THE UNIVERSITY ENCOENIA.

Brilliant Gathering of Educationalists at To-day's Function.

THE PRIZE WINNERS AND HONOR STUDENTS.

Graduating Class and Others Receive Degrees.

The old University of New Brunswick today completed the most successful year in its history, by sending forth a graduating class of twenty-eight young ladies and gentlemen.

The annual encoenia exercises commenced in the library of the college building at 2.30 o'clock and were in many respects the most successful in years. Glorious weather prevailed, and the attendance of visitors was unusually large, the fair sex predominating to a large extent.

His Honor Lieutenant Governor Snowball, clad in his Windsor uniform, occupied the chair, and the platform was thronged with members of the government, members of the senate, members of the alumni and faculty, and other friends of higher education. The list included:

The members of the graduating class, in their ermine trimmed gowns occupied the front row of seats, while the undergraduates held forth in a body near the entrance, and were unlimited in their applause.

Chancellor Harrison opened the proceedings in a neat speech, after which he called upon Prof. Clawson who delivered the address in praise of the founders, the full text of which will be found on another page.

THE PRIZE WINNERS.

Mr. Theodore Rand McNally of this city, winner of the Douglas gold medal, was then introduced and read a portion of his Douglas essay on "Science and War." The medal was afterwards presented to him by Governor Snowball in felicitous terms.

Miss Edna Bell of Moncton, winner of the alumni gold medal, read a portion of her Latin essay and was presented with the medal by Dr. Murray MacLaren, president of the alumni society. Miss Bell was very heartily applauded.

The Brydono-Jack memorial scholarship, was presented to Mr. David R. Smith by Dr. Jack.

Miss M. M. Winslow, was announced as the winner of the Montgomery-Campbell prize and was duly presented with it by Archdeacon Neales amid another round of applause.

The governor general's gold medal was presented to Miss Alberta M. Roach of St. John, who was also loudly acclaimed. Dr. J. R. Inch made the presentation in a neat speech.

The Ketchum silver medal for proficiency in engineering was presented to Mr. Allen R. Crookshank by Dr. Atherton.

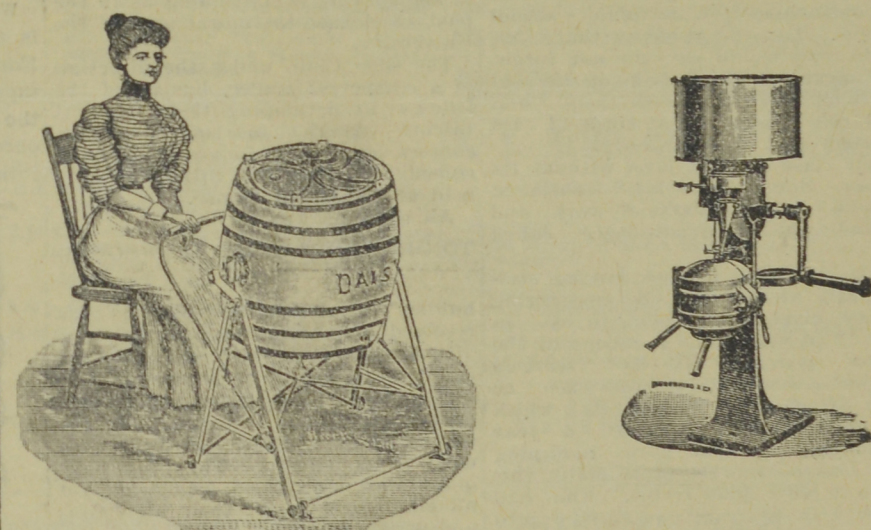

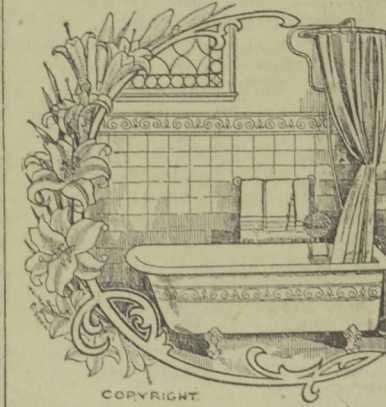
