wrestle him all over the mat. Jenkins would grab Gotch and hold on to the ropes to save himself. Twice it seemed as if Gotch had secured falls, but they were not allowed by the referee.

Gotch was absolutely disgusted with Jenkins' way and several times he showed it and was on the point of discontinuing the match. Still he went on and each time showed renewed vigor, but to no avail. He would have Jenkins in a tight corner, but the latter would always slip away after a quick twist or two. Once in a scrimmage it seemed as if the two men would come to blows. After the one hour and twenty minutes Jenkins got Gotch in chancery and pressed his arm against his nose and mouth until they bled. Gotch was furious and appealed to the referee. He was told to continue and he did, but after about six more minutes, Jenkins got him on all fours, and Gotch rolled over his back.

It did not seem like a fall. In fact it seemed as if the fall was an intentional one on his own part and a case of quit. It was called a fall, and the men went to their dressing rooms to prepare for the second bout.

On the way Gotch was escorted by several big policemen, for Jenkins claimed that he had been bitten on the arm and showed several marks to prove his assertion.

In the second bout Gotch came back very strong and wrestled Jenkins as if he would throw him.

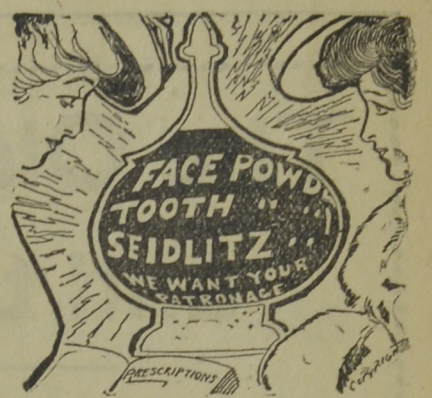

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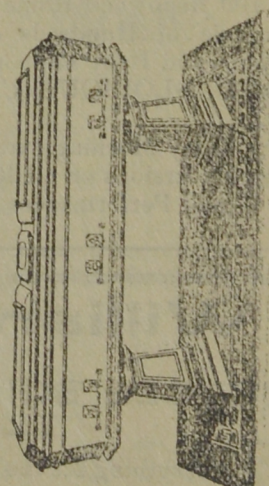
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
