The annual meeting of the Association will be held on the afternoon of July 1st at the Toronto Club house. George Lyon is expected to return from Scotland in time, for both open and amateur events.

AUTOMOBILING.

OLDFIELD BEATEN.

Hartford, June 19. Chevrolet, the French automobilist, defeated Barney Oldfield today on the one mile free for all race at the automobilizing meet held at the Chatter Oak Park under the auspices of the Hartford Auto Club. Oldfield and Chevrolet met in two heats in this event, and in both the American champion bested. The time was 1 m., 3 s.

In an attempt to lower his own time record of 4.29 for 1/4 mile, Oldfield failed, his time being 5.03 3-5. In this trial, however, the fastest mile of the day was made in 60 2-5 seconds.

TENNIS.

Buoyant with the confidence that they would return with the Davis International lawn tennis cup, the American challenging team of players—Holcombe Ward, the national champion in both singles and doubles; W. A. Larned, ex-champion; William J. Clothier, who was ranked second for last season's play, and Beals C. Wright, the partner of Ward in the national doubles—sailed for England Tuesday abroad the Kaiser Wilhelm II. They were accompanied by Paul Dashiell, who has made such a reputation as the manager of college athletes. ... will captain the team while abroad, and will decide upon the placing of the men in the various matches.

Capt. Dashiell said that he was expected to play Ward and Larned in the singles, as the leading team for the Americans, allowing both Wright and Clothier to go into this event, also into some of the preliminary matches with the teams of foreign nations. Ward and Wright would certainly be the pair to represent this country in the doubles in all the competitions.

The competing nations in the preliminary matches include Belgium, France, Australia and Austria. The English defending team for the final, it is reported, will be Reginald F. Doherty, Hugh T. Doherty and Frank L. Risely. The Belgium team is composed of P. de Borman and Willie Lemaire. France will be represented by Max Decugis and M. Vacherot, M. Worth and M. Ayme. Austria may default, but the team includes Graf Torols and P. von Hertz. Australia will be represented by Norman Brook, Walter Dunlop, H. F. Parker and A. F. Wilding.

TELEPHONES UNDER THE SEA.
United States Will Try Experiment.
Secretary Morton is interesting himself in a project to equip United States warships with submarine telephones, says the Washington Times.

tus attached to the hull of a ship equipped with the new invention.

A stock company has been formed for the purpose of selling the new patent, and lightships all along the coast from New York to Boston have been supplied with the sending apparatus, which consists of a bell sunk about fifty feet in the water and operated by electricity from the decks of the ship. In thick weather when the lightship's signals fail to carry through the fog, this submarine bell is rung constantly and ships that have the receiving apparatus can be informed of their near approach to the shoal by the transmission of the sound under water for perhaps three or four miles away.

The receiving telephone is contained in a box open to the sea at the bottom of a ship's hull. It has been found that storms do not interfere with the transmission of sounds under water and the inventors claim that the patent is one of extraordinary value on this account.

When the sound vibration strikes the submerged telephone it is transmitted by wires to the pilot house of the vessel, and the pilot, by using the usual telephone disk, is thus informed of his approach to shoal or the near approach of another vessel.

Agents of the Submarine Signal Company, as it is known, have written to Secretary Morton to interest him in the invention, and already it has been tried on at least one warship with satisfactory results, it is said.

One of the most valuable features of the invention as applied to the navy is the increased protection which it is said it will give to battleships by warning them of the approach of submarine torpedo boats.

The Navy Department is interested in the invention for the reason that it will be a great supplement to wireless telegraphy, aiding the submarine as well as the above-sea signalling code. Sound transmission above sea has always been unsatisfactory for signal use because of the variation in sound waves, the wave sometimes skipping over and object directly in its path, though it might be carried a distance far beyond.

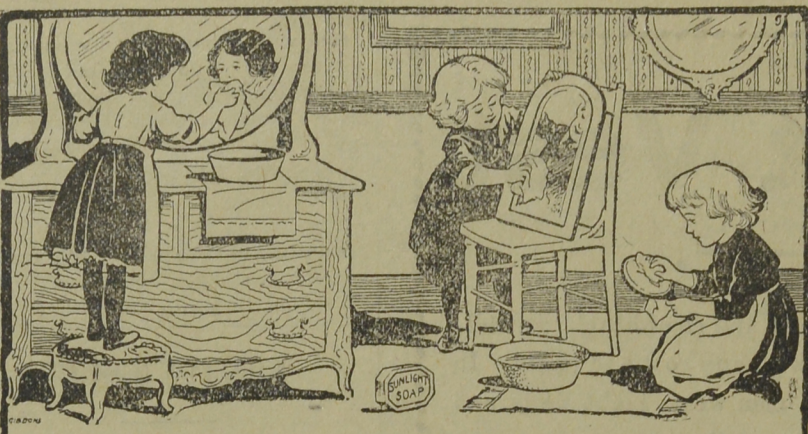
CHEWED THE MONEY.

BODY FOUND IN RIVER.

Disappearance of J. D. Plamondon Explained.

Montreal, June 19.—The finding of the body of J. D. Plamondon, official reporter at Sorel, in the St. Lawrence River this morning has, to a certain extent at least, cleared up what for months was a profound mystery. Shortly after the federal election of November 3rd last, Plamondon left his home at Sorel for Ottawa, carrying a bag in which all the documents and papers connected with the election in Richelieu, which he was about to deposit with the clerk of the crown in Chancery.

His failure to appear there caused anxiety, and a search was instituted. A week later the bag with the elec-

tion papers in it was found in a back yard in Amherst Street, but there was no trace of Plamondon. It was stated later that he was seen at the railway station and later again some where in Boston, but nothing definite could be ascertained.

In one of the pockets of the coat on the body recovered today was found a letter from Notary Lafriete of Sorel, addressed to Plamondon.

FATHER MAY HAVE CIGARS.

And His Daughter Also Wills Him Fancy Vests.

Philadelphia, June 19.—When the will of Charlotte D. Sage was admitted to Probate before the registrar of wills today, one of the most curious clauses ever contained in a document of this kind, was brought to light. The estate was valued at \$350, and the will disposes of it in this wise:—

"I bequeath to my beloved sister (if she promises to allow my father, Benjamin F. Sage, of beloved memory, all the cigars he wants, and also all the vests he likes to wear in winter) all the personal and real estate I die possessed of and to which I shall be entitled at the time of my decease."

Inquiry developed the fact that Miss Sage's father, who is an elderly man, has a fondness for smoking cigars. A short time ago his eldest daughter, the one referred to in the will, refused allow him to smoke his usual number of cigars on account of his health. He felt the loss of the tobacco keenly. His fondness for fancy waistcoats amounted to a hobby. Miss Sage died on May 29.

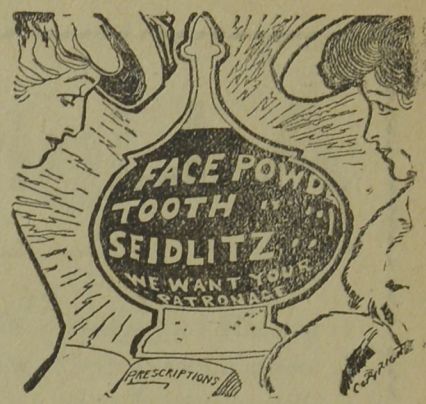

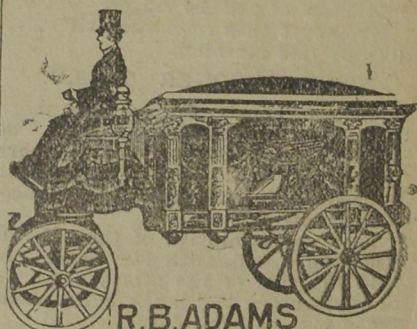
