A HORRIBLE DISASTER.

Forty Men Hurlled Into Eternity by a Boiler
Explosion.

ON THE UNITED STATES GUNBOAT BENNINGTON.

Accident Occurred in Harbor of San Diego, Cal.—List
of the Dead.

San Diego, Cal., July 20.—Following is the revised list of dead in the explosion on U. S. gunboat Bennington:—Ensign Peary, F. F. Brown, G. Newcombe, Aba Hughes, A. B. Enselat, W. C. Herry, C. San Diego, Cal., July 21.—One officer and 38 members of the crew of the United States gunboat Bennington are dead and four score injured, 24 seriously, by a boiler explosion that disabled the warship in San Diego harbor at 10 o'clock this morning. Fifteen sailors are missing. There were more than 250 men aboard when the accident occurred, and many were hurled or forced to jump into the sea by the terrific explosion, which lifted part of the deck and compelled the beaching of the ship.

The Bennington at the time of the accident was lying in the stream just off the Commercial wharf at H street. The ship had received orders from the navy department at Washington to sail this morning for Port Harford to meet the Wyoming and convey her to Mare Island navy yard, San Francisco.

Steam was up and everything was in readiness for the departure of the Bennington when the starboard forward boiler exploded with a deafening roar. The explosion was terrific. People standing on shore saw a huge cloud of steam rise above the Bennington. Columns of water were forced high into the air. A dozen or more men were blown overboard by the force of the blast.

Captain Wentworth, who was looking at the Bennington when the disaster occurred, says he saw human bodies hurled more than 100 feet upwards. The air was clouded with vapor, which enveloped the ship. When the haze cleared away only a few men could be seen on the decks, while a number were floundering in the water. A boat was lowered from the vessel's side and most of the men in the water were picked up and taken on board.

The outburst was accompanied by a roar as of thunder and a shock that rocked vessels nearby. In an instant the air was filled with shrieks of pain from the wounded, which could be heard ashore, and with flying fragments of human beings and pieces of the ship's super-

structure. Mishaps have occurred in the boiler room, but with slight loss of life or injuries. A steamship on the Concord, which has boilers identical with those of the Bennington, burst at one time, killing two men.

Upon receipt of the message giving the list of killed and injured, acting Secretary Darling at once had a telegram sent to the next of kin of the dead as follows:

"Department regrets to report 34 men killed this morning by bursting of a boiler on the Bennington. You have the sincere sympathy of the department in your loss."

GRAND FALLS WORK.

Attorney General Pugsley Assured
that Development will go on.

(St. John Sun.)

Attorney General Pugsley, who returned on Thursday afternoon from a trip to New York and Ottawa, told a Sun reporter yesterday that while in New York he saw a number of the gentlemen who are interested in the company which has secured a charter for the inauguration of various enterprises at Grand Falls, and learned that satisfactory progress was being made in connection with the matter. The men connected with the company are of the highest financial standing, and it is estimated that \$11,000,000 will be expended if all the enterprises that the company have in view are carried out. In the case of operations of such magnitude as those projected many details have to be arranged, but the attorney general said he had every reason to believe that the company would begin operations this year.

Asked what developments the company intended carrying on the attorney general said that the company contemplate the harnessing of the water power at the falls and the creation of at least 60,000 horse power. This power would be utilized for the creation of electrical energy, which the company expected to supply to the towns and cities along the St. John river valley and to this city. They expect to be able to supply this power at a price much less than it has hitherto been supplied for.

"As the Sun is no doubt aware," said Dr. Pugsley, "the company has also arranged for obtaining from the government leases of lands which are believed to contain large bodies of iron and manganese ore, and by experiments which have been made at Shatinigan Falls, Que., it has been discovered that ferro-manganese, a most valuable article, could be made by electrical process at a very much cheaper rate than it has hitherto been produced, and at such a price as to enable the enterprise to be a success."

"A considerable portion of the water power will be utilized in this way."

"The company also have in view the erection of pulp and paper mills on a large scale, with a capacity of at least 400 to 600 tons per day."

The attorney general stated that the various enterprises of the company would give employment to several thousand people when in operation, and if carried through successfully, as he had every reason to believe they would be, would result in a great development of the upper portion of the province and the benefits would naturally increase the prosperity of the city of St. John.

The pulp and paper mill, no doubt, he shipped, said the attorney general in answer to a question, from Campbellton in the summer and in the winter be brought to St. John and shipped from here.

"This is an enterprise of considerable magnitude," said the attorney general, "but I have every confidence that it will be carried out, and expect to see a start made before the end of the year."

Dr. Pugsley left last evening for Ottawa to argue a matter before the sub-committee of the privy council. He did not care to state what the business was.

LONDON SOCIETY'S GRAFT.

London, July 20.—"Secret commissions are the mainstay of life for innumerable Londoners," said a prominent Englishman recently.

The extent to which commissions are given is astonishing. No line of endeavor, from the purchase of a dress, a box of cigarettes, a case of wine or the arrangement of a marriage is free from this extraordinary form of graft.

SHOOTING AT BISLEY.

Canadians Have a Chance for the
King's Prize.

Bisley, July 21.—In the Brookwood match today, seven shots at 600 yards, possible 35, Sergeant Crowe, Guelph, and Sergt. Simpson, Toronto, made possible.

In the Gregory match, seven shots at 200 yards, Sergt. Kerr, Toronto, won the first place and will receive a Lee-Enfield rifle, a field piece, a telescope and a shooting case, valued at £21; Captain Forest, 6th, and Sergt. Kelly, 9th, 40s.; Lieut. Boul, 20th, 20s.; Sergt. Bayles, 44th, and Sergt. Russell, 46th, 15s.

In the Steward's match, Sergt. Kelly was thirty-ninth, and receives 17s.

In the Wingrove match, ten shots at 800 yards, possible fifty, Sergt. Phillips, Toronto, made ten bulls, a most excellent performance.

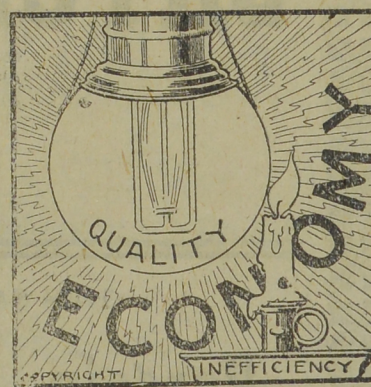

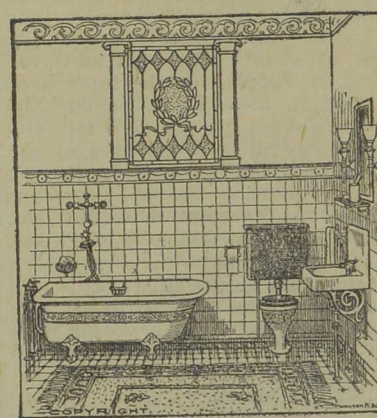
