EXAMINATION CONCLUDED.

Riggs Sent up for Trial at Circuit Court Next Week.

THE PRISONER GIVES HIS SIDE OF THE STORY.

The preliminary examination of "Dr." George Riggs, was concluded before Police Magistrate Marsh yesterday afternoon shortly before six o'clock.

Miss Bessie P. Clark, the complainant, was on the witness stand until four o'clock.

After her examination by Mr. Gregory was finished.

MR. JOHN HAWTHORN.

took the stand. He testified to a document which was shown to the court by Mr. Slipp, to which the accused Riggs affixed his signature while at the jail during a previous imprisonment. Mr. Hawthorn swore to this writing as the signature of Riggs himself. The writing on this document and that on the letters shown the court in the morning were then compared.

The next witness called was,

MR. JOHN MCCOY.

He testified to the signature of Riggs on a document in connection with the trotting park, which was also shown to the court by the complainant's counsel. McCoy swore that Riggs signed this document in the presence of himself and Mr. L.B. Phair, but did not know where it had been done.

On being asked by Mr. Gregory if the signature had not been made in Mr. John M. Wiley's store, witness said he did not know, and that he may have been mistaken about the matter.

The writing on the two documents was also compared with that of the letters.

After a close examination by Mr. Gregory, witness left the stand, and

MR. JOHN M. WILEY

was called. He also testified to the handwriting of Riggs, and swore that the signature on the document had been affixed by Riggs himself. The court then adjourned till eleven o'clock this morning.

THE PRISONER TALKS.

Before court opened this morning, the prisoner Riggs, despite his pangs of heart-ache over his unlucky love affair, seemed very talkative as he paced his narrow cell.

To a representative of the Herald who had a talk with him there he told his side of the story—not the old, old story which the court would make out, as he declares.

Riggs stated that he wrote neither of the letters which were exhibited in court yesterday.

On being asked who did, he said he

could not answer that.

He said that at the time when the first letter was postmarked, viz., March 23rd, 1903, he was in Oregon, having gone there during the fall of 1902, which place he did not leave until March 28th, 1903.

With regard to the second letter, he said that at that time, and indeed during all the months of May, June and July, he was in this city, or between here and Woodstock, or on trips between here and Boiestown. He could prove this by direct evidence when necessary.

On being asked about the Saturday evening when Miss Clarke came down street to the Klondyke store, Riggs said that he did not see Miss Clark or know of her presence. The streets were crowded, and he came down and saw some friends and then went back.

On being asked by The Herald representative if it were not odd that he stopped whenever Miss Clarke did, he said that it was merely a coincidence or due to her imagination.

When asked why he was seen in the vicinity of Miss Clarke's boarding house so often, Riggs said that it was because he was tending a horse for a man at that place, and was accustomed to have his meals there. He did not know where Miss Clarke boarded or anything about her.

Shortly after eleven o'clock the court opened and the police magistrate committed Riggs for trial at the present circuit court.

She was given away by her father. After the knot had been tied, a dainty luncheon was served at the bride's home, after which the young couple left on the Maritime Express for a bridal trip through Nova Scotia and P. E. I.

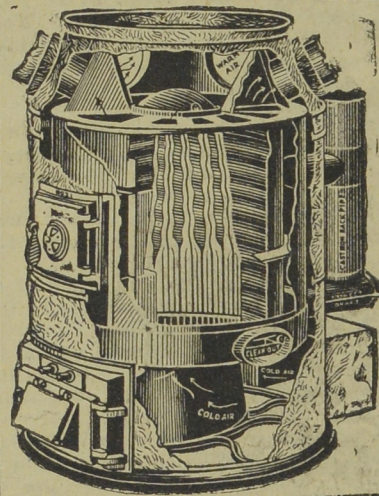
