HIS BRAVADO GONE.

When the autonomy bill debate was at its fiercest stage it was a poor day when Billy McLean, M. P., for one of the Yorks, didn't dare somebody on the Liberal side of the House to resign and contest a seat with him on the educational question but up to date Willie has not tempted fate by throwing up his seat and seeking re-election on the autonomy bill.

Edmonton fell vacant but Willie permitted Mr. Oliver to be re-elected by acclamation. The Levis election came on and still no sign of Pushful Willie, and London and North Oxford, two ultra Protestant constituencies were opened, and yet Wilful Willie made no sign of facing the electorate.

Since the results were announced in the last two constituencies Willie has not once offered to resign, nor will he, although Mr. Laverne made the helpful suggestion to him last week that it would be a good time for Willie to throw up his seat and try to get re-elected in his own constituency.

The vote in London and North Oxford seems to have closed the mouths of a great many Tory spouters in parliament. It was a solar plexus blow.

UNCOVERED A SKELETON.

Premier Haultain of the Northwest is telling party secrets and will have to be warned. In an interview with the Winnipeg Tribune, a Tory newspaper said he, "had a great deal of difficulty in persuading Mr. Borden as to the course he should take in regard to the autonomy bill." Mr. Borden will not thank Premier Haultain for thus hauling a skeleton out of the Tory closet.

It is a fair inference that if Mr. Borden had been let alone he would have pursued a different course in parliament respecting the autonomy bill, perhaps supporting the government proposition, but from what Mr. Haultain says the Tory leader was persuaded to adopt another course, exhibiting his weakness as a leader, and the great desire of a section of his followers to establish a sectarian agitation.

Mr. Borden must conclude from Premier Haultain's revelation that his supporter from the west talks too much and should bridle his tongue, and the same observation would seem to apply to his colleague, Mr. R. B. Bennett.

GENEROUSLY TREATED.

The Montreal despatch says that strained relations were established at the last meeting of ex-General Manager Thomas Fyshe, of the Merchants' Bank of Canada, and the directors of that institution.

The directors wanted Mr. Fyshe to sign something he did not like and Mr. Fyshe offered to sign something else the directors wouldn't have, and so there were hard feelings.

But why should there be on Mr. Fyshe's part? He carried off with him the directors' vote of a \$6,000 a year pension for the rest of his life and a cash bonus of \$50,000, and all he will have to sign hereafter will be a receipt for the money.

The directors have treated Mr. Fyshe very handsomely, but no doubt the bank's stockholders would have been glad to receive at least part of his gratuity in extra dividend.

Mr. Fyshe is undoubtedly a keen banker and has done good work for his employees, but he cannot complain that he has not been treated generously, quite beating the record of Canada.

MAKE A MOVE.

The ratepayers of Burt's Corner and contiguous districts are seriously thinking of establishing a consolidated school, the first in York Co.

They have reached an enquiring and receptive condition, and now is the time for Dr. Inch to get in his work.

The chief superintendent will no doubt be delighted to fully explain the great advantages of the consolidated school, and Burt's Corner would seem a very suitable locality for the establishment of such an institution.

It is a pity some of the Burt's Corner trustees did not make that trip to Kingston the other day and see for themselves the great advan-

tages for the consolidated school. The next best thing for them to do, however, is to study the Herald's exhaustive account of the pilgrimage.

There has been a great change in the denominational pulpit utterances within the past few years. We don't hear so much creed from the preachers but more gospel. This was illustrated at the Methodist conference at Charlottetown Monday, by Rev. Dr. Sprague, who in discussing the proposed church union said he was in full sympathy with the movement. Forty years ago he had preached sermons in the Methodist churches that he would not preach in Presbyterian churches. Such sermons he would not preach today. He would not say much in a Methodist church that he would not say in a Presbyterian.

King Edward has the happy knack of doing and saying the right things whenever he comes into contact with the public. A hundred or more Canadian manufacturers and their wives had scarcely arrived in England before they were summoned to Windsor to meet His Majesty and the Queen. The visitors were shown the places of interest and then were presented to their Majesties, the king saying so that all present could hear, "Welcome to England. Welcome to Windsor. I hope that you will all enjoy your visit to the old country."

An article published in another column of the Herald today tells of the almost complete disintegration of the Tory party in Quebec. Even the leaders are said to be coming over to Liberalism.

The Toronto Tory yellow newspapers were quite thrown off their base by the result of the London and North Oxford bye-elections and are still trying to explain how it happened.

The circus will be here Friday and greenies should sit tight on their purse strings. Any man who permits a circus fakir to get ahead of him deserves no sympathy.

The city council is showing enterprise in deciding on important street extensions, but what about sewerage, and filtration, etc., etc.

McAdam Junction has now a resident physician, Dr. Butler of Milltown, N. B., having opened an office in the Meredith Hotel.

Ex-Bishop Courtney, rector of St. James Church, New York, is visiting Halifax his first visit since he resigned the See of Nova Scotia.

The steamer City of Collingwood, of the Northern Navigation Co.'s line, was burned at her dock at Collingwood, Ont., on Monday, and four of her crew lost their lives.

Manager Ross of the Santiago, Cuba, branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, now visiting Halifax, reports business good all over the Island, and that the Royal will soon open new branches at Cardinas and Matanzas.

Findlay D. Robinson, treasurer of Tilbury Township, Ontario, is six thousand dollars short in his cash, believed to be due to stock speculation. The Township is protected by his bondsman, and Robinson admits the deficit.

There is a strong impression in political circles at Ottawa which to all appearances is well founded, that Colin McIsaac, member for Antigonish, will be appointed to the transcontinental railway commission as the representative from the maritime provinces. Mr. McIsaac has been in the federal house since 1895, and prior to that served in the legislative assembly for Nova Scotia.

Richard Pearson, a retired Methodist minister from Charlottetown, P. E. I., was binned out of \$75 by a Sells & Downs circus follower on Saturday at Sydney. Pearson's acquaintance was cultivated by a stealer who won twice the amount of money he had put up in the election. Pearson tried his luck, but drew the wrong number and lost. He told his story to the police only Monday, when it was too late to do anything for him.

Miss Sarah Jamieson, of Hopewell Hill, Albert Co., 70 years of age, was found dead about three miles from her home at 6 o'clock Monday evening. Miss Jamieson, who it is understood, has been ill for some time, wandered from her home on Saturday and no trace of her could be found until last evening, when her body was discovered in a small, lying face upwards, with one hand across her heart. She was scantily clad and death was due to exposure.

The sad drowning Sunday, at Carleton Place, Ont., of J. Cody Blanche, recently of Sackville, has filled the town with grief. Mr. Blanche's fiancée, Miss Alice White, aged twenty-four, was to have left today for Carleton Place, where the marriage was to have been solemnized Wednesday. Miss White, who is an exceedingly attractive and pretty girl, is completely prostrated with grief. She has the sympathy of many friends in her extremely sad bereavement.

There seems to be a growing belief at Campbellton, that Alex. Wood was cruelly murdered on Friday last near New Mills. I. C. R. Detective Skeffington is working on the case, and it is thought probable that before very long the mystery surround-

ing it will be cleared up. Coroner Doherty has postponed the inquest until more evidence has been gathered. New Mills being selected as the place of hearing the evidence.

The decision of Justice Anglin of Toronto, in regard to the deportation of aliens is that the Canadian parliament has no power to deport aliens to foreign territory. It is understood that the department of justice does not feel bound to accept the decision of Judge Anglin. If there is no appeal, as the judge says then the Dominion government will find a way of getting a final judgment in the case.

The sale of timber land which established a record price per acre in this section of New Brunswick, says a Moncton despatch, has just been completed at Hillsboro, Albert Co. James Dobson, lumberman of Stoney Creek, purchased from Mrs. Bliss Stoeves of Hillsboro 75 acres of timber land for \$8,000. This is over one hundred dollars an acre, and probably represents the highest figure for property of that kind ever paid in this province. The property purchased is said to be exceptionally well timbered.

George P. Fenwick, who passed through St. John yesterday on his way home to Apohaqui, during the past year occupied the position of professor of chemistry in the Wesleyan Methodist College at Middleton, Conn. In the year 1902 he graduated from the U. N. B., and the following year he spent at Queen's College, qualifying for his present position. Mr. Fenwick will spend a few days with his parents at Apohaqui, after which he will join the geological survey in Charlotte County. It is probable that next year he will accept a position in a western university.

The commencement exercises at St. Joseph's College, Memramcook will begin tomorrow evening, the 21 inst. There will be addresses, declamations, etc., by the senior students, and an English and French address by J. Dineen and R. Richard, respectively. Immediately after the completion of the students' portion of the programme, Hon. F. J. Sweeney, will deliver the English Alumni oration, and he will be followed by Rev. G. LeBlanc, who will deliver the Alumni oration in French. After the speeches the Alumni banquet will be held in the large refectory, with Mr. Justice Landry in the chair.

EXTENDING THE DEPOT.

St. John, June 20.—(Special)—The I. C. R. management have decided to make important changes in the union depot.

The train shed will be enlarged to hold four tracks and a baggage room will be built two stories high and 100 feet long.
