DISTINGUISHED CANADIAN DEAD.**Capt. VanKoughnet, Who Had an Eminent Naval Career. No More.**

A Reuter telegram from Gibraltar, states that the steamer Mongolia, which arrived here on Tuesday, Mar. 28th, from Australia, reported that early the previous evening Captain Edmund Baiker Van Koughnet, C.M.G., R.N., (retired) died suddenly of apoplexy. The body was landed at Gibraltar and buried there, Rear-Admiral Prince Louis of Battenberg attending the funeral.

Captain Van Koughnet was the younger son of the late Hon. Philip Matthew S. Van Koughnet, Q. C., and his wife Elizabeth, daughter of Col. Turner, K. H. He was born in Toronto in July, 1849, and entered the navy as a cadet at the age of 14, became a sub-lieutenant in 1863, lieutenant in 1873 and commander in 1885, and retired with the rank of captain in 1894. As a midshipman he served on the Canadian lakes during the Fenian troubles in 1867-68, and later was flag-lieutenant to Lord Clanwilliam on the North America and West Indies Station. In 1884 he was flag-lieutenant to Lord Alcester on board the Alexandra, and served with the naval brigade land-

ed for service in the Soudan with the Nile expedition (Camel Corps) for the relief of Khartoum. He was with Lord Charles Bessford in the Sofia at the relief of Sir Charles Wilson, and was then severely wounded. For his services in these operations, which were mentioned in despatches, he received special promotion to the rank of commander.

During the late South African war Captain Van Koughnet, who was then on the retired list, was transport officer at Durban, where his work, in which he displayed tact and ability, was warmly commended by Sir Redvers Buller in his despatch of November 9th, 1900. For his service at Durban he received the C.M.G. in April, 1901. Among the other decorations worn by Captain Van Koughnet was the bronze medal of the Royal Humane Society, awarded to him when a midshipman for having jumped into the water at Brockville, Ont., and saved the lives of two boys. Captain Van Koughnet married in 1877 Lady Jane Alexander, only daughter of the third Earl of Caledon.

A HEROIC RESCUE.**Man With Broken Arm Saves Mother and Her Child.**

Grand Rapids, Mich., April 13.—As the result of a fire in a saloon and boarding house, May Derrick, aged 8 years, was burned to death; Mrs. Charles N. Herrick, the child's mother, fatally burned; Charles N. Herrick, the 2-year-old child of Mrs. Herrick; Thomas Norris, Ada Norris, Charles Anderson and Jack Ward were injured.

The fire was discovered by Mrs. Herrick, who aroused Thomas Norris and then began struggling through the flames to reach the room where her children were asleep. Norris could not force his way through the

fire from his room to the hall, and jumped from a second-story window breaking his arm when he struck the pavement.

Ignoring the injury, he raised a ladder to the window and went to the rescue of Mrs. Herrick and her children. He brought the woman, who was badly burned, and her boy down the ladder, but meanwhile the fire spread so rapidly that Norris could not get into the room again to rescue 8-year-old May. Her burned body was found by the firemen, who had the fire under their control soon after their arrival.

While Norris was rescuing Mrs. Herrick, and her child, Ada Norris, Jack Ward and Charles Anderson jumped to the ground from the second floor, and all of them sustained injuries, which, however, are not expected to prove serious.

ROOSEVELT DESIRES U.S.

Chamberlain is Afraid He May Get Canada.

London, April 14.—Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, addressing the meeting of the Liberal Union Club yesterday said that there was a desirability, almost a necessity, of meeting the wishes of the colonies. They had been assured that they could not regulate arrangements between ourselves and our children without endangering the children's loyalty. If they were a little discouraged by this they ought to remember that there were many suitors for the advantages which they could give. The scruples of these suitors would not be so pedantic.

At the present moment the President of the United States, one of the ablest, strongest and most courageous men who had ever sat in the presidential chair, had openly declared that one of his great objects and desires was to connect the United States more closely with Canada. What success that policy would have he did not know, but if the terms offered were more favorable than ours it would be almost too much to expect that Canada would not turn in that direction. The matter was becoming more urgent day by day. He was quite sure that they would not be cast down by any temporary check to this great policy, the success of which would be more complete the longer it was delayed.

NOVEL SUIT.**Widowed Married Man Sues for Damages for Loss of Time.**

St. Thomas, Ont., April 13.—A novel breach of promise case, made all the more novel from the fact that it was brought by a man against a woman, and that both plaintiff and defendant are now married, was commenced at the spring assize court before Chief Justice Falconbridge. It was the case of James A. Learn, of Mapleton, against Mrs. Edward Biddell, formerly Miss Seraphine White, of Port Rowan, South Walsingham Township, for \$2,000 damages.

The jury after an hour's consideration, decided in Mrs. Biddell's favor. Mr. Maxwell in presenting the case to the jury, told how Learn, being a widower, had felt that he needed a partner to look after his house, his aged mother and his young son. He had become acquainted with Miss White, and an engagement followed, but while the plaintiff waited matters hurried, Miss White lingered till Biddell appeared on the scene, and then, without any looks or warning to Learn, went and married his rival Mr. Maxwell said that Mr. Learn, being a farmer, required some one to help him on the farm by getting his meals and keeping house, and he had therefore remarried. This latter fact would be made a great deal of, but Mr. Maxwell said Learn was forced to it, and, besides he had married a woman ten years his senior and was again placed at a great disadvantage.

years of age. In 1898 he lived on his farm with his mother, aged 70 years, and his son, aged ten. His mother had been sick for ten years, and died in July 1902. In January, 1898, he advertised in Heart and Hand, a matrimonial paper published in Chicago, for a wife, and on Feb. 13, 1898, received a reply from Seraphine White, of Port Rowan. The letter was read in court, and was as follows:

"Dear Sir,—I saw your charming advertisement in The Heart and Hand, and it is with great pleasure that I reply, as I like your description, I suppose you will receive great numbers of letters, but I truly hope you will not forget to answer mine. I am a farmer's daughter, aged thirty years, five feet five inches high, brown eyes, auburn hair, fair complexion, and a well-to-do young lady, and highly respected. I am your unknown friend."

"Seraphine White," The witness said he had answered this letter asking that she correspond, and this was done and continued. Another letter, written on March 28, was read, the following being extracts: "Got your best love, but did not have till the end of the letter to find it out, as I got it all through. I was glad to get your love letter. . . I want to know all about yourself. Have you been a good man since your wife died? Tell me the truth, and it will be all right. . . I like your picture. You do not look very cross. . . I am a good woman. Then that gets ahead of me has to get up early in the morning. I like to milk cows. I hope we will get along all right. . . You say you are pious, but you do not look like it in your picture."

SUITED EACH OTHER.

On May 4 the witness said that he met the defendant at the Norfolk house, Simcoe, by appointment, and talked the matter over. They thought they suited each other nicely, and decided to continue the correspondence. On Oct. 13, following, he again met her at the Melbourne Hotel, Simcoe, by appointment, and on that visit had purchased an engagement ring at a jewelry shop and placed it on her finger, and she promised to become his wife. She had sent the measure of her finger to him by mail.

A letter dated May 15, 1898, was identified and put in. It spoke mostly of the intended marriage, and gave the recipient the assurance that she would make a good wife, and that he would not get the worst of the bargain. It also mentioned another fellow, whom "Jim" scared at the station.

Four other letters, the tenor of which was similar to the foregoing ones, were also put in. In all, the main topic appeared to be the intended marriage. They were written between 1898 and 1903.

Witness said that he had visited his intended at her father's house, staying two or three days at a time, and these visits had been returned by Miss White and her sister after the death of his mother.

BATTLE WITH WOLVES.

John Macdonald's Big Fight in North Cape Breton.

Halifax, April 14.—A thrilling story of a trapper's battle with wolves comes from Cape North, the extreme northern point of Cape Breton. John Macdonald, a well-known trapper of that place, while returning home from his traps in the evening was attacked three miles from the settlement by a pack of five wolves. Hearing the sharp yelping of the animals close upon him, he ran for his life, but, as they rapidly gained, he awaited their coming with a loaded gun. His first shot brought down the leading pursuer, and for the moment stopped the others in their course. A shot from the second barrel of Macdonald's gun disposed of the second pursuer, and the pack paused long enough to permit the man to load again. The three remaining wolves then again dashed forward, and one of them fell a victim to the trapper's gun. But ere he could again fire the wolves were right upon him. A terrific fight ensued, Macdonald's clothes being

torn from his body, and his arms terribly lacerated, but he still managed to keep the furious animals from his throat.

The trapper was crying loudly for help, and, fortunately for him, a lumberman, who was returning home by another path, heard his cries and rushed up. The two remaining wolves then turned and fled, leaving Macdonald bleeding and exhausted on the ground.
