BISHOP CASEY'S RETURN.

His Lordship Back from a Pleasant Six Months' Tour of Europe.

His Lordship Bishop Casey will arrive at St. John by the 6.40 train this evening, and will be met by all the St. John priests, together with several from outside. All the Catholic male societies in the town will turn out to welcome the Bishop and escort him from the railway station to the palace, where the Very Rev. W. F. Chapman, V. G., will read an address of welcome from the Catholic clergy and laity of St. John, after which the Bishop will be presented with a purse and a check for about \$2,200. His Lordship will then reply and the proceedings will close with the singing of the Te Deum.

Halifax, April 15.—Among the passengers on the Allan liner Virginian was His Lordship Bishop Casey of New Brunswick, who today is the guest of His Grace Archbishop O'Brien of Halifax. The bishop, as he stepped off the steamer, seemed to be the picture of health, and looked as though enjoyment had filled every minute of his sojourn abroad.

The Sun correspondent had an interesting conversation with the Bishop at the archbishop's residence. "It is six months," he said, "since I left Canadian soil in company with Bishop McDonald of Charlottetown, and Father Meahan of Moncton, for a sojourn through Europe and the east. We landed at Gibraltar from New York on a Sunday morning. The impression of the famous historic rock was very striking indeed. It was just at daybreak, and although the middle of November, everything had a summer-like appearance. After mass at the Cathedral, we took a drive round the city and suburbs. It had the air of a tropical country, plants and flowers in bloom in profusion. Soon after noon we sailed for Naples. This is a beautiful city, and overlooks one of the most lovely bays in the world."

A week was spent here, during which we visited the rich historic churches, parks and museums. Vesuvius was always in sight and smoking continuously with what to us seemed a most threatening aspect, but the people of Naples were entirely unconcerned. Naples is left by train for Monte Casino, the home of the Benedictines, at whose monastery we stayed over night.

"The next evening we were in Rome," said the Bishop. It was

night as we were entering, but as the great lights of the city flashed through our car windows, what striking associations of ancient classical and religious Rome arose in our minds. Weeks here passed rapidly in visiting the sights of historical and Christian Rome. Magnificent churches arise on every side and fill one with admiration for their grandeur, antiquity and beauty. Beyond them all, as indeed surpassing all church structures in the world, stands on the Vatican Hill the great basilica of St. Peter's. Five, six, even ten visits seem well spent, but insufficient to take in the full magnificence of this great master of the churches.

Our visit to the Pope is something never to be forgotten. His Holiness has a charming presence, and kindness and paternity seemed living in his every movement. One cannot but feel abashed in presence of the supreme pontiff, but Pius X. was quick to put one at his ease. We saw him many times, and always with the same happy impressions.

On January 10th we left Rome for the east, taking steamer at Brindisi, visiting Corinth, Athens and Constantinople. Remaining there three days, we sailed to Smyrna, Salonica and to Beirut.

Twenty days were spent in the holy land visiting Galilee and Judea. Then we went down to Egypt and after spending three days in Cairo and seeing the pyramids we returned by Alexandria to Brindisi, and thence back to Rome.

After another week spent pleasantly there we left on March 8th for a hurried trip through western Europe and the British Isles.

I was particularly pleased to visit that part of Ireland from which my father and mother came to St. John in 1847. I had the happiness to say mass and preach to the people in the same old church in which my parents were married.

The visits to Cork, Dublin, London and Liverpool were necessarily short, for we were booked to sail by the Virginian on April 6.

Our first care on our last day ashore was to say mass in the Pro-Cathedral of Liverpool. At four in the afternoon we started for Prince's Landing stage, where our good ship lay awaiting us at the wharf."

AFTER ONE HUNDRED YEARS.

The Body of Admiral Paul Jones, an Eminent American,

HAS BEEN DISCOVERED AND DISINTERRED AT PARIS.

Unmistakeable Evidences of His Identity—Body Will be Brought to Washington.

Paris, April 15.—United States Ambassador Porter cabled to Washington last night announcing the successful result of his long and difficult search for the grave of Admiral Paul Jones. The body is in a good state of preservation, considering that the interment took place more than 100 years ago.

The circumstances leading to the final discovery of the body are particularly interesting. General Porter has conducted the search for the last five years and when congress recently took no action upon the president's recommendations for the expenses incident to the search, the ambassador continued the extensive labors at his own expense. A large force of workmen have been engaged night and day tunnelling and cross-tunnelling the old St. Louis cemetery. This constituted a huge operation embracing nearly a block covered with buildings and requiring a system of subterranean mining.

Hundreds of wooden caskets were found, but not until Wednesday were unearthed four leaden caskets which gave promise of containing the body of the admiral. Three of them bore plates designating the names of the deceased. The fourth showed superior solidity of workmanship. No plate was found on this casket, and it is supposed that it was removed when another coffin was superimposed on it. The leaden casket was opened in the presence of General Porter, Col. Bailey-Blanchard, the second secretary of the American embassy, and Engineer Weiss, who has been directing the excavation. The body was found to be well preserved owing to its being immersed in alcohol. It was wrapped in a sheet with a packing of straw and hay. Those present were immediately struck by the resemblance of the head to that on the medallions and busts of the admiral.

As was anticipated, no uniform, decorations or sword was found, as all such articles had been accounted for after the burial.

The coffin is shaped like a mummy coffin, which coffins were common at that period, widening from the feet to the shoulders, with a round top fitting over the head.

The coffin was taken to the medical school, where Doctors Captain and Papilliant, distinguished professors of the school of anthropology,

and recognized authorities on such investigations, were charged with making a thorough examination for the purpose of identification. To facilitate this the ambassador furnished them with pictures and medallions, two busts by Houdin and authentic descriptions of the admiral's hair, and the height and measurement of his body. After the most minute examination the following facts were fully substantiated:

Length of body, 5 feet, 7 inches; the admiral's exact height. Size and shape of head agree with several peculiarities identical with those of the admiral.

Hair brown, the same as the admiral's, in places slightly gray, indicating a person of his age—45 years. The hair is long, reaching below the shoulders, and is combed back, and gathered in a clasp at the back of the head.

The face is clean shaven, all corresponding exactly with the descriptions, portraits and busts of the admiral. The linen is in good condition. One article bears an initial, either "J" or an inverted "P".

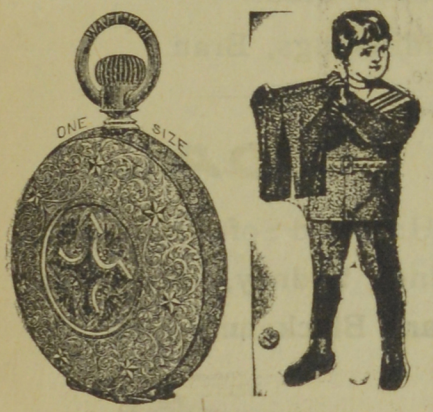
The body was carefully packed. The limbs were wrapped in tin foil presumably for sea transportation as indicated in a letter of the admiral's nearest friend and a pall bearer of his funeral, Colonel Blackdon, who said:

"His body was put in a leaden coffin so that in case the United States, which he had so essentially served, should claim his remains, they might be the more easily removed."

Finding that all the internal organs were singularly well preserved, the doctors made an autopsy which showed distinct proofs of the disease from which the admiral is known to have died. The identification was pronounced complete in every particular.

Care has been taken to keep the body in its present state of preservation. It will be placed in a handsome casket and deposited in the receiving vault of the American church on the Avenue de l'Alma until the ambassador can learn the opinion of the government concerning the most appropriate means of transporting it to the United States and giving a fitting sepulchre to the body of the illustrious sailor whose place of burial had so long remained a mystery.
