

HANDS GIRL \$100 BILL; SHE PUT IT IN HER SHOE.

"Now Get it Back if You Can," Said Garfield Place Girl, Hostess to Schwarz.

BUT HE DIDN'T TRY JUST THEN.

Brooklyn Eagle.—It is on record that "Hans Breilmann had gift a party." And so had a young Garfield place girl, and, judging from the way in which she looked today, she probably wished she had not. While the party was in progress last night a Berkeley place young man called with ten other young men and foolishly displayed seven one hundred dollar bills as an indication of how well fixed he was in this world's goods. He gave one in fun, it is said, to the hostess, and she in the same gentle humor put it in her shoe and said:

"Now, let's see you get it back." This is, in brief, the reason why Miss Maria Sagendorf, twenty years old, of 68 Garfield place, a good looking girl, appeared as a defendant before Magistrate Naumer in the Myrtle avenue court today, on a charge of grand larceny, made by Fred Schwarz, twenty-five years old, a publisher by occupation, living at 112 Berkeley place.

The story told by Mr. Schwarz was something out of the usual line. Miss Sagendorf were an anxious look as she stood in front of the bar with Mrs. Letitia Taylor, the probationary officer, and listened to the details.

Young Mr. Schwarz said that he was entertained at a party which was given last night at the home of the defendant who lives with her parents at the address given. There were two or three other young girls present and ten young men accompanied him to the house. They reached there at 10 o'clock and spent the time pleasantly, according to Mr. Schwarz, but for the unfortunate incident that followed.

In the course of the evening he pulled out from one of his pockets seven hundred dollar bills, and, according to the best accounts they were of the fresh, crisp, "spend me if you like" variety.

It may be remarked parenthetically that it is not a customary thing to flourish hundred dollar bills in the presence of either hostess or friends

and that the practice is regarded as a reprehensible one, especially in that part of Garfield place, where the festivities were going on. Some authorities on the subject have been gone so far as to say that it was not in good form. But, no matter how that may be, Mr. Schwarz gave, it is alleged, one of the one hundred dollar bills to Miss Maria Sagendorf in jest.

According to his statement of the passing of the bill, he gave it to the young girl, not "to have and to hold" for ever and ever.

She took the bill and stuck it in one of her shoes and according to the same authority made the remark "Now let's see you get it?"

Mr. Schwarz thinking that it was all a joke, left with his ten young men friends. He returned later under the impression that Miss Sagendorf would give back the bill.

In the meantime it is said that the young woman went out to a restaurant with the young man, to whom it is reported she is engaged to be married and spent \$22.

When Mr. Schwarz asked for his money, he said she refused to give it back. Then he caused her arrest through Patrolman Hoerter of the Bergen street precinct. This was shortly before 2 o'clock this morning.

The police said she admitted at the station house having spent some of the money, and that she offered to return the \$78 left if the matter was allowed to drop. She was told that this was impossible, because a charge of grand larceny had been made against her, and that a settlement would be under the circumstances in the nature of compounding a felony.

When the case was called today in the Myrtle Avenue court the defendant declared that she had only taken the money in jest and seemed much distressed at the way in which the matter had turned out. Magistrate Naumer, however, held her in \$500 bail for the Grand Jury. Her friends say that it was only a case of fooling with an unlucky ending.

SETBACK FOR THE COTTON COMBINE.

Ottawa Man Returns to Big Mills at Valleyfield.

The biggest cotton company in Canada has refused to enter the cotton merger, and there is likely to be a very warm fight. At the meeting of the directors of the Montreal Cotton Company, held in Montreal yesterday, it was decided to refuse the very handsome offer made by the promoters of the combine. A re-organization of the Montreal Cotton Company was decided upon, and Mr. Louis Simpson, a former manager, was appointed in the place of Manager Fred Lacy, who resigned his position.

Mr. Simpson has been a resident of Ottawa for the past few years and has been prominently before the public in connection with his promotion of the manufacture of steel by the electrical process. He succeeded in interesting the government in this project, and the minister of the interior despatched an engineer to Europe to study up the conditions of manufacture there.

Of English birth, Mr. Simpson is looked upon as a vigorous commercial combatant, and the cotton trust will have to reckon with a sturdy opponent.

The mills in Valleyfield have five thousand looms, and when running

at full capacity furnish employment to three thousand hands. Perhaps not more than half that number are at present employed, but the townspeople look forward to the return of the old manager, who always had the mills running at their highest capacity.

The merger of the cotton companies which the Valleyfield mills have refused to enter is the second in the history of the cotton industry. Some years ago the Dominion Cotton Company was formed and five large mills entered it. These were the mills at Magog, Moncton, Windsor, Halifax and Kingston. In the present merger which has just received such a rude setback, the directors of the Dominion Cotton Company have already obtained control of the Merchants Cotton Company, the stock of that concern being secured at a bargain, but for the stocks of the Colonial Bleaching & Printing Company and the Montmorency Cotton Company they had to pay 160 and 150. As most of the purchase money was taken out in new stock, the transaction was what Thomas Lawson would characterize as "a little piece of frenzied finance."

IMMIGRATION FOR JULY.

The Arrivals at Canadian Ocean Ports Were 8,849.

SAME MONTH LAST YEAR WAS BUT THREE MORE--GREATER NUMBER OF IMMIGRANTS ARE BRITISH.

There is a remarkable similarity between the Canadian ocean port immigration for July this year and last year. The immigration statistician, Mr. Robert Fraser, has prepared a statement showing the number of arrivals at the sea ports last month to have been 8,849. In July 1904, the number was just three more.

Comparing the United States immigration for July with last year a falling off appears. There were 3,133 last month as to 3,613 in 1904. The rush of immigration is over for this season. April, May and June are always the heavy months. For instance in May last 23,000 immigrants reached Canada by steamers, over twice as many as in July.

The arrivals at Quebec last month were 8,902 while at St. John only

five came in. In two more months the conditions will change round when Quebec will be closed and the winter port will be the scene of activity. At Montreal in July 312 immigrants were registered and at Vancouver there were 176.

The dominant nationality among the new immigrants is British, the proportion last month at the ocean ports being 5,733 British to 3,116 of all other nationalities.

The chief border port of entry is Winnipeg showing 2,465 arrivals in July.

It is expected the total of Americans will be 200 more when all the customs ports are heard from so that July will be only a couple of hundred behind last year.

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A FIRE HERO.

Jamaica Plain Lad Saved Four Lives From Conflagration.

Boston, Sept. 2.—Frank Simonds is the hero of Jamaica Plain today for his daring rescue early yesterday morning of four lodgers in his home, 15 Green street, that district, from the flames that were fast destroying the dwelling and cutting off all chance of escape.

Simonds awoke at three a. m., to find the house on fire. The flames were spreading to the upper story, where in one room Mrs. Hulda White and her infant daughter, Dorothy Louise, 15 months old, were sleeping, and in others Edward Morrison and Frank Eddy.

Without thought of his own danger, Simonds ran up the burning stairway, through stifling smoke, to the chamber of Mrs. White, and aroused her from a deep sleep. Grasping her slumbering infant, the mother wrapped it in a bed sheet, dashed with it down the stairway, and, through the smoke and flames, reached the street in safety.

Morrison and Eddy were partially overcome by the smoke, and Simonds had to work hard before he could make them understand their danger. By this time the flames were roaring up the front stairway, and starting down that way they were forced by the flames to retreat to their chamber, whence the only escape was by jumping from the second story window to the roof of a shed in the rear of the house. This they did, Simonds following.

In the destruction of clothing in a closet under the stairway Mr. Simonds lost a sum of money in a pocket.
