The trial of Albert Kelly, on the charge of theft from the residence of Simon Goodine of Bear Island, has been postponed until Thursday, April 20th. The evidence on the prosecution is about all in. The defendant claims that he will be able to show that he came honestly by the articles found in his possession.

POTATO SHIPMENTS.

LECTURE ON SLOYD WORK.

Mr. J. V. Lynn, teacher of manual training at the Normal school, delivered a lecture on "Sloyd work and the method of teaching it," before St. Patrick's Literary and Debating Society, last evening. Mr. Lynn first gave an outline of the history of education and its relation to Sloyd work and spoke of the different systems of manual training in vogue in different countries. He then explained the method of teaching

manual training in this country and illustrated his lecture with charts and models used in the work. The lecturer held the closest attention of those present, and at the close was presented with a hearty vote of thanks for his interesting and profitable lecture.

ANOTHER MONSTER LAMB.

The other day an item appeared in The Herald to the effect that Mr. Walter Dunphy of Douglas, was the owner of a lamb which at its birth weighed 12½ pounds. The lamb referred to is undoubtedly a bouncer for its age, but Mr. Charles Moore, a well known Scotch Lake farmer, informs The Herald that he has one that can knock the spots off it. He lamb at birth tipped the scales at 14 pounds. When a week old it weighed 20 pounds, when two weeks 2½, when three weeks 32, and when four weeks old 38. These figures show that the animal has gained in weight at the rate of six pounds a week. Mr. Moore is certainly a winner.

THE VITAGRAPH CONCERT.

AROUND THE MARKET.

The country roads are drying up fast and consequently there were a good many teams in the market this morning. Veal seemed to be the principal commodity, the supply being somewhat in excess of the demand. It brought five and six cents per pound. Eggs were quite plentiful at 18 and 20 cents, and country hams brought 12 cents per pound. Butter sold at 22 cents per pound, and potatoes at 80 cents per barrel.

A GRANT OF \$3000.

The local government, as the result of representations made by the members for York, has granted \$3000 to the Fredericton exhibition, and made a further guarantee of \$1000 in case there should be a deficit. The grant is a liberal one, and is perfectly satisfactory to the executive of the agricultural society, particularly to President Campbell, who in his capacity as M.P.P. was active in bringing the claims of the exhibition to the notice of the government.

BOARDING TEMPORARILY.

Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Flewelling are breaking up housekeeping for the present, and will board for a few weeks until removing to their summer cottage "Old Orchard" on the Kingsclear road. Work has been renewed on their new residence on St. John street, and it is to be completed, ready for occupancy the 1st of September. It will be of brick, and the contractor is Mr. Harry M. Clarke.

THE RIVER RISING.

The water in the river has been rising slightly since yesterday, and the lumbermen are getting more hopeful. The river is reported to be rising quite fast at Grand Falls, and also at Indian town, and a change may be looked for here very soon. There has been little or no rain so far this spring, but lumbermen predict that it will come with the change of the moon. Tugs are expected up from St. John early next week to swing the booms.

THE DRILL HALL.

Contractor Simmons has a crew of men at work excavating for the new drill hall to be erected on Carleton street. The front of the old building has been removed and in its place a substantial brick and stone structure is to be erected. Mr. John Ferguson is looking after the excavating, and the building will be erected under the supervision of Mr. Harry M. Clarke.

HOTEL CHANGES.

Mr. John Johnston is to assume the management of the Waverley Hotel on May first, and Messrs. MacDonald and Feeney, the present proprietors, are to remove to the building lately purchased by them from Mr. W. H. Scully. The place will be thoroughly renovated and will be known as the Hotel Lorne.

MILLS DESTROYED.

Bolton, Ont., April 15.—(Special) The big new woolen mills of J. Walsh & Son, were totally destroyed by fire last night. The loss is estimated at \$40,000 or \$50,000, covered by insurance. This is the third time the Walsh mills have been burned.

A SLIGHT BLAZE.

Dry House at Palmer's Tannery Damaged by Fire.

The firemen were called out shortly before six o'clock this morning for a slight blaze on the dry house in rear of the John Palmer Co.'s Queen street tannery. The dry house is a separate wooden building and is used for drying hair. The fire is supposed to have caught from the steam pipes, and when discovered by Night Watch Barton, had not made any serious headway. A still alarm was sent to the central hose station and while the hose cart was on its way to the scene Box 17 was rang in. The firemen found the blaze quite a stubborn one, but were able to extinguish it after a small hole had been burned in the side of the building and a quantity of hair destroyed. 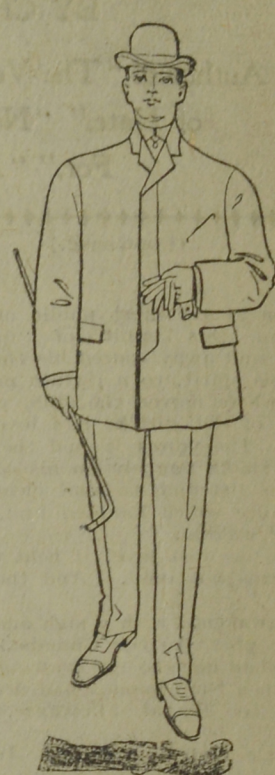
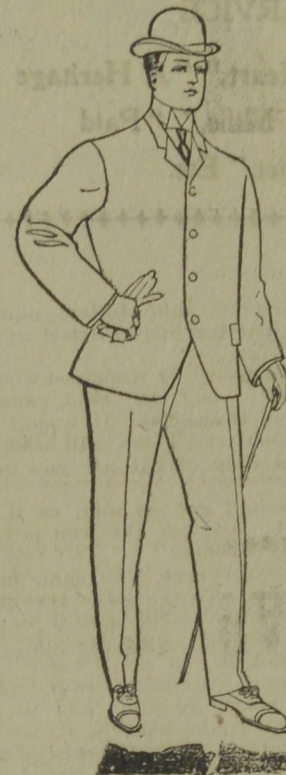
